
Funerals



Letter from Jeremy



"When you listen to God he will eventually lead you to a door." Words offered by Anthony Delaney of Ivy Church Manchester at the Launch conference held in Wigan this week.

The doors that God leads us to are sometimes wide open and sometimes we need to choose to turn the handle and open them ourselves. When the door is open it becomes a threshold from one place to another.

The spiritual threshold that God leads us to is sometimes known as a liminal space. Liminal, coming from the Latin word for the narrow part of a doorway that lies between two rooms or between the outside and the inside of a house.

This place is not always an easy place to be, a place where we have to have a great deal of faith as the destination is often unseen or unclear. A good time then to be close to God, listening to him and drawing on the strength and equipping that he will provide if we say yes to his call.

Advent is an appropriate time for to reflect on this. We appreciate the threshold moment that Mary encountered as the angel appeared to her, the threshold moment then of creation itself as the birth of Jesus is anticipated.

We are inspired by the Christ Child, Jesus, who is born and lives his life in obedience to the Father's will. Look once more at the Gospels and see the liminal moments that Jesus negotiated and how he did that. What's clear is that each one was powered by prayer and encounter with the Father. Thresholds are often hard to cross on our own – we need God and we need fellow travellers.

Each one of us has small thresholds daily in our lives as disciples of Jesus - moments where we choose to, choose not to, or maybe simply lose the opportunity, to share Jesus with another. Each also has larger thresholds as we respond to God in his call on us to serve, or maybe to go where he points.

We share with others community thresholds as worshippers drawn together, the obvious one for our hub is the threshold we step over together as we transition from four parishes to one.

We know that we can't do any of this on our own, but attentive to God, hearing from him and with the strength of others, some who reach out a hand from the new destination to help us through, we may step through all of the open doors of our faith journey, confident that God is already preparing the way.

THE PARISH AND ITS CHURCHES.

Thanks to Vera Parkinson and her family copy of the 1930 history of our Parish I have been able to provide an insight into our past .The first instalment dealing with the very early days follows.

Unfortunately there is no record left of Ashton Chapel as the building was called in the old days.

The earliest record is to be found in the pleadings from a dispute between Sir Thomas Gerard of Brynn and Thomas Gerard of Ince in 1515. It was deposed that the Priest of Ashton Chapel had given public notice that Sir Thomas intended to cut a ditch through Turnshea Moss, where ever that was.

During the next hundred years there is mention of a marriage having been solemnized "in a chapel within the house of Sir Thomas Gerard by one Oswald Key, Chaplain singing at Ashton Chapel," it being clear that the public

chapel was distinct from the private chapel of the Gerard family.

The Chaplain Oswald Key appeared at the first visitation in Queen Elizabeth's reign. That the Elizabethan Prayer Book of 1559 was known from an odd incident when a certain prominent parishioner had an old relative Nicholas whom he thought adhered too obstinately to the old Latin services, and

so he forcibly carried him to Ashton Chapel for the English Service. Nicholas was old and gouty and unable to move by himself, and so by way of protest sang the Psalms lustily in Latin until he had to be carried out again.


It appears that at this time there was no continuous ministry here. In 1590 there was "no preacher" at Ashton and twenty years later there was "seldom a curate." Probably because it wasn't a parish church but only a chapel of ease of the parish of Winwick, the only income would be that provided by the Rector of Winwick.



It is not until 1645 that we begin to find a continuous list of curates but there is one name known before that date, John Janion, possibly 1609 but not at all certain. In 1645 after a local petition the Minister was granted tithes which were worth £120 a year. In 1650 the Commonwealth Surveyors recommended it be made a parish, a recommendation which was apparently not carried out.

At the Restoration of the Monarchy the Rev. James Wood who had been curate since 1645 refused to conform to the new prayer book and was ejected in 1662.

In 1718 Bishop Gastrell found the certified stipend to be £1/12/- the Rector of Winwick however gave £50 "being obliged to provide for it" and other inhabitants subscribed £7 a year on condition that the curate resided and read prayers on Wednesdays, Fridays and Holy Days. To have a resident curate was an innovation!


In the silent place of our heart, Jesus will give us assurances and the hope that we long for.

This Christmas, as you receive his gift of immeasurable love, be thankful!








The Film Review

Joker (15) Directed by Todd Phillips

Stars: Joaquin Phoenix, Zazie Beetz, Robert de Niro, Frances Conroy, Brett Cullen, Glenn Fleshler, Shea Whigham, Leigh Gill, Bill Camp, Brian Tyree Henry, and Marc Maron

In a Nutshell: There is something about certain characters that directors and actors and studios keep going back to the well to explore, and yet whilst you don't really see a ton of different movies that touch upon many Marvel Studios villains, the fact that the character of the Joker is being interpreted again and again is fascinating in a way and none more so than in this movie which has taken the world by storm. Whether it's the movement that seem to have popped up in its wake with protestors and groups taking on the clown motif seemingly inspired by the films message or the prescience of its themes or just the simple easy fact that Joaquin Phoenix's performance (a bit like Heath Ledger in Dark Knight) is just one of the greatest all time acting performances in a role, this coming from someone who was already pretty darn electric in Gladiator and Walk the Line as well as The Master. Taking the story of a character like the Joker and giving him a backstory (especially since Dark Knight shied away completely from giving him any such background) and especially one so bleak and entrenched in a 70s Taxi Driver style is a very bold move and it really pays off because this is no comic book blockbuster... you can take away the names of characters and it becomes a totally non related story to all the Batman universe. Phoenix is the big performance but there is a solid support cast with De Niro on solid form whilst Zazie Beetz shines once more after her big Deadpool II role last year, but its Joaquin's film and he is simply phenomenal... really mixing that dark ruthless psychotic that comes out with a vulnerability and tragicness that really to a point makes you side with him; again only so far though. This is a bleak and tough piece of cinema and yet it's connected to so many on so many levels and its themes of mental health and a crumpled society are timelier than ever and it's not hard to see why.... This is pure and simply an electric and tough piece of cinema, it's a must see and just excellent on almost every level. It won't put a smile on your face but it will leave you shaken to your core, in the best way that cinema can.

Maleficent: Mistress of Evil (PG) Directed by Joachim Ronning

Stars: Angelina Jolie, Elle Fanning, Michelle Pfieffer, Chiwetel Ejiofor, Ed Skrein, Robert Lindsay, Warwick Davis, Sam Riley, Imelda Staunton, Leslie Manville, Juno Temple, Harris Dickinson, and Jenn Murray

In a Nutshell: The basic facts of life are that all films will get a seguel if they made a little



bit of that sweet sweet money at the box office, but really was anyone clamoring for a Maleficent sequel? Don't get me wrong, I enjoyed the first movie but it seemed very contained in what it was doing. So, what can a sequel bring to the table? Well, more of the same really but yet still manage to throw up a few twists and turns and a darker tone all the same. They've ensembled a terrific cast but everyone is just on typically decent form if nothing more, I do really enjoy Sam Riley as Dival the crow and Chiwetel is a great addition as a mysterious new character and it's so great to see Robert Lindsay in a movie as the king. But a lot of people get not much to do and as majestic as Jolie is as Maleficent, it's really nothing too special for the most part; except for the fact that it culminates in one of the most intense and bravura battle sequences in fantasy cinema for a while which definitely goes some interesting and dark places and is excellent entertainment. Plus, the film does do good with delving into the characters back story some more and going some interesting places with that too. The overall feeling that I left with though was just more of the same with a few tweaks here and there, fans will enjoy it immensely and everyone else will find it perfectly fine too, plus Elle Fanning is always delightful as Aurora. And in a year of reboots and remakes such as Aladdin and Lion King, it can't help but at least be something a bit more original. And in the end, that's certainly the least we can ask for. Plus it has Warwick Davis, which should be true of all cinema.


