

Letter from Jeremy

The beginning of 2020 marks a new chapter for our churches in the Deanery of Wigan. On the 1st January The Benefice of Wigan, consisting of 7 new hub parishes, was legally formed. The churches in our four parishes in South Hub: St Aidan's, Holy Trinity & St Andrew's, St Peter's, St Thomas & St Luke's became the new legal parish, The Parish of Wigan South.

Building on the relationships that we have forged, we begin 2020 together with a renewed call from God to combine our talents and gifting, serving in ministry and reaching out in mission, to the communities that he has called us to.

Within the new hub parish, we affirm and value the identities, the place within community, and the unique contribution that each of our churches and our new worship communities offer to the mission and purpose that God has planned for us together.

At our Special Parochial Church Meeting, held at Holy Trinity church on 7th January, we elected our new Churchwardens for Wigan South and also our Deanery Synod and PCC members. We are blessed that we have an even and fair representation across our churches on PCC and Deanery Synod. One person from each church now serves on Deanery Synod and our PCC represents our previous 4 parishes and will continue the work of our Shadow PCC which met for 6 months last year.

We are thankful for the outgoing Churchwardens, PCC and Deanery Synod members of our 4 previous parishes. We are hugely privileged and blessed by the service offered on behalf of so many and particularly over the challenging time of the last few years in the transition to our new parish. We pray that every person in our hub parish will find fulfilling and fruitful roles that express their

their gifting and help to build on the work of the individual parishes as we establish the new.

The coming year will continue be focussed on three strands, developing and embedding the new structure, refreshing our existing worship and discerning God's will for fresh initiatives. With the new legal structure forming the new hub parish, we will work together this year to establish in practice what that means for us in each church and worship community, continuing to build leadership teams and on the ground operation teams. Local Missional Leadership teams will oversee the growing of community, worship, discipleship and mission of our worship communities, committees of the new PCC will oversee the day to day and week to week management and operation of our existing church buildings.

Recognising the importance of financial transparency in the new parishes Andrew Thurston, Church Wigan project finance manager, writes that "Each worship community, which includes newly launched ones as well as existing parish churches, will have a designated fund so that reports can be produced and shared, showing income and expenditure related to each worship community. Local members will be able to see where their giving supports the work of the parish in their place and area as well as across the wider hub."

Our new parish Wigan South creates a new ecclesiastical legal entity of parish. Within the parish are our many and unique churches and worship communities. The concept of Hub is simply the creation of relational structures that enable worship communities to begin, to grow and to flourish. With the purpose of resourcing the missional vision of our parish and worship communities. Linked with the other hub parishes in the wider Benefice we pray that with the vision of many people on a discipleship journey with Jesus we will continue to build a bigger church that makes a bigger difference.

THE POTTER GRAVESTONES PART 2

A second Potter gravestone has the inscription "Elizabeth Potter, wife of John Potter, died 11 August 1831, Aged 65". Also the names John Potter, Charles Potter, of Wigan, Mary Potter, of Wigan and Hezekiah Tatlock Potter. In the previous article I mentioned that William Potter, born 1778, husband of Ann Potter(Littler), was a son of John Potter's second marriage to Isobel Merricks in 1772, John Potter, born 1764, and husband of the above Elizabeth Potter, was a son of John Potter's first marriage to Elizabeth Atherton, of Winstanley, who married at All Saints, Wigan in 1764. In 1789 at St. Oswalds, Winwick, John Potter(born 1764) married Betty/Elizabeth Smith, born Ashton 1766 daughter of William & Elizabeth Smith(nee Tatlock). John Potter's occupation was stay-maker(corset maker) in Ashton. As mentioned in last months article his half-brother William Potter, husband of Ann Potter(Littler) was a stay-maker & linen draper in Market Place, Wigan. John & Betty/Elizabeth Potter(Smith) had 11 children, Thomas 1790 - 1825; James 1792 - 1824; Mary 1794 - 1852 died of breast cancer: Betty 1796, in 1828 married Robert Halsall, of Orrell: Jane 1798, in 1822 married Richard Woolfall, of Macclesfield; Ann 1802 - 1804; Charles 1804 - 1835; Ann/Nancy 1806, in 1829 married John Dobb, of Ashton, shopkeeper: Hezekiah Tatlock Potter 1808 - 1809 (Tatlock being Elizabeth Potter's (Smith) mother's maiden name); Hezekiah Tatlock Potter 1810 - 1842; and Ellen 1812 - 1905, in 1839 married Nathaniel Littler, linen draper, of Ashton under Lvne.

John and Betty/Elizabeth Potter's(Smith) son Charles Potter was a grocer and corn & flour dealer also with a shop on Market Place. Wigan, which had been owned by his late brother James (see next months article) who died 1824. Charles died in 1835 of apoplexy/stroke aged 31 and was buried with his parents at St. Thomas', Ashton. Another son Hezekiah Tatlock Potter was a corn & flour dealer with a shop on Market Place, Wigan, having taken over the occupancy from his late brother Charles who died in 1835. In 1841 Hezekiah was living on Market Place, Wigan, with his sister Mary Potter, his nephews John and Thomas Potter, sons of his late brother Thomas Potter (see Part 3), and his nephew and niece James and Elizabeth Halsall, children of his sister Betty Halsall(Potter). Hezekiah owned lands in Ashton, lands & property in Clayton Street, Wallgate, Wigan, cottages & premises in Wigan, 2 shops in front of Wallgate Street, Wigan, and warehouses behind. He bequeathed over £4000 (todays value £450,000) at his death in 1842. He died aged 32 also of apoplexy and was buried with his parents at St. Thomas', Ashton. John and Betty Potter's (Smith) daughter Mary Potter, unmarried, died 1852 and was also buried with her parents. Another daughter Ellen Potter in 1839 at All Saints, Wigan, married Nathaniel Littler, linen draper, of Ashton under Lyne. Nathaniel, son of John and Nancy Littler, was born in Ashton in Makerfield in 1806 and baptised at St. Thomas'. In the 1870's Nathaniel and Ellen moved from Ashton under Lyne to Oldham. The Potters had earlier connections to Ashton under Lyne and Oldham. In Part 1 John Potter, son of William and Ann Potter(Littler) went to live at Ashton under Lyne and died there in 1828, his sister, Isabella, married at Ashton under Lyne in 1828 and Isabella's brother James opened a drapers shop in Oldham c1825. In 1881 Nathaniel Littler, of Oldham, died aged 75 leaving a fortune of over £62,000 (todays value £7,500,000). He was buried at St. Thomas', Ashton, in the tall steeple grave near the vestry door. In 1905 Nathaniel's wife Ellen Littler(Potter) died at Hollinwood, near Oldham, aged 93, and was buried at St. Thomas', Ashton. Their grave monument records the names of many of their children who died very young including John Tatlock Potter (the maiden name of Ellen's maternal grandmother Elizabeth Smith(nee Tatlock).

Elizabeth Potter(Smith), wife of John Potter, of Wallis's Nook, Ashton, died 1831 aged 65. John Potter of Wallis's Nook died 1836 aged 72. After 1824 John Potter was described as a yeoman farmer owning lands. Wallis's Nook was at the junction of Bryn Road South and Bryn Road and it is probable that John Potter was the owner of Potter's Farm later known as Pimblett's Farm on Bryn Road. An early row of cottages on the Bryn side of the farm was called Potter's Row.

Robert Carson's Film Report- February 2020

Movie Reviews

Star Wars: Episode VIIII- The Rise of Skywalker (12A)

Directed by J.J Abrams

Stars: Daisy Ridley, Adam Driver, Oscar Isaac, Jon Boyega, Ian McDiarmid, Carrie Fisher, Anthony Daniels, Naomi Ackie, Domnhall Gleeson, Richard E. Grant, Keri Russell, Lupita Nyong'o, and Joonas Suotamo

In a Nutshell: Well, this is it... the end of an era. The whole Star Wars saga comes to a rousing close right here. But like Game of Thrones, Lost and countless others... does it have a solid end, or does it have a really rough landing? Don't be too fooled by the 7 out of 10 rating, this is still a super slippy flawed film but it is still wonderfully enjoyable and still has its great moments. I just wish it wasn't so much of a confused mess that tries hard to please fans while alienating anyone who saw and enjoyed the last movie. It's fine to have the occasional correction to something someone said or a character acting different, but to abandon whole storylines and plot points just leaves me confused and supremely unsatisfied in the long run. Sure, the film ends on a rousing finale, but up to that point a lot of it makes zero sense and feels rushed and compromised. It's seeming to please some big Star Wars fans I know so it's doing a job right but it's hard to escape the feeling that this should be so much better and so much more satisfying. When the Force Awakens was released. I love every second of it and then I saw Last Jedi and found it a great follow up... it took chances and was bold and terrific. Then my feeling after this was just 'ah it was ok' and after two movies that I really, really liked and invested in... just feeling it was ok is a real shame. That said, the effects are as always supremely thrilling and the cast are uniformly excellent with a special mention to Carrie Fisher whose scenes are way more than I expecting and are taken from unused footage... her role is so key and so beautiful and works so well. Richard E. Grant and Keri Russell make a strong impact in fun new support roles whilst the key triumvirate of Driver, Ridley, Isaac and Boyega are all on great form as always. Sure, I found it a bit underwhelming but it's working for people and the Force is still very strong here... just a shame it had to go out on a muddled high rather than a really solid and focused one. But, hey, we have The Mandalorian coming up on Disney Plus soon anyway... the force will always be strong! Rating: 7/10

Jojo Rabbit (12A) Directed by Taika Waititi

Stars: Roman Griffin Davis, Taika Waititi, Sam Rockwell, Thomasin McKenzie, Rebel Wilson, Scarlett Johannsen, Alfie Allen, Stephen Merchant, Archie Yates, & Brian Caspe **In a Nutshell:** It's more common than you'd think. The practice of the first film you in 2015 when I saw Birdman and then the following year with Joy... other films to follow this example include Welcome to Marwen and now, Jojo Rabbit. Really beautifully

tiptoeing the tightrope between hilarious satire and heartwarming drama... this is a stone-cold treat that deserves to be seen and cherished by all. I think this is far and away the best film to have this example, because it's truly hard to imagine a better film being released this year, but it's exciting to imagine that maybe there could be. It's a really tricky idea, telling a story about the horrors of World War II that exists as both a satire and a drama and a really absurdist satire at times too. But sometimes the best ways to tackle horror and the truth is to lean into the absurdity sometimes, to ease through the pain. As people say, if you don't laugh, you'll cry. This is certainly true of this movie. Anchored by a stunning debut performance by Davis as well as a bold and breathtaking turn from McKenzie and a superb support cast full of funny and touching performances, not least Johannsen who is receiving great awards buzz for her turn in Marriage Story but is electric here; and of course, I love Sam Rockwell so have to mention he is once again terrific here in a role that could easily be seen as one thing but turns out to be another, which seems to be his thing at the moment. I really don't want to lean too much into the story as I think it should be discovered for yourself, but both achingly funny and achingly sad and beautifully uplifting. If you're not feeling jubilant and moved to pieces by the stirring final seconds, then I might be concerned. This is a truly special piece of cinema to be treasured, and it's what we need right now. Rating: 10/10
