

You can marry in a CofE Church of your choice if certain criteria are shown to be met.



A Letter From Bishop Bev

Every time I reflect upon the Christmas story, I'm always astounded by the miracle that Mary and Jesus ever survived the pregnancy. The odds were stacked against them - Mary's young age, the significant stress she was placed under by the social moral norms, the judgement she was under and rejection by her community, the 'shame blame', the traumatic journey to Bethlehem in the final stages of her pregnancy, the squalid place for the birthing and with no midwife. Infant mortality was high even without this backdrop! And just when they might have thought it was all over, they were under the murderous threat of a paranoid despotic king.

Of course, it was a miracle!

Every step of Mary's journey reveals extraordinary fortitude, courage and belief in God. I never cease to be amazed by Mary's maturity of faith and trust at so young an age, and even when she must surely have questioned what it meant to be 'blessed'.

Mary, like so many of the faithful who kept the promises of God alive, believed God would one day raise up and anoint a leader, a descendant of King David who would gather the dispersed people together under his kingship and just rule. He would be both king and priest, even after the order of David.

God had given the people promise and hope, and with this the assurance that God was with them, God loved them and God would never leave them. However bad things might be, things would get better, because of the promise and because they believed and trusted.

On the Feast of Christ the King, which immediately precedes the advent of Christmas, we are presented with the King of Heaven and Earth, before the representative king of the known world, saying, 'My kingdom is not from this world. Standing before Pilate as one under judgement and condemnation, the King of Heaven and Earth says this: For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.' [Jn 18.37]

The miracle of the incarnation is in fact a miraculous journey that brings Jesus beyond the miracle of the birthing to the place of judgement, to the Cross and indeed to death and the second death. A journey that could only happen with the acquiescence of angels who with hushed breath passively looked on. For this, he came.

Life is full of unknowns. When we think the path is straight before us, it takes a curve or becomes bumpy. The light at the end of the tunnel becomes hidden, because we learn there's a bend in the tunnel. Even as I write this address, none of us know how Christmas 2021 is going to look. With fear of the NU variant escalating, will we be able to meet, hold nativity plays, have carol services and reach out to others with acts of loving kindnesses!

For Christians, there is one thing we do know! We know that over 2,000 years ago, a baby was born in Bethlehem, and he is Christ the King. There's a carol that I love, with the words, 'Mary, did you know ... when you kiss your little baby, you kiss the face of God?'

NT Wright succinctly says, 'If the world didn't need a Messiah, he wouldn't have come!'

Dear friends, wherever and however you celebrate Christmas, whether with others or alone, may you do so in the spirit of Mary and all the saints, in the knowledge that God is with you, God loves and God will never leave you. This Christmas look through the tat and the tinsel into the crib and upon the face of the baby and see a glimpse of the face of God, who came and who has achieved far more than any of us can really comprehend The salvation of the world. And with the angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, may we in a hushed breath, say 'thank you', and find our voice to sing, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven and peace to all people on earth.'

May you have a truly blessed, happy and hope-filled Christmas and with my thanks for your faith and your witness and our shared ministry in the Good News of Jesus Christ our Lord. After the busyness of the season, please do find time for your rest and refreshment. Amen

Get to Know...

Name: Rosalyn Unsworth

Roles & responsibilities: I am a Licensed Reader and Local Missional Leader for St. Andrew's in Garswood. The two roles overlap in my ministry and I am well blessed with a very supportive team of people who all have St. Andrew's in their heart. St. Andrew's is very much a church family, meeting for worship each Sunday at 9.30am and additionally offering the service down the telephone for those parishioners who may not be able to get to church, or live too far away – one of our worshippers joins us from Co. Durham each Sunday!

In addition to this I am part of the team who run a dementia café called 'Peace of Mind' which offers love and support to dementia sufferers and their carers. We meet on a monthly basis in the Mission Hall, Garswood.

Another aspect of my ministry is Funeral Ministry, a role which I am privileged to do.

Favourite church memory: This was the day when I was licenced as a Reader in Liverpool Cathedral; as soon as the processional hymn began I knew that all those hours of study had been worth it to bring me to this stage in my Christian development. I was reminded of this as I sang "All my hope on God is founded, He doth still my trust renew, Me through change and chance He guideth, Only good and only true. God unknown, He alone, Calls my heart to be his own.

In addition when I was commissioned as an LML, one of the hymns identified all my feelings at the time: 'In Christ Alone my hope is found, He is my light, my strength, my song... Here in the love of Christ I stand'.

Interesting fact: I am now retired from a full time teaching post which I held at the Deanery High School in Wigan for many years. But, life is still very busy with church commitments and caring for my 6 year old twin grandsons!

Favourite bible verse: This undoubtedly is: Isaiah's Commission In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord, high and exalted, seated on a throne; and the train of his robe filled the temple. 2 Above him were seraphim, each with six wings: With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they were flying. 3 And they were calling to one another:

- "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory."
- 4 At the sound of their voices the doorposts and thresholds shook and the temple was filled with smoke.
- 5 "Woe to me!" I cried. "I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King, the LORD Almighty."
- 6 Then one of the seraphim flew to me with a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with tongs from the altar. 7 With it he touched my mouth and said, "See, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away and your sin atoned for." 8 Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?"

And I said, "Here am I. Send me!"

This particular passage comes to mind when, as a sixth former in school, I discovered that God was calling me to take my faith further and I enrolled on a "Badge of Recognition" course with Liverpool Diocese. This gave me a taster of how I could lead people. So, when my daughter became more independent as a child, I embarked upon the Reader course.

During this period of training, even though on occasions I would burn the midnight oil, I knew that this was the way that God was taking me and so progression into Local Missional Leader seemed the right pathway to follow. As a consequence I love to sing the hymns but in particular "I the Lord Of Sea and Sky", and "Be still for the presence of the Lord".

Favourite hobby: Gardening, I love spending time outside observing His creation.

Looking to the New Year

The month of January is named after the Roman god Janus, who is depicted as having two faces. As we look back on a difficult year dominated by the pandemic, how should we look forward to 2022 with fresh hope? The apostle Paul writes: 'But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13,14).

Firstly, to make a new start, you need to forget the things which are behind. Paul saw himself as an athlete running for Christ and purposely not looking back. He refused to allow his past sins and difficulties to define who he was. By God's grace, he no longer saw himself that way. The same can be true of ourselves, as we confess our sins and failures to receive God's forgiveness and new life.

Secondly, we need to focus on the things that lie ahead. The athlete is entirely focused on winning the race and gaining the prize. Like Paul, we have to be single-minded in making Jesus the focus of everything we do. How can we go deeper in our prayer life and Bible reading this year? What will it mean to better serve Christ in our workplace and neighbourhood, or family and children?

Paul looked forward to the day when he would stand before God, who would say 'well done, good and faithful servant'. In light of all that Jesus had done for him, Paul wanted to give his very best to Jesus. As we stand at the beginning of this New Year, let's ask ourselves, 'What can I do this year that will help me bring glory and honour to God?'



January Holy Days

6th January: What about the gifts of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh?

The story of the coming of the Magi grew in the telling. By the 6th century they had acquired names: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. By medieval times they were considered to be kings. Whoever they were, we do know from Matthew that they brought three gifts to Jesus.

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? While we cannot know for sure what was in the minds of first century Magi, one Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation as to the significance of their gifts. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote his much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple. Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people.

The Wise Men were the very first gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had! They travelled for months over difficult terrain, they never saw any evidence of Jesus' kingship, His divinity or His sacrificial death. They worshipped Him through faith in God's promises about Him. Isaiah foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi's eyes of faith saw clearly and far into the future.

Compare that with the High Priest and religious leaders whom the Wise Men saw in Jerusalem when they first arrived. These head priests knew all about the prophecies of their own coming Messiah, but NOT ONE Jewish religious leader travelled to look for Him in Bethlehem. And it is only six miles down the road!

19th January - Wulfstan, Bishop of Worcester 1095

He was the last surviving pre-Conquest bishop, the first bishop to pay homage to William the Conqueror after the battle of Hastings, and one of the few Saxons to keep high office to the end of William's reign. On top of that, he seems to have been a truly good and holy man.

Wulfstan was born about 1008 at Long Itchington, Warwickshire. His uncle was Archbishop of York, and through his help, Wulfstan studied at the monasteries of Evesham and in Peterborough. Because of his Christian dedication, his superiors recommended him for the priesthood. Wulfstan was ordained in 1038 and joined a Benedictine monastery at Worcester.

Wulfstan was appointed prior of the monastery and from 1034 also served as the parish priest of Hawkesbury, Gloucestershire. He was made bishop of Worcester in 1062.

As a bishop, Wulfstan made some significant contributions to the English church. He had a passion for pastoral care and was the first English bishop to be known to have made a complete visitation of his diocese. He was a gifted administrator, increasing the effectiveness of his archdeacons.

He was a powerful preacher – with a great gift for explaining the teaching of Christianity. He encouraged a wider understanding of public penitence and taught against the many pagan customs throughout the land.

He had a strong social conscience, and soon became a bitter opponent of the slave trade. Together with Lanfranc, Wulfstan was mainly responsible for ending the slave trade in Bristol, and also for abolishing the slave trade between Worcester diocese and Ireland.

He had a passion for buildings, and founded Great Malvern Priory, as well as overseeing the large-scale rebuilding of Worcester Cathedral, Hereford Cathedral, and Tewkesbury Abbey.


Wulfstan died in January 1095, apparently during his daily ritual of washing the feet of 12 of his parishioners.

Your annual accounts – all 146 pages, bound in their plastic covers and laid out in faultless detail – really are most impressive. I was rather envious to note you have a clergy 'discretionary fund'; if I were to be given such a thing, my cellar of claret would improve immeasurably – although that is perhaps the reason why I am not given one.

The size of your office expenses makes me wonder if you have a staff rivalling that of the European Community. I suppose that at least you are doing your bit for job creation. Our dear Miss Marigold, who spends two hours a week randomly filing pieces of paper, mistyping rotas and failing to re-order stationery, is only rewarded by being the first to find out who are booking marriages and having their babies baptised – and if they do not happen in that order, that will be another piece of information remembered for future use. All this is information beyond the price of jewels in village communities.

Our accounts have more by way of charm than they do of accuracy, generally consisting of one sheet of handwritten paper. I see that your accounts were professionally audited. Fortunately, it does not matter too much about the accuracy of our own, as I have an arrangement with our auditor who lives in the village: if he refuses to sign them off, then I refuse to baptise his grandchildren.



Our resident historian David Fearnley has penned another article reflecting on the past of our town and its people.

COUNTRY ESTATES OWNED BY THE MASTER AND GERARD FAMILIES

During past centuries the Master and Gerard families, owners of the New Hall/Garswood New Hall, a large mansion house formerly situated on the present Ashton in Makerfield golf course, also owned additional properties elsewhere in England. It is interesting to reflect on the past and more recent histories of three of these properties.

In a previous article I mentioned Legh Master, the elder (1694 -1750) of New Hall who was buried in a vault beneath the floor of Ashton Chapel. In 1753 Legh's son, Legh Master, the younger (1717-1796) (also mentioned in a previous article, he sailed to Maryland, America, 1770) married Katharine Hoskins of Barrow Green House, Oxted, Surrey. Barrow Green House was the residence of the Hoskins family from c1622. In 1809 Jeremy Bentham philosopher and reformer rented Barrow Green House from the Hoskin's family. c1812 James Mill and his children, including the future philosopher, economist and social reformer John

Stuart Mill, lived with Bentham at Barrow Green House. Today the house renamed Barrow Green Court is the residence of Mohamed Al-Fayed, the former owner of Harrods store, London. His late son, Dodi Fayed, who was killed in the Paris car crash with Diana, Princess of Wales, is buried in the grounds of Barrow Green Court. Eastwell Road, off Old Road, provides a clue to the second property since the road is named after Eastwell Manor, Ashford, Kent. Eastwell Manor was built 1540 - 1550 and rebuilt 1793 - 1799. From 1870 - 1893 the manor was occupied by Prince Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh, 2nd son of Queen Victoria. In 1894 Eastwell Manor set in a 4,000 acre estate was bought by Lord William Cansfield Gerard of Ashton in Makerfield for £240,000 (today £32,000,000). Guests invited to Eastwell Manor included Lord and Lady Randolph Churchill, the parents of Winston Churchill, King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra. In 1902 Lord Gerard died at Eastwell Manor and his body was brought by train from Ashford station, Kent, to Ashton in Makerfield station situated opposite the entrance to Haydock Park Racecourse and adjacent to Garswood New Hall. Lord Gerard was buried at St. Oswald's, Ashton in Makerfield. Lord Gerard's son, Frederick John Gerard inherited Eastwell Manor in 1902 and sold it in 1920. In the 1920's the main house was destroyed by fire and rebuilt 1926-1928. Eastwell Manor is now an hotel with the "Lord Gerard" room a reminder of its past.

The third property also owned by Lord William Cansfield Gerard was Moulton Paddocks, Newmarket, Suffolk. Lord Gerard bought Moulton Paddocks in 1885 and owned the property until 1892. Moulton Paddocks was used for the breeding and training of his racehorses. Lord Gerard entertained guests at Moulton Paddocks during the Newmarket Race Meeting. In 1887 Lord Randolph Churchill stayed at Moulton Paddocks. In 1899 Sir Ernest Cassel an Anglo/German banker and racehorse breeder bought Moulton Paddocks. He was the grandfather of Edwina, Lady Louis Mountbatten. Lord Mountbatten was killed by the IRA in 1979. The mansion house was destroyed by fire and demolished 1945. In 1994 Moulton Paddocks was leased to and in 2004 bought by Sheik Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum the ruler of Dubai. The wealth of the Sheik transformed Moulton Paddocks into a horse-breeding stud farm with a state of the art training centre the best in Europe. Moulton Paddocks is now part of the Sheik's "Godolphin" racing operation. The Sheik has been in the news in

recent months with his acrimonious divorce and alleged phone hacking of his exwife Princess Haya and in recent years due to his daughters Princess Shamsa and Princess Latifa's unsuccessful attempts to escape a repressive Dubai for greater freedom in Europe.
