

Letter from the Vicar

Engaging with the Transforming Wigan programme and discerning Transforming the future for our churches, may sometimes that we are seem parishes; walking individually as



seeking to adjust and to change to a new way of being church. With pride in our community, and with personal, emotional investment in our church buildings, we will have some unique, but mostly common challenges to deal with. In reality each parish, each church, each worshipping community is journeying the same route as every other.

Jesus gives us really simple instructions - to love God and love our neighbour, and to go and make disciples. Over many

> hundreds of years, we have translated the word 'go' to the word 'come', assuming that our often magnificent church buildings are attractional because they always have been. If we meet, people will come.

The reality of church attendance - numbers and ages, throughout the Church of England - shows that this model is not working any more. Transforming Wigan seeks to review, refresh and remodel our church - the people of God - to be followers of Jesus' Great Commandment and Great Commission.

We are working out how to be one church in Wigan, with several hubs and many worshipping communities. Simply put, for St Thomas and St Luke's churches, at present a worshipping community is one of our congregations. Our 'hub' is the developing leadership of our churches and our

partner churches: St Peter's, Holy Trinity, St Andrews and St Aidan's. One Church is the way that all churches in Wigan begin to not just work together in partnership, but to

combine together on mission, practically, financially and structurally, establishing many new worship communities and refreshing our existing ones along Jesus commandment and commission.

If we look wider than Wigan, the picture is even broader than that. In the Liverpool

Diocesan Growth Conversation document, one of its key tasks is to "continue with the Transforming Wigan initiative, ensuring that as a whole diocese we maximise and apply the learning from this flagship piece of work." As we work personally, in our individual parishes, in our hub teams, and as Team Wigan on Transforming Wigan, we journey a little ahead of other Deaneries and parishes within our Diocese. But we also journey together with them – all travelling in the direction of our growth aims – asking God for a bigger church to make a bigger difference.

Each individual has their own part to play in obedience to Jesus' commandment and commission. Pray continually for our personal contributions, for our parishes, for Wigan, for Liverpool Diocese and for the Church of England as we seek God and his way to a bigger church, in order

to make a bigger difference in our world.

Messy Noah—Thursday 26th May

A male and a female of each kind of living being went into the boat with Noah, as God commanded. Then the Lord shut the door behind Noah. The flood continued for 40 days and the water became deep enough for the boat to float.

Genesis ch7 v15-17

Messy stations

We made elephant bagpipes, which were so much fun. A bit tricky at first but with the right technique produced quite a deep sound. All from just a rubber glove, straw and a pipe!

Another craft, (which were less noisy!) involved making rainsticks. This was a tube filled with polystyrene and bird seed. Tipping the rainstick produces a sound like rain, which helped us to imagine the rain at the start of the flood.

Load up the ark was really enjoyed by everyone, as Noah and the animals were carefully coloured in and attached to the Ark using pegs. There would have every variety of animal and our versions had penguins, wolves, leopards and lots of other animals.



The food station is always popular and today was no exception. We made edible arks using cocktail sausages, cheese slices and cucumber. We were challenged to think about what food there would have been on the ark.

We made a giant 3D ark and using animal masks that we made,

attached them onto the ark. We talked about how the kept Noah and his family safe through the long flood.



Our animal puppets looked fantastic when completed. Card cut into shapes transformed plain brown paper bags into dog, cats and other animals. We talked about how wonderful the variety of animals we have in the world and how much God loves them.

We made Rainbow bottles by filling empty water bottles with coloured salt. We talked about how the rainbow was a sign of God's promise that he would never flood the whole earth again.

We also made doves from feathers, remembering that the dove is a symbol of peace.

Celebration talk and worship

Whilst the hall was cleaned up and prepared for the meal, Sue took all the children and parents into Juniors to talk about Noah. After the celebration talk, we went back into the hall for worship. We sang Israel's Houghton's I am a friend of God and Sue taught everyone the sign language as actions.

For our celebration meal, we had sausages in rolls with tomato ketchup. Plain and chocolate mini doughnuts were handed round for dessert.

Parish Giving Scheme

Another thank you to those Church members, now in excess of 50, who have set up the direct debits and a reminder of the efficiency of the scheme and an encouragement for others to consider joining.

Commemorating the Battle of the Somme



At St Thomas's Church there will be a gathering around the cenotaph in the Remembrance Garden at 7.30am on Friday 1st July when they will blow whistles to commemorate the start of the Battle of The Somme.

Nationally, all-night vigils are being held across the UK to mark the centenary of The Battle of the Somme, which began 100 years ago on 1st July and lasted until 18th November the same year.

It was arguably the most destructive battle ever to have taken place and was the first battle to use tanks. Over a million men were either killed or wounded, including nearly 60,000 Britons on the first day alone.

Named after the nearby French river, the battle exemplified the futility of trench warfare. The Britons who took part were largely volunteers who had no experience of battle.

The French army commander, General Foch, advised against it, and he was supported by some British commanders, such as General Henry Rawlinson. But they were ignored by politicians and more senior army commanders.

The ground gained by the Allies over the four months of the battle was only about six miles. In the course of the battle, 51 Victoria Crosses were won by British soldiers -17 posthumously.

Here in Ashton, there is a display in the library (pictured) featuring information about the battle including 3 soldiers from Ashton who were killed in battle and which will be changed regularly. (with thanks to Neina Woodward for the image).





Alice Through the Looking Glass (PG) Directed by James Bobin

In a Nutshell: When is Burtonesque not Burton? You might quickly point to Nightmare before Christmas as an example of Burton not directing... but to be fair, that is still mainly his film. Here though, the spirit remains to a degree in the design and shape but a new presence is behind the camera and boy does he do fun! Taking the characters and story from the first and giving everything a new twist.... James Bobin, the genius behind both recent Muppet movies and Flight of the Conchords really injects a newer and zanier twist to proceedings in the shape of Time itself, or himself.... here beautifully and ridiculously portrayed a top form idiotic Sacha Baron Cohen, just stealing the whole film. That section of the plot and film alone makes it worth it, because of all the time puns, his little robot servants, and all the juicy time travel plotting and mechanations... that said, let's not forget Alice.... the amazing Miss Wasikowska again just takes the film and makes it her own, she's independent and free spirited and a force to be reckoned with and it's fabulous to see her really holding her own and taking no nonsense, a truly strong and fabulous female lead to be looked up to and a great role model to all. Speaking of which, also fabulous as ever is Bonham Carter as the Red Queen, just a utter delight and with even more to work with here too including a intriguing back story and some sympathetic moments... whilst Depp is as insanely dependable as ever

as Hatter, here the focus of the story and more subdued than last time round but equally strong if quirky. Everyone else turns in fun turns too and it's sad to hear the final moments for Rickman on screen, he will be greatly missed. What I really love amongst the strong themes, cool plotting, fun moments and great cast though is the sumptous visuals which feel real and cool and wonderfully unique... they really give this movie a fun feel. Which on top of all the fun and quirky unique things it does do... is more than enough to suggest falling back down the rabbit hole. **Rating: 8/10**

In a Nutshell: It's the weirdest thing, expectation. For example, say that you watch a whole franchise or a series of films with a cast of characters that you deeply love in all their different incarnations... and for all of the faults with some of the specific movies (and there's a few), you still love them plenty enough. So naturally, with a new movie coming out, the race is on to fulfill those feelings. So sure you enjoy the latest film all the same, but it does say something big about this particular movie, that you begin to start to notice some sizeable flaws in the fabric of the movie, not to mention that big nagging feeling that it doesn't hang together as well as you'd want... all this seemingly regardless of the sleepy nature of a midnight showing (cause you're such a fan). So it certainly is bravo then for the chance to have a second viewing... a second viewing which does bring the film into focus... and whilst it still has it's flaws, it does hang together a lot better. But that's the one huge problem with a film that is following First Class and Future Past... that factor of being merely enjoyable, fun and passable isn't really nearly enough... and neither is trading on former glories. Basic review premise set up, what does work then? The performances are as ever fairly solid ranging to pretty strong, both McAvoy and Fassbender are strong leads once more and Lawrence is as dependable as ever if a bit stuck in Katniss mode, whilst Sophie Turner makes a bold and dynamic debut as a young Jean Grey... fierce and troubled. Though Oscar Isaac opts to be a hamburger for the duration sadly and provides no real menace apart from being very blue and ugly.... and the basic story is fun enough if kinda just whatever, and there is plenty of action and guips.... sadly there are inconsistencies that don't work well either sadly. For a huge start, how with 20 years passing between First Class does everyone look even younger than ever... they must all be ancient by now, or soon anyway, plus others that involve spoilers. The big problem with the film isn't that it's not fun and exciting... because it still manages that... it's just that overall when you're used to coming out and going giddy with how exciting and terrific then film was... to just come out nodding and smiling and being agreeable somehow isn't enough... what happened? Rating: 7/10


