



# Letter from Sian

It is much harder than I'd anticipated to sit down and write a final letter for our parish magazines. In fact, this is my third time of trying! I shall begin by stating again that it was not my plan to leave. Having committed verbally to staying on as Associate Hub Leader almost a year ago, I had a dream back in February which changed everything. In the dream, a group of us from around the parish were attending a conference, when someone approached me and said there was a job for me to look at in Liverpool. I graciously declined, but later in the dream, it was obvious that I was already in Liverpool and had been for some time. The next day (awake now, obvs!), an e-mail from the Diocese pinged into my inbox, inviting internal applicants to a post in the Dingle.

Although I felt nudged by God, there was a sense of knowing yet not knowing at the same time. I could see that God was preparing me for something but there was no guarantee that the job would be mine. Also, I was not the only person applying for it. So, there were all sorts of variables, and all sorts of questions. How do you test that something like this is right? How do you know that you're not going completely bonkers? And what if you were completely misguided – how do you regain composure? (I've always been known for mine...)

Ever since I was little, I've always asked God that if he needs to tell me something, please make it really clear, as I don't want to miss it. So, I asked him about this hunch, drawing me towards Liverpool and for confirmation that I was pursuing the right thing. Also, I ran the whole thing past my spiritual director, who has known me for years; he knows me well enough to ask me what I think I'm playing at and equally to say he thinks I'm heading in the right direction. I sought the advice of a couple of other people, too. Out of the blue, someone contacted me, as they thought the job would suit me. I eventually approached the interview feeling that whatever happened, God had it covered.

As the lectionary heads into some of Hebrews 11 and 12 in August, we meet a catalogue of people who felt inadequate but stepped out in faith: from Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham and Sarah to Rahab, Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel and all the prophets. Some well-known, some a bit less familiar. All nudged/challenged/used by God. We might feel very far removed from some of these characters but they all started out as ordinary (if slightly eccentric) people like us. And, yes, they all made mistakes, often very publicly.

John Ortberg, in "All the Places to Go", talks a lot about doors. He says, "An open door is the great adventure of life because it means the possibility of being useful to God." What matters, of course, is our response to the open door. Some of us are closed-door people, whose default setting is to err on the side of caution, the thought of adventure making us seize up in fright. Ortberg goes on: "Very rarely in the Bible does God come to someone and say, 'Stay.' Almost never does God interrupt someone and ask them to remain in comfort, safety, and familiarity. He opens a door and calls them to come through it." Some of us, on the other hand, are open-door people.

The changes in Church Wigan are not all easy to take on board. For the church to stay alive and grow, something had to change. Amidst the frustrations, the challenge for us all is to see the opportunities, the doors that are opening. We never step through them alone, God is always with us. It has been so encouraging and refreshing to see people stepping out of their comfort zones, leading services, planning worship, preaching, working with young people, and I know this has often come at a cost.

I shall always be grateful for the people I've met here, the times of laughter, times of questioning and the times of challenge, where we've learned to rely more on God. I shall think of you often as I wander around the Dingle, too scared to wear my Manchester United shirt and needing an interpreter who's fluent in Scouse. I'll miss the Garswood sunsets, the Carr Mill grebes, the Three Sisters woodpeckers and the Ashton kingfisher but I'll console myself with a bacon butty and cup of tea from St Cleopas Café.

As well as reminding you that Andy Kind is with us at St Peter's School on Sunday, 14<sup>th</sup> July (6.30pm) to help us celebrate two of the most important things to me: Jesus and laughter, I'd like to leave you with two quotes. The first is from Mike Yaconelli's book, Dangerous Wonder:

"Christianity is not about learning how to live within the lines; Christianity is about the joy of colouring."

The second is a verse which encouraged me to step out in faith when I was a student:

The LORD replied, "My Presence will go with you, and I will give you rest." (Exodus 33:14)

I'm praying that the same God who surprised me with a call to inner-city Liverpool will surprise the right person with a call to South Wigan.

Thank you for having me.

John Wick: Chapter III- Parabellum (15)

**Directed by Chad Stahelski** 

**Stars:** Keanu Reeves, Halle Berry, Ian McShane, Lance Reddick, Laurence Fishburne, Anjelica Huston, Mark Dacascos, Asia Kate

Dillon, Tobias Segal, Jerome Flynn, and Said Taghmaoui In a Nutshell: Keanu Reeves. Always the coolest person ever, but sadly not always appreciated.... From Point Break and Speed through to The Matrix and more; he was often at one time labelled someone very wooden and one note even while very cool. I've always loved him in most things, so it's good to see with the John Wick series that he is finally getting some appreciation and welldeserved dues. True to this, the third installment in this franchise sees him once again in fine fettle alongside some of the best action and fight sequences ever committed to film. From books and horses to knifes and glass, everything gets an outing as a means to engage in seriously masterful combat in this twisty turny narrative as the events of the previous two movies bring serious ramifications to the universe being built here. Once more you have wonderfully witty and fabulous turns from McShane. Fishburne and Reddick as well as fun support turns from Huston, Flynn and Berry; plus, one utter scene stealing turn from Mark Dacascos. The action is incredible, literally at times taking your breath away again and again and making you want to pause to catch your breath come the end of a scene... as with most films, there is moments where we must stop to talk plot and in these moments there is a mild lag

but it's a small price to pay for another installment in a truly excellent action franchise and who knows where we'll wind up next? But it's guaranteed to be another great time at the movies all the same.

Stars: Taron Egerton, Richard Madden, Jamie Bell, Gemma Jones, Bryce Dallas Howard, Steven Mackintosh, Stephen Graham, Tom Bennett, Charlie Rowe, and Tate Donovan In a Nutshell: How does one ever manage to fit a whole wacky and wonderful life into a simple movie narrative? Whether it's Bohemian Rhapsody, Walk the Line, The Doors, or many of the other wonderful movie rock and pop biopics... then it's finding someone worthy of playing such incredible personalities. Thankfully, the ever -wonderful Dexter Fletcher (secret director of Bo Rap) has done it once more after his fabulous Proclaimers musical Sunshine on Leith; and made something truly magical and truly special and with quite simply the performance of the year from Taron Egerton, one that even puts Rami Malek to shame guite frankly. This isn't so much the simple story of a life rather than that translated into a fantasy musical... the truth is tough but it also vibes beautifully on the screen. Complimented by a great cast of solid supporting actors, with highlights being a terrific Jamie Bell as Bernie Taupin, Richard Madden as John Reid and a wonderful little turn from Stephen Graham who's just happy to be here. The music throughout is top notch as can be expected with a catalogue as magical as Eltons' and Egerton sings every single second of every song and is incredible, you can truly tell straight away how he was picked and he fills the screen and owns it all. The musical sequences are incredibly realized and rather than simply go through them in chronological, the film just fits them in where they work in the narrative and it's all the better for it. So, quite simply if you want to really see the true amazing story of Elton John; then this is for you tenfold, music singing and dancing galore, it's certainly no sacrifice.



# July birth flower

July heralds the middle of summer and with it come two gorgeous flowers that are unique not only in appearance but in growth as well. The Delphinium, otherwise known as the Larkspur, as well as the Water lily has both been awarded the honor of representing <u>July</u> as its birth flower.

These two July birth flowers differ greatly in appearance. The water lily makes its home on the surface of the water and has a large lily pad with a single flower in the center. These majestic plants are often referred to as "Queen of the Water" and the flowers almost look like a crown and is also called a Lotus flower. The delphinium, on the other hand, might look like a single flower but is made up of numerous tiny flowers shaped like a poker. Other names for the Delphinium / Larkspur include Knight's Spur, Lark's Heel or Lark's Claw. Although the Delphinium and Larkspur look very similar, there are subtle differences between the two. You only have to look at the delicate



flowers to see this. The Delphinium has trumpet-like flowers while the Larkspurs flower is more open without the trumpet-like tube of the Delphinium.
