Letter from Eth Yates

"Create in me a pure heart and renew a steadfast spirit within me".

'This verse was on the front of the February magazine at St Peters, as I read it I thought this was a good verse to take us into the summer holiday season. Hopefully for many of you reading this article the summer will be a time when we are able to sit back and relax (or am I dreaming!!). For those with school aged children these summer months mean extra work as you arrange care and entertainment for the children, for others you may be off to exotic places either in this country or overseas. Hopefully for most it's a time to sit back take a breath and review the year.'

Well that was the start of the article I had planned to write for the magazine however Covid 19 got in the way. I began writing this way back in February so that I would have it done when Sue Thomas reminded me. How things have changed

I should have been going to Wales with our annual GB/BB camp, when a group of 40+ of us would leave the safety of Bryn for Wales and 'invade' a farmers field with nothing more than a tap. We would live in tents, camper vans and caravans for a week. We learn a lot during that week away mainly about each other and how we work and interact together. The best time we see how we work together is when pours down with rain and we are trying our best to keep the young people dry. Sometimes this brings out the best in us and sometimes, I'm ashamed to admit, it brings out the worst. New Archbishop of York

Bishop Stephen Cottrell will be confirmed as the 98th Archbishop of York at 11am on Thursday, July 9, in a service broadcast entirely via video conference, due to Coronavirus restrictions.

As Presiding Judge, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd Justin Welby, has granted permission for the virtual service to take place.

The service, which had been due to take place in York Minster, will be in two parts: a legal ceremony with readings, prayers and music; and a film marking the start of Bishop Stephen's ministry as Archbishop of York.

Young people from across the North of England, will read a letter written by the medieval religious scholar Alcuin of York.

Bishop Stephen will offer his first address as Archbishop of York. Prayers will be offered for the Archbishop and the Northern Province of the Church of England, as well as for the wider world in these difficult times.

Commenting on the service, Bishop Stephen said: "I am looking forward to beginning my ministry as the 98th Archbishop of York.

"This isn't quite how I imagined it would begin. It is certainly the first time an Archbishop's election will have been confirmed via video conference.

"But we're all having to re-imagine how we live our lives and how we inhabit the world. These are difficult times.

"My hope is that through this service the love of God that is given us in Jesus Christ will shine out, perhaps even to those who while never attending a service in York Minster, might have a look online.

"I can still just about remember what it's like to not be part of the Christian community.

"What inspired me to follow Jesus is that vision of a new humanity that I see in him. Following in the footsteps of my many predecessors, I look forward to serving our nation and bringing the love and peace of Christ to our world, especially here in the north."

The Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby said: "Like so many across the Church of England and Anglican Communion, I am looking forward to welcoming Bishop Stephen to his new ministry with joy, thanksgiving and hope.

"He radiates the love of Jesus Christ wherever he goes, and along with my fellow bishops, I look forward to serving alongside him. These are difficult times for everyone, and frightening and painful times for many. But we believe as strongly as ever that Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness.

"I pray that this new beginning for Bishop Stephen as he becomes Archbishop of York is also a moment that refreshes our hope, deepens our faith and sends us out with new energy to love and serve others in Christ's name."

The Confirmation of Election is the formal legal process that completes the appointment of senior bishops. Prior to the confirmation, the College of Canons of York Minster will have elected the Archbishop Designate as the Queen's nominee for the post. At the start of the proceedings, he will give his consent to his appointment. Following the reading of the Queen's Letters Patent, legal documents supporting the appointment will be produced to show that all necessary procedures have been followed. At the conclusion, the election will be confirmed, and Bishop Stephen will become the Archbishop of York. The service would ordinarily take place in York Minster, the seat of the Archbishop of York.

The service will be available on the Church of England website.

Arrangements for Bishop Stephen's enthronement service will be announced later in the year.

Church opening

We are delighted that St Thomas' will be open for private prayer from Saturday 11th July and will be open from 11 to noon on Saturdays and 7-8pm on Tuesdays. St Luke's will not be opening as yet. At present there are no plans to hold any services in any of the churches across the parish of Wigan South. Please be assured that there will be rigorous risk assessments in place to minimise the risk of infection.

Church Hall

Our church hall has stood empty during the lockdown other than providing an overspill for the ACT foodbank. In this respect we need to give a big hand of thanks to Andrew Bullen and his team along with those who generously donate supplies, for their tremendous efforts during these trying times. As the hall has been empty we took the opportunity of carrying out a job that has long been on my mind. That is the resealing of the wooden floors which do take a lot of hammer when the hall is in use.

A supply of bourne seal was procured along with lambs wool applicators and on Monday 22 June along with a very willing team of our asylum seeking friends we set about the task. The target was the left hand hall, regarded as the more posh one. The tables and chairs were removed and using my old piano trolley we shifted the pool table. The floor was swept and then mopped. We had to leave it then for several hours to dry before returning in the afternoon to apply the first coat, the skilled work being done by my volunteers. We returned on Tuesday to put on a second coat which was then left to harden. A return next week sees us tackle the right hand hall. My grateful thanks goes to Hojjat, Hadi, Callixte and Amin with Paul arriving to help a little later. They really got stuck in and then tackled some of the overgrown vegetation around the sides of the halls.

I also understand from Sue that the lads were also very helpful in

My nerves quiver when I think of the problems in this graveyard we really do need to assemble a strong team of volunteers to shift tons of soil by barrow into the many sunken grave plots. My request for volunteers sadly seem to fall on deaf ears, I must stress that your 'church needs you.'

ASHTON IN MAKERFIELD 1379

Do you remember the Poll Tax riots of 1990? The riots were an example of history repeating itself. The first Poll Taxes in England were introduced by Edward III in 1377 and Richard II in 1379 and 1381 to raise money for the war against France. The Poll Taxes were very unpopular and led to the Peasants Revolt in 1381. Only the 1379 and 1381 Poll Tax accounts survive for Ashton in Makerfield and they provide a list of some of the people who lived in Ashton in those years. In 1379 the Poll Tax charges included - a knight owning lands = paid 20shillings(£1 today); a squire not owning lands = 40d(17 pence today); every married man had to pay for himself and his wife = 1 groat(4d) or (c2 pence today); every single man and woman over the age of 16 = 1 groat(4d) or (c2 pence today); some special occupations = 6d(2&1/2 pence today); beggars or paupers were excluded. In 1379 a weeks wage was c1s(shilling). To pay 4d (1 groat) was two days pay for the average labourer. In 1379, 58 people paid the Poll Tax in Ashton in Makerfield :-

Peter Gerard, knight, owner of lands valued at over £66 13s 4d = 20s

William Holland, armour bearer, = 40d

Adam Lynknale, armour bearer, = 40d

All the following (original spellings), unless otherwise indicated, were farm labourers and paid 1 groat(4d) or (c2 pence today) tax:-

Roger Totehill; William Lowe; Roger Galt, carpenter; Robert Galt; Robert Lowe; Roger Passeminche; William Culcheth; Hugh Overfair; Roger Westhull; William Gere; Roger Dikson; Peter Ferneley; Robert Ledean; Robert Dikson; William Baty; Robert Wood; Henry Laythwaite; John Waryng, fletcher(maker of arrows), 6d; John Hall; Robert Hall; John Attirdam; Richard Jenkinson; Matthew son of Roger Jonson; John Hepay; Henry Lee; Robert Fox; Robert Soudeway, tailor, 6d; Adam Judson; John Sutton; Robert Gibonson; Hugo Hall, servant; Robert Darwynd; Thomas Hey; Goditha Hey(female), farmer; John Harwod, wool cleaner/clothmaking, 6d; Richard Smyth; Richard

Milner; Peter Couper, couper(now cooper = tub maker); Richard Totehill; Ralph Boydell; William Goldebaron; William Jakson; Robert Sharples; Adam Noneson; Roger Colley, carpenter, 6d; John Potter; William Lorym; William Dewhurst; Roger Totehill; Richard Dike; John Laysing; Matthew son of Thomas Trwet, servant; William Hall; John Harrison; John Spark; Roger Goldyng.

(list of names@)"Poll Tax 1377, 1379 1381" - Carolyn Fenwick).

Sir Peter Gerard, the first person in the above list, resided at the fortified manor house "The Brynn", on Landgate Lane, and died 1380. The surname "Totehill" appears 3 times in the above list and may refer to the ancient site of Toothill which lies to the rear of the former Infectious Diseases Hospital in Bryn Road. Its origins are unclear but in Old English Toothill = "lookout hill". In such an elevated location was Toothill a watchtower? In the 1700's on Bryn Road, in front of the site of Toothill, was Toothill Farm possibly connected to the Totehill/Toothill family. The above list of names relates some of the surnames to occupations, Richard the Smyth; Richard the Milner/Miller, John the Potter, Peter the Couper/Cooper = tub/barrel maker. Other surnames are linked to places - William of Culcheth, John of Sutton, John of Hepay(near Chorley). William of Goldebaron/Golborne? and Hugo of the Hall, servant, possibly at "The Brynn" the residence of the Gerards on Landgate Lane.

The 1379 Poll Tax does not give a true indication of the numbers of people living in Ashton in Makerfield since many avoided paying the tax and those under the age of 16 and paupers were excluded.


If you want to leave food items for our asylum seeker friends, these can also be left at the vicarage but please make sure your bags or boxes are clearly labelled so we know who they are meant for

BEATITUDES

FOR A GLOBAL PANDEMIC

If you would like to remind yourself of the original Beatitudes; those eight blessings that Jesus gave us at the beginning of the Sermon of the Mount, you can find these in Matthew 5:1-12.

St Thomas the Apostle

Feast day on 3rd July

Thomas, one of Jesus' twelve apostles, was an impulsive, confused, honest sceptic. Jesus could understand and work with such a man. Thomas' impulsiveness was evident when Jesus prepared to visit Lazarus in Bethany. It was a dangerous trip to make, because of the Jews, but Thomas urged his fellow disciples: "Let us also go, that we may die with Him." (John 11:16) Instead, Jesus brought Lazarus back to life.

Thomas' confusion is shown in later talks with Jesus. He was not really sure where Jesus was going long-term (John 14:5). But Jesus accepted this confused commitment, and began to untangle it, patiently explaining: "I am going to my Father", and "No one comes unto the Father but by me."

Finally, Thomas' honest scepticism is revealed after the Resurrection, which he flatly refused to believe – unless he could touch the wounds of the risen Jesus. Sure enough, Jesus appears – but instead of scolding him, shows him the wounds. Thomas responds: "My Lord and my God" (John 20:28).

Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of men and women across the centuries, who also want to follow Jesus, but who require some proof of this amazing event – the Resurrection. In Doubting Thomas' complete affirmation of faith, after meeting the risen, crucified Christ, they can find support for their own faith.

Ancient legends tell how Thomas went on to India as a missionary. There are rumours that Thomas even built a palace for a king's daughter in India, and thus he is the patron saint of architects. It is believed that he was martyred by a spear on 3rd July, 72 AD in Mylapore, near Madras. 46 ancient churches in England were dedicated to him and this includes ours, the third St Thomas' church to be built in our town.

NHS Anniversary

The National Health Service came into being on 5 July 1948. During post-war reconstruction, improving the healthcare of the nation was seen as crucial to the nation's recovery. Beveridge, the architect of the NHS, identified "five giants" that had to be slain: want, disease, squalor, ignorance and idleness. The cataclysm of war provided the stimulus for radical reform. It was a momentous achievement and, in spite of early professional resistance to some of the proposals, it was born of a national consensus: everybody wanted the new service to work.

The NHS was based on principles unlike anything that had gone before. It was financed almost entirely from central taxation. That the rich paid more than the poor for comparable benefits was regarded as a crucial part of the scheme. Everyone was eligible for care, even people temporarily resident or visiting the country. People could be referred to any hospital, local or more distant. Care was free at the point of use, although prescription and dental charges were subsequently introduced.

During the current pandemic, there has been immense national and local support for the NHS and its front line workers. The emergence of the Thursday 'Clap for Carers' was a significant experience in the lockdown. Thanksgiving binds communities together, turning 'I' into 'we'. The contribution of carers and key workers who have given of themselves sacrificially needs to be honoured. Sharing stories of people and events during the crisis is likely to form the kernel of any community celebration. Unsung heroes need to be applauded.

Historic role models

The seven critical-care Covid Hospitals have been named after Florence Nightingale, and a post-Covid rehabilitation facility named after Mary Seacole, both prominent figures in nursing history and role models in the NHS.

Florence Nightingale

Florence Nightingale was born in 1820 into a wealthy family. In the

face of their opposition, she insisted that she wished to train in nursing. In 1853, she finally achieved her wish and headed her own private nursing institute in London. Her efforts at improving conditions for the wounded during the Crimean War won her great acclaim and she devoted the rest of her life to reforming nursing care. Her school at St Thomas's Hospital became significant in helping to elevate nursing into a profession.



Mary Seacole

Mary Seacole was a pioneering nurse and heroine of the Crimean War, who as a woman of mixed race is today celebrated as an inspiration for the many BAME people who sustain our NHS. Born Mary Jane Grant in Kingston, Jamaica in 1805 to a Scottish soldier and Jamaican mother, Mary learned her nursing skills from her mother who kept a boarding house for invalid soldiers. She was an inveterate traveller, and be-



fore her marriage to Edwin Seacole in 1836 visited other parts of the Caribbean, as well as Central America and Britain. On these trips, she complemented her knowledge of traditional medicine with European medical ideas. In 1854 Mary approached the War Office, asking to be sent as an army nurse to the Crimea. She was refused, but undaunted, funded her own trip to the Crimea where she established the 'British Hotel' near Balaclava for sick and convalescent officers. She also visited the battlefield, sometimes under fire, to nurse the wounded, and became known as 'Mother Seacole'.



Tomorrowland (12A) Directed by Brad Bird

Stars: Britt Robertson, George Clooney, Hugh Laurie, Tim McGraw, Kathryn Hahn, Raffey Cassidy, Keegan-Michael Key, Thomas Robinson, Chris Bauer, Judy Greer, and Matthew MacCaull

In a Nutshell: A film is all well and good... it entertains nations, makes you chuckle or cry or scream and you have a grin on your face. But a film with ideas, now that can inspire you and challenge you... make you want to go out and do something, or maybe even make the world a better place. Brad Bird has always been a underrated genius of a director, from his animated gems like The Incredibles and Iron Giant not to mention Ratatouille and making the best Mission Impossible movie yet with Ghost Protocol... give him a massive canvas to play with and some serious ideas, and oh boy are we in for something unique. Based on the idea that Walt Disney was preparing the way to build a city that would build on the ideas of tomorrow and feature the best talents and minds from around the world... to say too much about this movie would spoil it's surprises and ideas but it's fuelled by the vision of Disney and the idea of making the future a better place for all. Naturally, the effects are jaw dropping with future scapes and jet packs and flying cars all doing the rounds and so many ideas and gadgets whizzing around, it's a whirlwind of invention and fancy, and add to that a really strong cast including a dependably impressive Clooney and a fantastic turn by newcomer Britt Robertson, plus a sinister Hugh Laurie and you have something truly unique that whilst I guess you can some of it's plot turns and ideas can get a little confused, they still inspire enough and make enough sense to roll you along for the ride and ideas like this and a film like this has to be applauded for trying to inspire and make a difference... I won't say too much at all, but make the trip and you won't regret it.... be inspired to make a change!

In a Nutshell: It's a marriage made in heaven... the directorial mastery of Steven Spielberg matched to the whimsical and magical authored works of Roald Dahl... and that's exactly what this magical and deliciously delightful movie turns out to be. Anchored by two absolutely barnstorming and brilliant performances by the leads.... Rylance in particular completely inhabits and nails the character of the BFG to an absolute tee and definetly deserves that awards recognition that I hope we will achieve so soon after his first win... a captivating and marvellous performance that shines right through the motion capture work and truly dazzles. While Barnhill is just perfect as Sophie... wide eyed and innocent yet still world weary and with her wits about her... its a beautiful portrayal of the character and really anchors the action in a sense of wonder and danger simultaneously. The support cast are fabulous fun and really add to the sense of fun, especially a delightful Wilton as the Queen in the most fun of the sequences here. The sets and the scope and the effects are just a gaggle to behold.... the giants mo-capped by various fun faces are sinister yet humorous yet still chilling and a real threat and menace in the story while all the sequences in Giant Country are astonishing, lending what is ostensibly a typical country backdrop the air of something else entirely more magical and mysterious.... this magical and wonderful movie simply nails every challenge it faces, from the visual to the mental and the acting. It's a true delight, especially if you're a huge fan of either Dahl, Spielberg or simply the story... but still bound to astonish and captivate any newcomers to the party too. You'd be a squiggly jiggy raff to miss it.


