
Come Holy Ghost

Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire And lighten with celestial fire; Thou the anointing Spirit art, Who dost Thy sevenfold gifts impart.


Thy blessed unction from above Is comfort, life, and fire of love; Enable with perpetual light The dullness of our blinded sight.

Parish News

We have loved hearing tales from those who have caught glimpses of royalty when visiting our region (and beyond!) and those who recall the coronation celebrations all those years ago. So many have told us of the whole street gathering around one television to watch the occassion, all crammed into the front room; others' parent's bought a television set just for the event; and many recall their schools' showing the service, with some venturing to the local cinema or cathedral to watch it. We also heard how, over the years, many generations have caught a glimpse of members of the royal family when, for example, the Queen visited Wigan or the time she came to Bryn train station. There was a buzz about the place as schools closed and children lined the streets, all to catch a fleeting glance as the motorcade passed by. Here are some more stories of royal visits and coronation celebrations from members of our parish.

Agnes Yates travelled half way across the world to unexpectedly bump into the Queen. Here is a photo of this chance encounter, so many miles away from home. Agnes says 'I have attached a photo of the Queen taken during a walkabout in Christchurch, New Zealand, on 4th November 1995.



Her Majesty was literally 2 feet away from myself and my husband Ralph. It felt like a great honour to be there and so close to our Queen when we were literally at the other side of the world.

We were in New Zealand for a month long visit to see my late husband Ralph's sister and brother-in-law. They had emigrated to New Zealand around 1960 and this was our very first visit to New Zealand – a 40th wedding anniversary present to ourselves. We didn't know about the Queen's visit to New Zealand when we booked our trip, so it was very much by chance that we happened to be in Christchurch at the same time'.

I was living in Liverpool on Coronation Day, June 1953 and was member of Mossley Hill Parish Church.

My Dad shook me awake at just past 7 o'clock to tell me that Willy Molyneux, the verger at Mossley Hill, was on the 'phone and in a right panic'. I was an ex chorister and also stood in to wind the clock and toll the bell when the regular clockwinder was either sick or on holiday (the clock was built by Messrs Potts of Leeds same as that at St Thomas, Ashton) and I got to know Willy fairly well. He was responsible for looking after the church grounds, the vicarage croquet lawn, the boilers and a hundred and one other things, one of which was to fly the flag on High Days and holidays from the flag pole situated at the top of Mossley Hill Church tower.

'Can you come up to church right away, please? I've lost the line...'

I jumped on my trusty Raleigh Lenton and cycled up the hill to the church where I found the panic stricken verger. Bear in mind he had been to the top of the tower once, had run down and charged round trying to find a telephone box to contact me. What was a mobile in 1953? No way was he brave enough to disturb Rev Perkins!

I remember the day well, the weather was quite cold at that time of the morning, the sun was out but it was windy. The line which the verger mentioned was passed through a pulley at the top of the flag pole and knotted in the middle, the idea being to part the line, put the flag in the middle, right way up of course (we were already distressed) and haul it to the top of the pole.

We were approximately 200 feet up at the top of the tower and the line we required was 25-30 feet above our heads. It was cold and windy. What did we do? Shin up the pole?

Discretion being the better part of valour, we decided to lower the pole which was held firm with a couple of clamps in a vertical cradle. With the clamps released we were then able to lower the pole which was still held in place by a swivel pin making sure that we were not catapulted into the church grounds some 200 feet below. The offending line was then retrieved. We then re-fixed the pole, flew the flag and went home.

Later that day I watched the Coronation on a friend's television where we had salmon sandwiches (probably fish paste) with tea and coffee, not forgetting the crooked little fingers!

I was fourteen at the time and can remember this as if it was yesterday. Peter Smith





On Whit Saturday, 23 May 1953, John and June Davies married at St James' church, Haydock. After the reception at the Fleece Hotel in St Helens, they drove down to Holyhead where they took the train to London. They stopped at a hotel on the Strand which was decorated for the coronation. They stood on a wall to watch it go by and later watched it on a TV in a cafe.

We were recently provided with a copy of St Thomas' magazine from 1953! Amongst the wonderful insight into the past, there was this article regarding the upcoming coronation. I'm sure few then thought this article - and the Queen - would still be as relevant today.

AFTER THE CORONATION

WITHIN a short time of the publication of this leaflet, the preparations for the Coronation will have reached their consummation
and it will be over. Then starts all the work of dismantling the
stands and restoring Westminster Abbey to its former state for its regular
use; the visitors from overseas return home. The tendency will be to say,
"It's all over," and then to settle down in the old way as it was before all
the excitement pulled us out of a rut and gave a fresh impetus to life,

For Her Majesty the Queen the strain of the event will be overand what an exacting ceremony it must be-but her reign has only just begun. Her dedication must be worked out in service to God and to her people. She will need to rely on the strength of God received in prayer and sacrament, she will expect also to count on the help of those who, in a solemn manner, will have paid their homage and pledged their loyalty. We must not let the effect of all this inspiration evaporate, while before us we have the promise of a new day, a new Elizabethan age in which the people of this land, following the example of a gracious and noble lady, fulfil God's purpose for them in their day. To what then are we called?

We are called to pray. As we have prayed for the Queen during the days of preparation so we must continue to pray for her throughout her reign. It is possible that Her Majesty's request for prayer has been the means of starting many a person on the highway of prayer, let us help them to continue on that way. Sustained habits of prayer need a time, a place, and a plan. A time set aside in the morning or evening, or both, must be looked on as a sacred appointment with God if the habit of regular prayer is to be maintained. The place is important in that when a place is assigned to prayer it helps to fix the attention on the task in hand. When I say a place for prayer, I mean a corner of a room, a particular chair, or the

side of the bed, but the place known and recognised as the place where prayer is wont to be made.

Then the plan. Plans for prayer are many and varied and it is wise not to get into a rut; a plan helps a lot. Many books on prayer, such as Dom Bernard Clements' "When ye Pray", give very useful suggestions for planning a prayer period.

We are called to follow a good The Oueen will have come to Westminster Abbey for her Coronation, a very great and im-pressive event, but Her Majesty does not confine her attendance at Church to great and important events; she sets a good example by being present every Sunday. On Monday morning the daily press usually records that the Queen attended Divine Service on Sunday. With all the manifold calls on her time, she might well excuse herself from going to church on Sunday, On the contrary she sets a good example to the whole nation. Would that others in positions of responsibility and leadership were equally consistent in the regularity of their attendance at Church.

Christian people should accept it as a duty that they go Sunday by Sunday to worship God in His House of Prayer. By so doing they themselves will be fortified and in addition they will set a good example to others.

June Holy Days

5th June: Pentecost in Jerusalem

On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of First Fruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, He had risen, and He had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so they waited – on Him, and for Him.

They were not disappointed, for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ's body here on earth. Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now His Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, His body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the Gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their

sins, and to follow Him.



22nd June St Alban, Britain's first Christian martyr

Alban was the very first Christian martyr in Britain - or at least the first we know of. A 'martyr' is someone who has died for the faith - the word literally means 'witness'. He was probably killed during the persecution under the emperor Diocletian in the early years of the fourth century, in the late stages of the Roman occupation of Britain. His martyrdom took place in the amphitheatre outside the Roman city of Verulamium, which is now St Albans, in Hertfordshire.

The church historian Bede, writing 600 years after Alban's death, records that Alban was a Roman citizen (possibly a soldier) who gave shelter to a priest who was being hunted by the Romans. During the priest's stay in his home, Alban was converted to the Christian faith. When the soldiers eventually tracked the priest down, they arrived at Alban's house and insisted on searching it. What they found was Alban dressed in the priest's clothes, while their real prey escaped. They arrested Alban and demanded that he make a sacrifice to the Emperor - a common test of loyalty. He refused. He was then condemned to death and taken into the amphitheatre, which still stands in the fields below St Alban's Abbey, to be put to death. One of his executioners was converted, Bede claims, but the other one took a sword and beheaded him.

He was buried nearby, on a site where a shrine was later erected. In the early fifth century two Continental bishops, Germanus of Auxerre and Lupus of Troyes, were sent to Britain and record that they visited the shrine of Alban at Verulamium. The date of their visit was given as 429.

The martyrdom of Alban is a reminder that Christianity was planted first in these islands during the Roman occupation, though it was all but extinguished in England in the dark centuries that followed, until people like David, Cuthbert and the other Celtic missionaries restored the faith in many parts of the land - especially in the north. The fact that his shrine existed and was venerated right through to the time of Bede also demonstrates that the faith did not die out completely, even in the south of England.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

This month we celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. She is the longest reigning monarch in British history. Up until recently she attended church every week and still did a full week's work at the age of 96!

It is her commitment to serving God and the nation which stands out in her life. Even before she became Queen, she made a promise, which she has kept for over 75 years: 'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service' (21st birthday broadcast, 21 April 1947).

What is the secret of the Queen's consistency of character and service? In 2002 she said this: "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God." These are wise words from somebody who draws her strength from the Christian Faith and can inspire all of us who want to make our lives count!

The Queen has been an example of joyful, wise, and generous service on behalf of others all her life. Six months before her coronation she asked the nation and Commonwealth to "pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life." Paul urges us to pray for all in authority, "that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." (1 Timothy 2:2).




























OTHER PEOPLE FIRST. Read Luke 11.7-11

The wrappings must be removed and deposited in the bins and, of course, the dead flowers removed.

Heath Road Graveyard

Another 20 tons of topsoil was delivered on the 16th May and under the supervision of Graham Bailey, a team of volunteers, in the main comprising of our asylum seeking friends, used the soil to fill some of the many sunken graves. Our thanks to Graham and all who helped.



Over the years we have probably had delivered 10 such loads, although there has been a vast improvement in the state of the graveyard we probably need as much topsoil again to complete the work of filling in all of the graves which have sunk to dangerous levels. It presently costs £360 for a 20 ton load and I don't need to say that donations to assist with the cost and volunteers to spread the soil would be more than welcome, indeed vital.

Africa Fund News

St Thomas and St Luke's Africa fund supports two amazing Christian-run projects in Uganda: Biojemmss (who operate children's homes in Rukungiri and Kampala) plus the Kigezi Diocese Water and Sanitation Project which provides outlying communities with access to clean water and proper sanitation. Both projects play a massive part in saving and changing lives.

Each month, generous donors support the Africa fund with standing orders. Unfortunately, we have lost donors in recent years because people have died, moved from St Thomas' or are unable to continue to give.

We therefore need additional income to maintain our existing levels of giving. In order to give thanks for the generosity of our churches but also to highlight this need for additional donors we held a special service in St Thomas on 8th May. Siân Ball who leads Biojemmss spoke at the service and we also highlighted the importance of the Kigezi Diocese Water and Sanitation Project. JOHN MOULDING, ASHTON CROSS, ASHTON IN MAKERFIELD PART 1

Older Ashtonians may remember, in the 1960's, a small, ruined house that used to stand on the Tithebarn Road corner of Ashton Cross where the rehabilitation centre is today. This was 2 Tithebarn Road and in 1901 was the residence of Thomas Kinder Moulding, his son John and daughter Ethel. Ethel was a mental health nurse at Haydock Lodge Asylum on Warrington Road, after the present Haydock Park Gardens. Haydock Lodge was formerly the residence of the Legh family of Newton. After its demolition the site was used for the Post House Hotel, now the Holiday Inn. John Moulding was born in Wigan in 1879 and by 1901 was working as a groom and coachman in Garswood Hall stables which were next to the Hall owned by Lord William Cansfield Gerard. John was also a trooper/private in the Lancashire Hussars regiment, a volunteer force set up in 1848 by Sir John Gerard in Ashton in Makerfield. At the outbreak of the Boer War in South Africa in 1899 Lord William Cansfield Gerard was the honorary colonel of the regiment. Volunteer regiments, such as the Lancashire Hussars, were not given permission to fight overseas until 1900 when allowed to do so under the name Imperial Yeomanry. However, Lord William Cansfield Gerard was also a serving officer in the Dragoon Guards and was allowed to serve overseas.

In October 1899, Lord Gerard departed for Natal, South Africa, to serve at the staff headquarters of General Sir Redvers Buller who was in charge of all the Empire forces in South Africa. Accompanying Lord Gerard, as his servants, were John Moulding, No. 9056, private, Lancashire Hussars, and Fred Farmer, No. 9057, private, Lancashire Hussars. John, as a groom, was responsible for Lord Gerard's charger/cavalry horse, and riding equipment. Fred was a footman at Garswood Hall and was responsible for Lord Gerard's everyday needs. Fred was originally from Ashford, Kent, and probably worked at Lord Gerard's Eastwell Manor residence at Ashford before being brought up to Garswood Hall. John Moulding served with Lord Gerard in the Orange Free State and Cape Colony and was present at some of the major battles of the Boer War – Belfast, Tugela Heights, Relief of Ladysmith and Laing's Nek. In October 1900 all three returned home.

Lord William Cansfield Gerard died in 1902 and was buried at St. Oswald's, Ashton. As the funeral procession passed through Garswood Hall gates onto Warrington Road the coffin was carried on a Royal Artillery gun carriage attached to a gun which was drawn by four horses of the Royal Artillery Regiment. Behind the gun carriage was Lord Gerard's charger/cavalry horse led by the two men who had served with Lord Gerard in South Africa – John Moulding and Fred Farmer. Both men were wearing long dust coats and wide brimmed sun hats as they had in the Boer War but they were now in black instead of khaki. Lord Gerard was buried in the Gerard vault in the graveyard on the St. Oswald Roadside of the church. Since it was a military funeral three volleys were fired by a firing party at the vault. Today a large stone cross marks the location of the vault.




On Sunday 22 May, St Thomas' enjoyed an all age service, where children and families were invited from school to join in the service.
