



The empty tomb

A central image from the Easter story is the empty tomb. The stone rolled away, the body gone. Jesus is not contained in the prison of the stone-cold cave; he is not imprisoned by death. He is free, alive and unpredictably present in the world.

As we grasp that, we are freed to grasp the central hope and promise of Easter.

The kingdom does not end in defeat. Jesus's story reaches a climax as he bursts through the barrier of life and death.

The tomb is vacated because Jesus is alive and present in the world. And then the energy, the 'dunamis' as the apostle Paul says, the dynamic power that God used to raise Jesus from the dead, becomes available to us in the outpouring of the Spirit at Pentecost. An outpouring that reminds us that God cannot be contained. Not by a tomb, not by a temple, not by a church building. He is alive and present in the lives of those who are working to make a bigger difference; alive, present and recognised in the lives of those who make a bigger difference in His name.

The image of the empty tomb presents a challenge for me and for all who are actively seeking for and praying for the renewal of the church. We see in it the certainty that God is working in the world, that his mission – as Jesus commanded in Matthew 28 – "go make disciples of all" – calls all to be "out there".

So how does this speak to our efforts, our desire, our belief under God that in this Diocese we are called to be a bigger church making a bigger difference? We believe that the Church is

ordained by God as the best way to learn more about what it is to be a disciple. We know Jesus is the Lord of the church and we are called to worship Him and to come to the Father through Him in the Spirit's power. And so we commit ourselves to worship in the fullest sense, offering our whole beings to be that living sacrifice of service that follows the model of Jesus.

And over the centuries we have shaped buildings to help us in this. Some beautiful. Some less so. Some functional. Some that have become difficult to use in any meaningful sense. These are vessels of love - not empty tombs - but sadly they have the potential to be a place that Jesus has left, where we don't feel the presence of the living Lord, where people endure a sterile, unattractive and joyless expression of their faith.

But of course they also have the potential to be much more. To be houses of the bigger church, bursting with energy, hope and presence. Full of those loving the Lord, seeking to love him more, taking risks, falling down and being picked up again. Doing it all in the strength of the Lord. The building not an empty tomb, but a vibrant hub for the community. A place of love and service where people recognise the risen Lord in the Christians that worship there.



Jesus broke free of the tomb once for all, so that God's kingdom would not be contained but would grow through the world. This Easter our joy and our calling in our turn is to release the great news of Jesus' resurrection, sharing His love in all places with all people.

Christ is risen: He is risen indeed. Alleluia!



Letter from the Vicar

There is a mathematical formula for predicting happiness:

$$Happiness\ (t) = w_0 + \ w_1 \sum_{j=1}^t \gamma^{t-j} \ CR_j + \ w_2 \sum_{j=1}^t \gamma^{t-j} \ EV_j + \ w_3 \sum_{j=1}^t \gamma^{t-j} \ RPE_j$$

I'm not a mathematician, so I presume that in this formula our happiness in an event is equal to the sum, product and other mathematical expressions represented by the combinations of

letters! For a 'happiness' total to be the result of the equation then I do know that the letters on the right of the = sign must mean different aspects, thoughts, emotions, expectations, rewards, experiences. The answer by the way from one newspaper headline was that 'The secret of happiness is? Lower your expectations.'



Rather than this idea that if you expect little then what you get will feel good, here's another formula for predicting happiness inspired by a series of daily Bible readings called 'The Happiness Habit':



The habit of happiness = keep your focus on the purpose for your life and not the problems you face; be thankful in all circumstances; rejoice; be sacrificial, think of others before yourself; be trustworthy; value being with others, finding things in common; be generous in all circumstances; be prayerful; know God more and more; give your life away.



Letter from the Vicar

If that sounds a lot like Jesus' story then the formula gets even simpler:

Happiness = following Jesus.

As we approach Easter this year once more, one of the joys as Jesus' followers is to focus on him as a person. We focus on his character and his commitment, the way he lived his earthly life - his joy, triumphs, happiness, grief, sacrifice, and pain. And the ultimate message of Easter - Jesus' rescue, victory and the blessed hope that we therefore inherit through His resurrection.

When we then reflect this back onto ourselves and see how we shape up as followers in the light of this knowledge, surely we see much to be happy about? No complex formulas, no maths, nor even theology, just a life giving relationship with Jesus. Happiness = Jesus. There. Even simpler.

God raised Jesus to life! God's Spirit now lives in you, and he will raise you to life by his Spirit. Romans 8:11





Stars: Brie Larson, Jacob Tremblay, Joan Allen, William.H.Macy, Sean Bridgers, and Matt Gordon

In a Nutshell: Sometimes it's really hard to jump into a review and think how to start it off, so I'll just be able meta and start off by pointing that out. It's also super hard to try and sum up a movie that it's easy to pre-judge.... a movie like this obviously comes with all the baggage of hype and praise, but it also comes with the massive baggage of such a troubling and upsetting subject matter that can lead people to not want to endure what they think this movie will entail... but it's the job of someone like me the reviewer to point out that whilst tough in places and pretty unsettling, this is not the endurance test you might expect, suffice to say it's actually one of the most affirming and uplifting movies you'll see in it's own way as well as pretty harrowing at points too. But it's not that film, the one you think it'll be. But another important factor in how this turns out are the performances and oh boy... the support cast do perfectly solid work, Macy in particular conveying so much through so little in one scene in particular, but it's Larson and Tremblays' show and oh what a show... two of the best performances I might have ever scene tbh, if both don't walk away with both Oscars this year then something has gone amiss, because both are just blinding and terrific in every sense of the word... Larson is just outstanding in what she has to do, but Tremblay in particular is a revelation, the innocence and the sweetness is just heart wrenching and wonderful, possibly the best child performance I have ever seen, he is sure to go far. This is particularly a hard film to talk about to be honest, so I'll say this.... throw away your preconceptions about what it will be but prepare yourself for tough stuff... but do yourself a favour and see this movie, it is a masterpiece! In a Nutshell: Cinema is most certainly the first place you should consider when seeing a film, mainly because you need to see it on the biggest screen possible in the cosiest and comfiest way possible and with all the sound and picture quality to enhance that experience, and like Life of Pi, Avatar and Gravity before it... though much more, The Revenant is that sort of big screen experience that is to be remembered long after... from the epic vistas to the blistering tension and action and through to just the scope of the whole thing. One thing is for sure, it sure is terrific to look at... but beyond that, what about the film itself? Well apart from all that obvious stuff I've already... amazing landscapes, stunning vision and sheer scale... you have a great little cast of familiar faces... from the ever wonderful Will Poulter to the tremendous Domnhall Gleeson, both on the side of good whilst Tom Hardy is utterly magnetic and terrifiying as the sinister Fitzgerland, mover-along of the plot as it were and all round baddie. The main draw as ever though is Leo, once more excelling beyond the call of duty and throwing himself into all matter of deadly situations... he is as terrific as he ever was. This is one of those films that needs to be seen as big as possible to truly do justice to it's scale... but mainly really, this is simply a film that deserves to be seen. Words can't do good to describe what this film is, you" just have to experience the cold and those blistering conditions on the big screen and then, well you'll

never complain about normal weather again after you see what Leo goes through. This is quite simply a terrific piece of cinema... thrilling, slow burning, brutal and compelling.... it's on course for a bunch of awards this year, and I can see all the reasons... it's a truly brutal and dark thriller but one which

Hot Cross Buns.


