



'Your Kingdom come, your will be done'

Peter Whittington, Discipleship Lead, explores the Church Wigan focus for 2022 and the forthcoming Lent series





Jesus offers us 'living water' that gives 'eternal life' (John 4:10-14) and flows with the power of the Holy Spirit in and through our lives (John 7:37-39). Over the last few years we have spent time as Church Wigan considering the 'wells', the places in our communities, where people can come to receive this 'living water' from Jesus. We have thought about the old wells that need unstopping and the new wells that need digging. In 2022 our focus will be on the water that is found in those wells, the 'living water' that Jesus offers us. This 'living water' is the power

of God sustaining our lives and our faith, water that becomes a spring of the Holy Spirit that not only nourishes us but then overflows in our lives to the lives of those around us. They might be very familiar passages, but it is worth reading again the two key passages of John 4:1-42 and 7:37-39. Take a moment to receive again that 'living water' from Jesus and allow the Holy Spirit to refresh you and bubble up within you.

Across the year we will consider in more detail what the 'living water' is and how we receive it. We will spend time thinking about how we drink the living water that we might be sustained in our daily lives as a disciple of Jesus. We will reflect on how we share the living water, recognising that as worshipping communities and as Church Wigan we help one another to drink from the well and also invite others to receive the 'living water' from Jesus. We will examine how we continue to replenish ourselves with the living water, both individually and as worshipping communities. Drinking is not a one-off event, to sustain life we need to constantly drink (think about how many drinks you have during a day and so every week, month, year). For our lives to thrive spiritually and for our faith to remain vibrant we need to consistently drink of the 'living water', regularly receiving the eternal life and the Holy Spirit that will enable our lives to flourish as the people God has created us to be and be fruitful in the purposes he has for us.

What happens next: During Lent there will be a series for all worshipping communities to participate in Drink from the well: 'Your kingdom come, your will be done.'

March Holy Days

1st March - Shrove Tuesday

Ever wonder why we eat pancakes just before Lent? The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting.

So on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven', or absolved from their sins, which gives us Shrove Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this. For the next 47 days, they pretty well starved themselves.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession. Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron, and still holding the pan.

Flipping pancakes is also centuries old. A poem from Pasquil's Palin in 1619 runs: "And every man and maide doe take their turne, And tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne."

Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: eggs stand for creation, flour is the staff of life, while salt keeps things wholesome, and milk stands for purity.

25th March: Lady Day or The Annunciation

This beautiful event (Luke 1:26-38) took place in Nazareth, when Mary is already betrothed to Joseph. The Archangel Gabriel comes to Mary, greets her as highly favoured, tells her not to be afraid, that she will bear a son Jesus, and that her elderly cousin Elizabeth is already pregnant (with John the Baptist).

The church calendar is never quite as neat as some would like it. To celebrate the Annunciation on 25th March does indeed place the conception of Jesus exactly nine months from His birth on 25th December, but the latter part of March almost inevitably falls during Lent. But the birth and death of Jesus are intrinsically linked - He was born to die, and thus fulfil God's purposes.

The Annunciation is a significant date in the Christian calendar - it is one of the most frequent depicted in Christian art. Gabriel's gracious strength and Mary's humble dignity have inspired many artists. Certainly, Mary's response to the angel has for centuries been an example of good faith in practice - humility, enquiry of God, and trusting acceptance in His will for her life.

27th March: Mothering Sunday, 4th Sunday in Lent

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

Thus, Mothering Sunday is about the freedom that we gain through the promise of Jesus Christ delivered through our Mother the Church. People were encouraged to go to their 'Mother Church' (their home church or their home Cathedral) to worship and give thanks. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

Observing Lent

This month sees the start of Lent, the 40-day season of penitence, self-examination and fasting running up to Easter. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and taught His disciples to fast: 'when you fast.' (Matthew 6:17).

The spiritual discipline of fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, refraining from TV, alcohol or social media, and identifying the things that get in the way of our focus on God. What are the benefits of fasting?

The act of giving something up expresses my desire to put God first in my life. it shows me the things that I depend on rather than God, so that I can surrender 'my idols' to Him. It encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God. It gives me space to focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom resulting in a more intimate relationship with Christ: 'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.' (Matthew 5:6).

Fasting enables the Holy Spirit to reveal my true spiritual condition, leading to brokenness and repentance, and a transformed life along with heart that is more attentive and dependent on God.

Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines, eg: joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', giving more time to prayer and Bible study or solitude, and reading a Lent book. Whatever you do, make Lent count this year!

'Jesus takes it for granted that His disciples will observe the pious custom of fasting. Strict exercise of self-control is an essential feature of the Christian's life. Such customs have only one purpose - to make the disciples more ready and cheerful to accomplish those things which God would have done.' (Dietrich Bonhoeffer).

Christian Basics No 3: Why the Cross?

The cross is a picture of violence, yet the key to peace;

a picture of suffering, yet the key to healing;

a picture of death, yet the key to life;

a picture of utter weakness, yet the key to power;

a picture of capital punishment, yet the key to mercy and forgiveness;

a picture of vicious hatred, yet the key to love;

a picture of supreme shame, yet the Christian's supreme boast.

The cross really is the key to everything! Although a horrifying instrument of torture and death, it is also a symbol of love and peace. On the cross Jesus died to deal with the problem of our sin and defeat the powers of death and evil. He identified with our sufferings and set us an example of self-sacrificial love.

As Peter writes, 'He Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by His wounds you have been healed ... Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God' (1 Peter 2:24, 3:18). Jesus died in our place on the cross and took away our guilt, to pay the full penalty for our sin. Access to God's presence is now open to all, symbolised by the Temple curtain being torn in two from top to bottom. The barrier between us and God was torn down in order 'to bring us to God'.

Jesus is the bridge providing access between us and God. 'If Jesus Christ is to be our Saviour then He must be able to place a hand upon a pardoning God and another hand on a penitent sinner and draw them together in an act of reconciliation' (Bishop Handley Moule).

News from our churches

I was immensely sadden by the death of my dear friend and co-church worker Ken Laites. I was however privileged to attend, with some 234 other people, the funeral and celebration of Ken's life. It was a celebration conducted by Rev Mike Greenwood and assisted by another old friend, Rev David Hamlett who gave a eulogy which touched all aspects of Ken's busy and full life from his love of his family, through his working career, his dedicated church life and his involvement for many years in Freemasonry. The church was packed with mourners wishing to pay their respects to the quiet man whose influence was felt by all.

The lovely flowers in church were provided in loving memory of Ken by friends from St Thomas' Flower Guild.

With government restrictions, being removed we are trying to regain something of a pre-pandemic normality. Taking care is, of course, still of the upmost importance. We do hope to see some of our friends who have been avoiding meetings back amongst us and enjoying full fellowship and the teachings of our Saviour Jesus Christ. It has been quite encouraging to hear the chatter of happy fellowship after our services particularly after the Sunday 10.45am service.

I mentioned earlier the death of Ken Laites. Much work by our volunteers goes on quietly behind the scenes week in and week out. As one of our very active volunteers Ken leaves a big hole in the backroom of our church. Until his recent bad health Ken was always available with screw driver and pliers or other necessary tools ready to attend whatever emergency or problem we faced either in church or the church hall. This usually ended up with me at the bottom of the ladder with Ken in action at the top. He will be sorely missed but does need to be replaced along with the many other volunteer jobs needing to be filled. In no order of priority we need the following:-

- I know that looking back to what was is not helpful and we do need to look forward with optimism however I do have concerns regarding our general pastoral care. The burdens places on our clergy by the creation of much larger parishes and reduction in clergy numbers places a much greater burden on the lay members of our congregation. We need volunteers to assume the pastoral roles which as a church we should be providing. In the past there has been a wide range of visiting including hospital visiting and home communion and a general visit just to see how people are coping. This would include the several residential homes in and around our parish. A telephone system was employed when we were in lockdown but now needs personal attention;
- A management team for the Church Magazine, this involves the recruitment of distributors, seeking advertisers and receiving and accounting for the money received from the distributors and supervising the production of the print copies;
- We need volunteers to join the rotas for the provision of refreshments at all our services particularly following the 10.45am service
- To recruit a team of sides people to carry out the duties at the services, such as taking the collection and, when used, handing out the books. Also, with our newly reordered building, taking responsibility for setting out the chairs and tables and, of course, putting them away when not in use. This is a particular blessing when there is a baptism after the 10.45am service and chairs need to be set up around the font. A very important aspect of this work is the welcoming of visitors. We would like to have in place a team with this sole purpose, I saw an example of how important this aspect of our church life is at one of our 10.45am service when a young lady was visiting for the first time but had asked two friends to accompany her because she was new and hadn't been in the building before.
- When it was agreed to reorder the church one of the objectives was to provide an asset available for use by the community. So far there has been little take up, of course in part, due to Covid restrictions. However there has been little publicity and promotion of the benefits offered by the church and its advanced AV system. We need a team to do the publicity, promotion and management of bookings. We also need a team of volunteers to be prepared

to assist in caretaking roles when bookings are taken and perhaps helping provide refreshments. Once established as a community asset, volunteer roles could well be replaced with paid roles.

• One of the more pressing issues is the current state of the Heath Road Graveyard, especially as we approach spring and the growing season. The problems are manifold and require urgent and serious attention. Our appeals for volunteers have seemed, in the main, fallen on deaf ears. We are very grateful for the few hard working volunteers who have bent their backs and got stuck but it needs a larger number if we are to make any real difference. There are avenues to be explored but we need a 'Driver' that is someone to get a grip of the task and look at such ideas as forming a 'Friends of Heath Road Graveyard' which would enable us to look beyond just church members for volunteers. There may well be grants available to help with the upgrade. It is an opportunity to make a real input into the ecology of a green space in our town and make it an area to be proud of.

I implore you to consider whether our Heavenly Father is directing you to offer your help and to seek his guidance in prayer. Please take the time to speak to me or any of our church leaders. I did have received some encouraging good news when Linda and Mansell High confirmed that after praying about it they are happy to take over responsibility for the Leprosy Mission in church.

1883 AN UNUSUAL DEATH AT BRYN

Anyone who has researched a family tree will be aware of the surprising events that are discovered. Here is such an unusual event concerning the death of my great, great grandfather in 1883 as told in "The Wigan Examiner" 4/8/1883 – Death From Hydrophobia (rabies) At Bryn.

"A sad case of death from hydrophobia has occurred in Bryn, the victim being John Fearnley, of The Monk, Landgate Lane, Bryn, coachman to Mr. W. Smethurst, of Landgate House. Some 6 or 7 weeks ago Fearnley, who had daily been in the habit of feeding the animal, was attacked by a large mastiff dog belonging to his master and badly bitten in the lips. Previously the dog had been considered quite harmless and until this occasion had given no evidence of ferociousness. It was shot the following day. Fearnley had his wounds dressed at the time by a medical gentleman in Wigan but has been ill more or less ever since. The affair seemed to prey upon his mind and he has been in consequence much depressed in spirits. Symptoms of hydrophobia appeared on Monday and on Tuesday they distinctly asserted themselves. He rapidly grew worse and died on Thursday afternoon. Towards the last his sufferings were most intense and death to him must have been a happy relief. He was attended by Mr. W. Mitchell Roocroft, surgeon, who did all in his power to assuage the poor fellows agony. Fearnley was about 30 years of age and leaves a widow and young family, for whom much sympathy is felt in the district".

W. Smethurst was the colliery manager for Bryn Hall collieries. Landgate House was a large farmhouse on the right of Landgate Lane just before the railway bridge (now demolished) from Park Lane colliery to the Bryn - Wigan railway line.

About 10 years ago, through family research, I made contact with the descendants of John's brother, Peter Fearnley, in Canada who told me that the story passed down in the family was that John's family suffocated him with a mattress. Even today, with modern medicines, rabies is an agonising death. What must it have been like in 1883 with no pain relief and few medicines available? Given the account in the newspaper article, if the family story is correct, then I think it is understandable.
