

Letter from the Vicar

The work of the church in this age is no different to the work of the church in all ages. We have an ancient calling - to know God and to share God with others.

When we read the book of Acts chapter 18, encountering the apostle Paul's journey to Greece; we may reflect on what resonates with us personally - in Paul himself, or in the task that he obediently undertakes, or the context of the city of Corinth that he is in.

Corinth was an important, prosperous city. The Corinthian people worshipped Greek and Roman Gods. It seemed like a



hard place to share faith. The Bible tells us that Paul arrived 'in weakness with great fear and trembling.' He had faced hostility in other towns.

Paul tried first to share the Gospel in the established worshipping communities – the synagogues. A few

people responded positively, but most rejected his message. In prayer, Jesus told Paul that he should not be afraid – Jesus knew that many of the people were his (Acts 18:9-10).

Paul and the new believers left the synagogue and formed a new worship community of disciples – meeting in one of their homes. Paul led a community of disciples that were not

focussed on the established places and ways of worshipping. They must have, therefore gathered in the community, in homes, in workplaces, in the open spaces.



Letter from the Vicar

He didn't forget the synagogues. Paul's teaching led the ruler of the synagogue to believe - and he was baptised together with his family. Many more people followed them.



Paul's fresh way of worshipping and being community bore much fruit in the city of Corinth, with many people becoming disciples of Jesus.

There are parallels for us as we seek transformation in ourselves, our church and in our communities:

- Paul's obedience to the commission Jesus sets his disciples – to go and make disciples.
- Paul's own fear and trembling at the task.
- The resistance that he finds in the religious establishment.
- The fruitfulness in forming new worship communities.
- Key community leaders coming to faith.
- A vibrant city with many distractions and beliefs transformed by disciples acting out their faith.

For Transforming Wigan see Transforming Corinth.

The work of the church in this age is no different to the work of the church in all ages.

The tremendous effort made by members of the Parish in delivering and collecting the envelopes is greatly appreciated and the resulting effort on behalf of the Charity is one which as a Parish we can be rightly proud. 

Fair Trade needs your Help!



I'm sure that many of you have enjoyed being able to buy Fairtrade goods in our church hall on the first Sunday of the month as it makes it so easy to help people, who have far less than us, support themselves.

All the items on the stall are supplied by Fair 4 All including the float! The boxes just need to be collected beforehand and then returned. There is a real danger that Fair 4 All may have to close and so we would lose our stall too. Please read the article below that they have sent us and think about whether you could spare some time to help to keep them open.

In September 2002 Fair 4 All, Warrington's Fair Trade shop opened for the first time. Set up by Jackie Hancock, Diz Banyard and Hilary Thomson as a not for profit partnership to promote Fair Trade, it traded in a double unit stall on Warrington Market and was staffed by volunteers.

5 years after opening, the shop was given the opportunity to double the unit size and has remained that size ever since also becoming a worker co-operative but still staffed entirely by volunteers. Excitingly, Warrington is to have a new market and Fair 4 All is one

of the stalls hoping to move into that market, as ten years ago, after much hard work and cooperation from Warrington Borough Council, Warrington became a Fairtrade Borough and a Fairtrade borough without a dedicated Fair Trade shop doesn't seem make sense.

However, sadly nearly 14 years of trading has meant many changes in volunteer's lives and as circumstances change so people's availability also changes. Fair 4 All currently has the crisis of a lack

of sufficient volunteers, meaning it is struggling to find enough people to cover the hours required by the market license which are 9am - 5pm Monday to Saturday (particular Saturdays). We are therefore appealing for your help.

Would you or someone you know consider volunteering for 4 hours or more a week or even per fortnight? Fair 4 All is staffed by a friendly team, training is given and though there are no wages travelling expenses are

paid, free hot drinks given and volunteering means that you have the reward of knowing that you are helping other people, who without Fair Trade would find their lives very much harder.







Batman vs. Superman: Dawn of Justice (12A) Directed by Zack Snyder Stars: Henry Cavill, Ben Affleck, Jesse Eisenberg, Gal Gadot, Amy Adams, Jeremy Irons, Diane Lane, Laurence Fishburne, Holly Hunter, and Harry Lennix

In a Nutshell: Easier to cut straight to the chase, it's Batman and it's Superman in the same film! Imagine that, it's like having say Iron Man and maybe The Hulk in the same film.... oh wait a minute! Spiderman and Ant Man? Erm... it's still pretty darn impressive though and worth getting excited about right? Well yeah. Sure it has some fairly big issues going on in it's hefty framework but this is still a bout of excitement and gripping drama all the same. It can't hold a candle to Marvel and their way of wrangling this stuff together, but who can? The good stuff to start with, and beyond expectations (though I always had faith) Ben Affleck is phenomenal as both Bruce Wayne and Batman, a real lost soul with pain and anger burrowing beneath the surface, whilst in her limited screen time Gal Gadot steals it all as Diana Prince aka Wonder Woman. Plus both Jeremy Irons and Laurence Fishburne generate a whole host of charm and sly wit in their moments which are far too few.... plus Amy Adams is always watchable and lovely.

The effects as expected, are fairly awesome and the whole thing looks terrific... director Zach Snyder always being a visual master and the visuals he creates here are spellbinding, from apocalyptic visions of the future to portentous landscapes and fight scenes, the imagery is stunning. And regardless of some wobbles, I found the storytelling quite compelling for the most part, some of the ideas brewing and to come are quite exciting. But then to what doesn't work? For one, Jesse Eisenberg is fairly bonkers as Lex but it does grate fairly fast, while Diane Lane gets cruelly underserved in her role... plus while the storytelling is compelling it's also fairly everywhere at times still.... plus the whole thing basically boils down to trying too hard without going into too many spoilers they are trying too hard to do in one film what Marvel did over years of careful planning and it feels rushed and bloated sadly. Though I'm still intrigued to the future still.... so in the end, is it worth checking out? Most definetly, it's still a great fun time if a bit too epic and overlong and gloomy at times... but it's well worth it all the same to be seen on the biggest screen you can find... it's not perfect but what is. It's still Batman and Superman and that's always going to be awesome....Rating: 7/10

High Rise (15) Directed by Ben Wheatley

Stars: Tom Hiddleston, Luke Evans, Elisabeth Moss, Sienna Miller, Jeremy Irons, James Purefoy, Keeley Hawes, and Reece Shearsmith

In a Nutshell: Whereas it's so simple in a way to sum up Batman and Superman or Zoolander or some films like those... how to sum up High Rise and what's so good about it? It's a film that from the get go, pulls no punches... hurtling you straight into this dystopian nightmare... uncompromising and darkly grim in the most blackest of black comedy ways. Leading you through this maze is the beautiful Tom Hiddleston, never better as the quietly unassuming but troubled surgeon Dr Laing... again Tom puts in a terrific performance, never showy and always quietly charming and smooth. Also in the mix are a very showy and utterly magnificent turn by Luke Evans as Richard Wilder, a bolshy documentary maker who is so Oliver Reed like, his character might as well be called Ollie.... his is a terrifying and dynamic turn, confronting people head on and very very uncompromising, you had a welcome return from Jeremy Irons as the architect of the tower block where the action takes place... Irons as always dripping with charm and sinister menace in the most unassuming way, frail but tactile.

James Purefoy oozes slime as ever, and Sienna Miller is just getting more and more

terrific with every film she's in whilst Elisabeth Moss is quietly tragic as Wilder's neglected wife... all the cast put in terrific turns though, and without going too much into what is contained within this dark treat of a film, suffice to say that it's a terrifyingly prescient look at the struggles between the classes and what can happen when it's left to get out of hand... darkly comic and unflinching in it's vision... this is a true treat that needs to be seen and devoured. It's a trip for the senses and a true visionary masterwork.... **Rating: 10/10**

THE LADY & THE LAMP

On 12th May 1820 a baby girl was born who changed the way that we care for people who are ill. Florence Nightingale grew up at a time when only the worst kind of person became a nurse but she had an idea of the way things could be. Her chance to change things came with the Crimean War.

Florence travelled there with a few others and started work in the military hospital at Scutari where conditions were dreadful: wounded soldiers were left lying in dirt without proper food or care and most of them died. The army doctors already there didn't want Miss Nightingale or her nurses. but gradually they improved conditions. The nurses scrubbed and cleaned as well as caring for the wounded and the soldiers began to recover. Florence Nightingale was called the Lady with the Lamp because she would walk the wards at night, checking on patients. After the war, with the support of Queen Victoria, Florence was able improve hospital care for everyone.


