Letter from the Vicar

Physical things flourish in light; think about how a plant moves towards the source of light when it is in the sunshine on a windowsill. Without light, physical things cannot flourish; think about a large canopy of a forest that is so dense that it shuts out the light below and the forest floor can bear little plant life.



Light is a means of growth and of strength in our own physical bodies. Our bodies are made to create vitamin D from the sunlight that reaches our skin. We need vitamin D to help our bodies to absorb calcium and phosphate from our diet, both are important for healthy bones, teeth and muscles.



The brightness of a light that is turned on in darkness is more than a contrast, it is overwhelming. No darkness can dispel light - from a bright shining torch to a flickering candle, light overcomes darkness.

In the second of the seven `I AM' sayings we read in John's gospel, Jesus says `I am the Light of the world.'

As we think about the physical impact of light in the examples above, when Jesus claims that he is the one source of spiritual light, then we have ready illustrations of what he means.

For us to flourish spiritually, our head, our mind, our heart, our very being needs to be turned towards the source of spiritual light; our lives should not be so shaded from the light that we have no ability or energy to flourish; our spiritual health and vitality is fed and developed by exposure to the Light of the world.





Letter from the Vicar

The aim and intention of God is that each one of us is conformed (or transformed!) into the likeness of his Son - that is our Christian faith journey. Prayer, Scripture, worship, fellowship, service, sharing our faith, simply time with God, are the keys.

We will then shine as lights in the world. A world, so often in darkness, can know the way to flourish, to emerge from the dark, to be healed and itself transformed, when the people of God who have

seen the light, shine Christ's light into the needs of our communities.

A bright torch or even a flickering candle will dispel darkness and offer the light of hope, of the Light of the world.

Messy stations

We decorated a beautiful collage of grapes to show the vine and the bible verse. It's proudly displayed at the back of St Thomas's church, if you'd like a look.

Grape treading is a messy task which changes grapes into juice and wine. This used to be done by treading on them using just bare feet. We used our fingers instead to paint grapes.



The Lego challenge was a popular station particularly with the boys, who loved the building a farm.

We thank God that we have such a variety of foods grown locally.



The food station is always popular. We made wheatsheaf biscuits, creating a wheatsheaf from icing and placing on top of a digestive biscuit. Not many biscuits were taken home, as they were eaten straight away!

Kubo and the Two Strings (PG) Directed by Travis Knight

In a Nutshell: The art of animation is an interesting thing, because there are so many forms it can have ... whether it's the simple hand drawn love of Aladdin or Anastasia, the CGI wonder of Toy Story and Nemo or even the crazy stop motion of Mr Fox or the Giant Peach... it is amazing and covers so much ground. Despite all the great classics in 2D and CGI though, the most fascinating sub section has always been stop motion... from Wallace and Gromit through to Nightmare before Christmas, it's endlessly fascinating and intricate and just plain amazing. One studio that has really plumbed through the amazing depths the format offers is LAIKA, whose previous three efforts: The Boxtrolls, Paranorman and Coraline are all stone cold classics and masterpieces. This their latest, the tale of a young man called Kubo and his rather startling and tense adventures as he dodges the ghosts of his past almost literally.... is simply everything you've come to expect and cherish from the company. From startling and beautiful animation style and design, everything just looks sumptuous and amazing and a sight to behold... the voice cast is top notch with everyone imbuing the characters with the strength and character they need... the themes and plot are super strong and super heartwarming, towing the line between something family friendly and beautiful and the sinister other side of deadly and exciting, these films always have a ton of heart in between the dark subject matter and this is no exception with a super strong

story about the bonds of family and the bond between a boy and his mother no matter what happens. All this elements combine to make another animated masterclass that could be their most accomplished effort to date, if maybe not for me anyway my favourite... which may always be Coraline... but that's such a high watermark anyway. This



is simply put, unmissable cinema both beautiful and daring... one for the whole family with a note of caution... be swept away in this beautiful world and you won't regret it! **Rating: 9/10**

overdone at this point (Goal of the Dead anyone?) that any freshness would be a miracle. Fortunately, that's exactly what this does with maximum amazement, taking the zombie genre and giving it a fresh coat of paint and really making something terrifying yet profound and moving at the same time. A lot of this is down to the stellar cast who really on their A-Game here with Close, Arterton and Considine all just magnificent in different ways whether it's Closes' villain but not really of the piece, the scientist trying to develop a cure at whatever cost, you have Paddy's rough and tough and sinister but actually not that bad soldier and then Arterton's sweetheart at the centre of the action ... a tender soul who flirts with ideas that she shouldn't because she feels sympathy for young Melanie, the real star of the show and a bravura young performance from newcomer Nanua. The ideas and themes contained here are tough and interesting but never at the loss of some real tension and scares also and the idea of the zombies themselves remaining so still for a good period of the action means that tension is high and anyone could go wrong so quickly. With a stunning score, stunning vistas and visuals... a stellar cast and some real high ideas... this is just a masterpiece and a masterclass in moviemaking... combining different elements to really make something unglue and intelligent... who say zombies were dead? Rating: 10/10

St MARTIN DE PORRES

Martin was born in 1579 in Lima. Peru, the son of a former slave. He grew up in poverty and was taken in by a religious order as a servant boy. The monks looked down on Martin because he was mixed-race but in time his behaviour led to the Dominican Order stopping their racial limits on admission and he was made a full brother. He worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor, starting an orphanage and a children's hospital.

During his lifetime he was seen in other places. An African slave said Martin came to comfort him and many others. When the same man later saw him in Peru. he was very happy to meet him again and asked Martin if he had had a good voyage; but Martin had never left Lima.

In pictures, Martin de Porres is shown as a young man with a broom, since he thought all work sacred, no matter how lowly. He is also shown with a dog, cat and mouse, all eating in peace from the one dish.

St Martin de Porres is often shown with mice because. according to one story, the monastery had problems with rodents and decided to put traps out. Martin was so upset that he spoke to the mice and agreed that if they would leave the monastery, he would feed them at the back door of the kitchen. 


