


Funerals

Gratitude for the harvest

Most of us in our earlier years will have been taught how to express gratitude. A 'Thank You' for different things and different happenings in our lives. And around this time of year, we still give that gratitude for the Harvest. This time of collecting food from the land hasn't changed over thousands of years, but as I thought about it, I was still reminded of the old Bob Dylan song, 'The times they are a changing'.

Farmers in Jesus' times would hack away at the corn with a scythe, or cut down other food plantations with similar sharp instruments, and we're always reminded by God that the earth has been given to us for us to use as good stewards so that our children can also enjoy it and give thanks. Farmers in some countries still use the scythe, but I watched a television programme very recently about farmers in our country who have turned to being 'automatics' at Harvest time. These farmers have modern machinery which cuts out lots of laborious sweat, almost doing the whole job at the press of a button.

I saw lettuce being plucked from the ground, put straight onto some farming machinery, and before you knew it, the lettuce was washed, wrapped and ready for the supermarket; Amazing. But a flaw in our nature gives the danger of taking some blessings for granted. When our loved ones are okay, when the house bills are paid for, or when we're feeling healthy; that's a time to be aware and NOT take things for granted. Saint Paul, once he had changed his lifestyle for the better, became very aware of gratitude, often spending the rest of his days telling others about it.

Jesus created his own harvest on a regular basis, gathering people in to listen to Him and reap their own reward. And that reward is more important than any of the crops which are gathered annually. That reward

is a lifetime with Jesus. No scythe or modern machinery can cater for us in that way, and we just need to realize that this same reward is still there, waiting for each one of us today.

So, at this Harvest time, I felt it important for us to remember that we are ALL disciples for God. We're really grateful for our farmworkers, but we don't have to be farmers to spread God's word. God, and the farmers, collect the Harvest in, but we should always be ready to plant the seeds. And we're not just talking of seeds for our fields here; We're talking about planting God's word everywhere we go.

After bringing in the Harvest, the farmers can refresh themselves and get ready for the next job in hand. And so, as Autumn slowly brings itself upon us, with lower temperatures, more rain and hopefully some sunshine, as we refresh ourselves, I'll just give another reminder about gratitude. Quite often, as we pray and listen out for God; All He wants to say is "Don't worry, I'm right there with you." And so, wherever we go, enjoy that place; Whoever we speak with, enjoy their company; And if we can get to church to spend time with God, let's give Him the gratitude that He deserves. 'The times they are a changing'. But God isn't.

Farewell and thanks from Flic & Sam

As many of you will have heard by now, in a few short weeks we will be ioining a L'Arche community in Mobile. Alabama for a year. Our final Sunday in the hub will be Sunday, 13th October. L'Arche communities are places where adults with and without learning disabilities live together in relationships of mutual respect and belonging, in an attempt to embody the values of the beatitudes and be a sign of God's love for the world. Since we first became 'Sam and Flic' we have felt a call to live together as assistants in a L'Arche community, and have prayerfully discerned this as the next step in our journey. Many of you will know that we believe deeply in the need for churches to walk with those who are hurting and marginalised, and to be formed by them to witness more clearly to the love of God. As our time as curates draws to an end, we are looking forward to the opportunity to walk closely with such a community as part of our priestly vocation, as well as to learn from and minister within another part of the Anglican Communion (the Episcopal Church) on a nonstipendiary basis.

We feel the joys and challenges of Mobile, and the Deep South, will be an interesting context in which to develop in our ministry before returning to the UK. The community that we will belong to has worked for many years to be a sign of racial reconciliation in a divided city. We know we have much to learn from them.

We are really grateful for our time in South Hub and for all that we have learned from so many of you as we have begun our ordained ministry among you. We are immensely thankful for your partnership in ministry, for your prayers, encouragement and grace. We are also grateful to Jer, our Training Incumbent, and know that you will continue to support and uphold him in prayer as he leads the hub over the coming months.

There will be so much that we shall miss. Paul writes to the Philippians, 'every time I think of you, I give thanks for you'. We know that as we remember you and pray for you in the years to come, we will be drawn again and again into thanksgiving for all that you are becoming in Christ.

in Ashton and will be greatly missed. As curates we have known that they will, at sometime, be moving on. This being so I am sure that you will all join me in expressing our thanks for their service here amongst us and at the same time expressing every best wish for their futures please uphold them in your prayers.

Transforming Wigan

At the meeting held by the Church Commissioners held at the Edge on the 4th September they heard evidence for and against the approval of the Diocese of Liverpool's proposals for the new structure of the church in Wigan. After considering both the written evidence and the passionate and sometimes emotional oral evidence a decision was taken to give formal approval as the best way forward for Wigan. At the time of writing we await the written judgement. It is recognised by the Diocese the hurt felt by those who didn't agree. Bishop Paul has said "that the process has shown one important thing for us as Christians is to keep listening to one another as we go forward together. We will be arranging further ways to do this in due course."

I am sure that you will all have realised that the departure of Sam and Flic places a considerable burden of responsibility on Jeremy and our other worship leaders, particularly with the replacement for Sian not yet in place. In simple terms we all have a responsibility to care for Jeremy and for each other. I am sure that there will be help from other clergy in the deanery but we can help, firstly by accepting that for a short time there must, of necessity, be some changes in our patterns of worship with Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services a particular challenge. Secondly by getting behind and supporting our lay leaders as they do their part in getting us through this testing period.

The Film Review



Once Upon a Time in Hollywood (18)

Directed by Quentin Tarantino

Stars: Leonardo Dicaprio, Brad Pitt, Margot Robbie, Al Pacino, Kurt Russell, Timothy Olyphant, Dakota Fanning, Bruce Dern, Luke Perry, Emile Hirsch, Zoe Bell, and Nicholas Hammond

In a Nutshell: It's safe to say that when the latest Quentin Tarantino movie rolls into town, excitement is always at a high and we're always treated to finding out what number movie of his it is too in all the promotional materials, plus it's usually really really long now as well. With all that said, here comes Once Upon a Time in Hollywood. Featuring a huge plethora of massive stars including plenty of QT's regulars, led by Leo Dicaprio and Brad Pitt as film star Rick Dalton and his stunt double Cliff respectively. Both actors are utterly terrific as can be expected, with this ranking amongst some of Pitts finest screen work and that's saying something whilst Leo is just top notch in everything he touches anyway. Margot Robbie has less to do in a major role, but makes a sweet and simple impact all the same with just a handful of scenes. The supporting cast is bolstered by a ton of familiar faces popping up here there and everywhere and they range from the excellent (Kurt Russell and Zoe Bell as a married stunt person duo, and Bruce Dern as an elderly ranch hand) to the not so wonderful (Lena Dunham as a motherly hippie or Damian Lewis looking nothing like Steve McQueen in a pointless scene) but they all work well to sell the story and the atmosphere. The biggest thing that I most admire about this movie is how it just takes it time and lets you hang out with the characters and then proceeds to strengthen the characters and the film in the process by helping everything feel really lived in as it just lets you swim in the story as it takes place. Amongst QT'S oeuvre, this isn't quite the total top of the litter but it's a mighty fine work that cements his place as one of the coolest and most exciting directors still working today. Especially one with an ending as dynamic and poignant as the one concocted here, do not miss this!

In a Nutshell: If there's been any great theme this year apart from horror remakes and superhero movies then it's certainly been movies lead by artists and their music or even by actors and actresses leading the soundtrack as in Wild Rose, but following on from Bohemian Rhapsody and Queen and Rocketman and Elton John: comes this beautiful and sweet tale inspired by the music of Bruce Springsteen, but not a biopic like the rest of them but more of a tale that takes it cue from the inspiration of the wonderful music. Focusing on one young Pakistani teenager growing up in Luton in the 1980s and how his life which seems to be going nowhere is suddenly turned around when he hears the music of Springsteen and suddenly his eyes are open to the possibilities of the world around him and what he can accomplish. Featuring a more or less unknown cast of outstanding young and old performers with a few nice supporting roles from the wonderful likes of Atwell and Brydon amongst others... this film will just leave you beaming forever, with themes both tough and uplifting and of course that wonderful wonderful music. It will inspire you and challenge you and leave you smiling... sure it's not a pitch perfect classic but at what it does it's just fantastic and is well worth the journey it takes you on.... Take the trip down Thunder Road and be inspired.



The borders are flooded with those seeking asylum and refuge from harm Wake up church; your time is coming


The flora and fauna is slowly being depleted and extinction rates mounting Wake up church; your time is coming


