Letter from Izzy

News from our churches

It is with great delight that I pen a few words for the October Magazine an edition that I never thought would see printed. I will be ever thankful to Jess Bradley who has stepped forward as our new editor to keep up what is a valued and long standing tradition of St Thomas and St Luke's churches, a monthly magazine. Now to more mundane matters but none the less a vital consideration having regard to present circumstances.

YOUR GIVING MATTERS NOW, MORE THAN EVER



The present corona virus pandemic is having a serious effect on the financial position and vision at St Thomas's and St Luke's. Our church is dependent on the your generosity never more so than now. We are doing everything we can to offer help to those who need it through our through our support of the asylum seekers and the ACT Food bank and at the same time to con-

tinue to provide all of the functions of an active parish church. As a part of the Deanery of Church Wigan we have a commitment to meet our portion of the parish share as well as meeting the regular expenses of a large parish. In addition to one off donations we do need to take the opportunity to renew our giving. Each of us can ask the Lord how we can give financially as part of St Thomas'. This may be the opportunity to begin a regular pattern of giving, or to review and increase the amount we can contribute to the life and work of our church

We need your support so that we can continue with our work here in the community of Ashton in Makerfield. **Everything** we do at St Thomas and St Luke is made possible by your giving and we Thank You.

There a number of ways in which you can provide the support that we depend upon:-

- Firstly and the most helpful is by making a regular donation through your bank account to our account with the Parish Giving scheme. A payment is taken from your account on the 1st of each month and is then credited to our church account on the 15th. The real benefit to the church relates to those who pay tax as we receive each month the gift aid on you donation. That is 25p added to every pound of your donation, a life blood to our finances.
- Secondly you might consider a one off donation either to our general fund or to a specific restricted or designated fund such as the Fit For the Future appeal. The donation can be made either by cash or cheque, handed in at the Vicarage. at my address 32 Townfields or by a donation online through our webpage.

If you have been accustomed to using freewill envelopes given in at the weekly service we are now receiving the envelopes again at the Vicarage or 32 Townfields.

As we continue in a state of suspense so far as our normal church activities are concerned I do feel that there are some situations which you should be aware of.

Services in a very limited form have been held at 9.30am on Sunday for some weeks and a monthly communion service as part of this worship time is planned. Notwithstanding the new restrictions on meeting together funerals and weddings can still take place albeit with small numbers attending.

The church hall is being used again in a limited way for the exercise classes which are still permitted.



To comply with the necessary requirements of the church insurers it has been necessary to obtain amongst others a certificate in respect of our gas supply. This involved an inspection of the antiquated gas boilers which sadly were condemned meaning that until we complete the new heating scheme there will be very limited heating in church. That said we are hoping too make early progress with the scheme with tenders for the work expected shortly.

We do of course still need to raise the funds to pay for the work. The PCC have agreed to the sale of Greenfields Crescent which will help but not until a sale is completed. If you have not yet donated to the fund then it goes without saying that you help in this respect would be greatly appreciated.

Edith Cavell

Edith Cavell is a good saint for NHS workers this year: she cared for the sick despite the danger to her own safety.

Edith was a vicar's daughter from Swardeston in Norfolk, where she was born in 1865. She became a governess, but her heart was for nursing, so she went on to train at the London Hospital, before nursing in various hospitals such as St Pancras and Manchester.



When Edith was 42, she decided to go abroad, and was appointed matron of a large training centre for nurses in Brussels. She was still there seven years later, when the First World War broke out and German troops invaded Belgium on their way to Paris and the Channel Ports.

Edith's nursing school became a Red Cross hospital, and she turned down the opportunity to return to the safety of England. Instead, her nurses tended wounded soldiers from both German and Allied armies.

Sadly, in 1915, when the Germans began their occupation of Brussels, they took a dim view of Edith's work. But they would have been even more unhappy had they known she was helping to smuggle 200 British soldiers across the border into the Netherlands!

Finally, the Germans arrested Edith in August 1915, and put her into solitary confinement. They tricked her into confessing to a charge which carried the death penalty. But Edith refused to show either regret at what she had done, or any fear or bitterness towards her captors.

On 11th October 1915, the night before her execution, Edith was visited by the Anglican chaplain to Brussels, the Revd Stirling Gahan. Together they said the words of *Abide with Me*, and Edith received her last Holy Communion.

She told Gahan: "I am thankful to have had these ten weeks of quiet to get ready. Now I have had them and have been kindly treated here. I expected my sentence and I believe it was just. Standing, as I do, in view of God and eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness to anyone."

Edith was shot by a firing squad next day, on 12th October 1915.

After the war her body was exhumed and buried in Norwich Cathedral. Her memorial service in Westminster Abbey attracted thousands. A commemorative statue of her stands near Trafalgar Square.

In the book of Proverbs we encounter Wisdom in two ways. The first is as a quality we should all aspire to acquire, through its many Proverbs and sayings, especially about human nature and relationships. The second, and the one we find here, is Wisdom personified as a woman. We find her in the streets and at the crossroads calling out to us to follow the paths of righteousness. She is an essential part of God's creative and ordering role. Created by God but with him from the beginning of creation.

In some ways she characterises the feminine side of god, a creative and ordering role but also an ethical one. Wisdom allows us to understand our role on earth and how our actions affect what God Created. Here it shows us that to get wisdom is part of the order and design of God's universe, allowing us to under-



Jesus was also with God at creation and when he appeared to us, he becomes Wisdom, as stated in John's gospel chapter 1.1-2.

'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God.'

The lockdown and being furloughed from work has given me opportunities to appreciate the beauty of God's world on my doorstep. As part of my exercise walks I have been photographing the beautiful scenery surrounding me, and posting them on a WhatsApp group for some of our hub worshippers who are shielding and unable to get out themselves.

I live in Aspull and have found lots of different routes around Aspull, Haigh, New Springs and Whelley. It has been wonderful to see the beauty of God's creation on our doorstep and to have the time to appreciate the changes in seasons.

The other thing that is evident, is that the effects of our industrial past can be rectified. There are quite a few coal slag heaps around Aspull, the largest, known locally as 'The Woochie'. These are now covered in trees and full of wildlife and fauna. Capped mine airshafts are surrounded by flowers.

The old railway line, that used to carry coal into Wigan along the edge of the Haigh Plantations, is now a scenic public footpath that takes you towards Wigan, crossing the cleaned up Leeds/Liverpool Canal. Other people have had the same idea and the local Facebook groups have been full of wonderful pictures of the Wigan flashes, the spectacular sunsets we've been having and deer swimming in the canal.

Yet there is still a lot to be done, nationally and internationally. Climate change is with us but maybe if we each look after and care for our own environment as God's Wisdom asks us to – recycling, watching our fuel and energy consumptions ,both in our homes and cars and trying to avoid single use plastics where we can – we can all make a difference.

Educating people internationally on what affects the environment is also a way forward, encouraging the use of green energy sources. Stopping the destruction of the rainforests, knocking down and returning former Industrial sites to nature instead of leaving buildings empty and derelict. The list goes on.


Time may be against us but seeing the restoring effects of nature that have happened globally during this lockdown on our environment has hopefully made us realise that the pollution we create cannot continue.

He gave us eyes to see them: 'St Francis of Assisi preaching to the fish'

On 4th October we give thanks for one of the most loved saints in the church - Francis of Assisi. He died in 1226, but his example and witness have lived on to inspire Christians through the centuries.

His was a life focused on the crib and the cross, Lady Poverty and the stigmata, suffering and transfiguration. But also, it was a life marked by a deep love of creation: St Francis had a special nearness to all creatures great and small. As we read the stories of Thomas of Celano, we learn how he tamed a wolf in Gubbio, how swallows would chirp and fly around his head, how lambs would come close and gaze with delight, how his faithful donkey wept as the saint approached death, and in this month's painting, how fish would come to the shore to hear him preach.

Thomas relates how Francis returned some fish that had been caught to the water, telling them not to be caught again. They lingered near the boat, listening to the saint until he gave them permission to leave.

The sermon to the fish is portrayed in this work by Luc-Olivier Merson, a French artist who lived from 1846 to 1920. He is better known for his work with designs for banknotes, postage stamps, and the basilica of Sacré - Coeur in Montmartre. Here in this canvas, we see St Francis with followers young and old, a faithful dog and the fish at the water's edge.

What was the saint telling them? I think that they were loved and valued as part of the rich tapestry of God's creation, and they must return that love. It is the mood of the Benedicite where all things that move in the earth, the skies and the seas are exhorted to praise the Lord and magnify him forever. St Francis captures that mood in his own Canticle of the Sun.

In the weeks and months of lockdown many of us have had the time to look afresh at our relationship with the world of nature as we have journeyed through the seasons of spring and summer. We have learnt to wonder at the

richness and variety of creation. We need to take that lesson into the 'new normal' as restrictions are gradually relaxed. The clock and the complexity of life may easily take over again, but St Francis is inviting us to journey with him in simplicity and joy as we praise God with all His creatures:

'Let all things their Creator bless and worship Him in humbleness.'

Bill and Ted Face the Music (PG)

In a Nutshell: If like me, you grew up watching and loving the Bill and Ted movies (I personally first saw Bogus Journey back in the 90s and it



became a regular favourite before going back to watch Excellent Adventure and of course loving that too) then the news that after more or less 30 years that Alex and Keanu would be returning with the two most excellent heroes for a new bodacious adventure, well that was most excellent indeed. Well the movie has finally arrived in these most uncertain of times and in the UK at least has been one of the only movies to go see on the biggest screen you can. So, with this most welcome of news. I went along very excited to rock along once more; and I can say right now that I enjoyed every single moment. Yeah, it's ridiculous in every sense.... The plot is completely mad and not every joke really lands. But if you're a huge fan like me, then you'll already be familiar with these guys and go along with them all the same and kinda know that this is exactly the sort of adventure you're in for with these two. So yeah, it's ridiculous and silly beyond compare, but if you're surprised by any of this, then I wonder why you've come to see a Bill and Ted movie. Special mention has to go to Anthony Carrigan who is pitch perfect as a killer robot with a bit of a flaw and Weaving and Lundy-Paine as the daughters of our heroes who are simply terrific and deserve their own series of adventures now. Honestly I don't believe this needs the hard sell, if you're a big fan of the Bill and Ted movies then you'll have a great time and if you're not then this surely isn't going to change that... but anyone who isn't struck with a sense of real poignancy come the final musical act, then I do wonder if you need to check your heart is still beating somewhat. In the end, the feeling of reuniting with these two and going on another excellent adventure... well it is most excellent!

The New Mutants (15)

In a Nutshell: If you're even vaguely familiar with the inner workings of movie land or if you generally follow movie news and release dates, then you'll know that this very movie has had a troubled history to say the least... first due for release back in 2017 as a spin off from X-Men: Apocalypse and the various X-Men movies; it's since been delayed and delayed and delayed and was finally due for a cinematic release back in April when disaster struck once more and it looked like we'd never see this movie get its due.

Now the X-Men saga over at Fox has come and gone and finished with the dud that was Dark Phoenix last June, this is now only a vague tie in to the X Universe as there is not much cinematically to tie into at the moment and is its own unique beast (pun very much intended) and is finally getting a chance to shine if very limitedly due to diminished numbers in people willing to visit a cinema, but still a big cinema release nonetheless and you'd think after such a troubled history that this would be a bit of a messy thing indeed... but actually it's pretty darn good. Taking the idea of mutants in a school that are struggling with their powers and going full horror with that concept wields a moody and exciting piece that showcases some fantastic young talent and some pretty cool effects and while the way they try and weave it into the further world of the X-Men whilst actually trying maybe not to anymore (the references to the further world of the franchise are considerably downplayed somewhat now) is a bit here and there... this is a chilling ride and features utterly mesmerizing turns from Williams, Taylor-Joy and Heaton for starters whilst Braga, Hunt and Zaga are all on solid form too. You'll probably see reviews going for the kill considering its troubled history and saying how it's a mess and wasn't worth the wait and so on... but this really isn't true. Sitting down to finally see this, I wasn't sure what to expect and I really really enjoyed every moment. These are characters that I really hope to see more of in the future and because of the troubled production and likely limited box office it's such a shame that we likely won't get to see much more now going forward. While you have the chance, seek this out and give it a go... I have a feeling you'll be very pleasantly surprised.

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



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
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Ephesians 2.10

I'm sure that we can all think back to the awe and wonder we have felt looking at a new born baby. At the tiny versions of our hands and feet. The movement in their limbs and their chest moving up and down as they breathe in and out. Their vulnerability and their dependency. Our overwhelming love for them.

I heard someone describe this moment to a new dad who was not a Christian at the time but who recognised its spiritual significance, as a 'creation moment', when we are in wonder of God's handiwork.

We are all born with so much potential. We are all born to be in relationship with God, and it is in him that we find our inspiration. I love Tom Wright's reflection that "It is as though we are all born with a musical score inside us, but it is only when we meet with Christ that we know how to play it."

Every new-born baby has potential for greatness, and we get enormous pleasure in watching those we love grow and develop into little people. But seeing them develop spiritually brings a new dimension of joy.

However, the reality is that so many live lives without knowledge of the truth and the miracle of God's ongoing creation, and the harmony this would bring to their lives. They are missing out on the re-creation we find in Jesus, when, through our faith, we are lifted out of spiritual lifelessness, born again and re-mastered by God

For God's kingdom to come here on earth, in our nation, in our deanery, transformed people are needed, who realise their potential to be as he intends

It is as we carry out the good works that are God's plan for us. As people see God working through us.

As we encourage, challenge, love and bring hope to people around us.

As we nurture people spiritually and support their spiritual growth. As they find their purpose in Christ,

that our towns will be transformed and God's kingdom be seen.

We pray Lord for awareness of the work you have planned for us, for your Holy Spirit to equip us and for us to draw others close to you.
