

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A Strong Hold


Should I slip and lose the way The Lord will hold me fast, Should I choose to walk away I'm firmly in His grasp.

A Letter from Eth

I have just opened my e-mails and have seen a message from Jess asking me to do this letter for September's magazine. I seem to remember I did this at the same time last year and at that time I was sat looking through 'Fret' at Seahouses in Northumberland.

Well this year we are sat looking at a beautifully cut patch of land with trees beyond, in Kelso in the Scottish borders.

Our caravan has been our home for the last few weeks, we went to BB/GB camp in it, that was in Caerwys North Wales and now we are in Scotland. Our van gives us the freedom to choose where we go and what we do, that's if we can find a place to have us! We use Camping and Caravan club 'fields', which are always basic, but fine for us.

On Sunday we went to the local church in Kelso. September High & Holy Days

4th September St Birinus, apostle of Wessex

Did you ever feel that God was calling you to do something big for Him, even though you were not quite sure of the details? If so, Birinus is the saint for you.

He was a French Benedictine monk who in 634 was made a bishop at Genoa, and sent by Pope Honorius 1 to extend the evangelisation of England. (Augustine had arrived in Canterbury about 35 years before.)

Birinus landed at Hamwic, near Southampton. His original plan was to evangelise Wessex and then penetrate up into the Midlands, where no preacher had ever yet reached. But Birinus soon found the West Saxons so pagan that he decided to concentrate just on them.

Birinus had little to help him become the apostle to Wessex. So, he simply used what he did have: his own two feet and his voice. He wandered around preaching at every opportunity, trusting in God to help him. And He did: Birinus became known and respected, and soon a big breakthrough occurred: for political reasons the King of Wessex, Cynegils, wanted to convert to Christianity, and he asked Birinus to help him.

So Birinus instructed and baptised King Cynegils, who was then able to marry the Christian king of Northumbria's daughter, Cyneburg, and in due course Birinus baptised their family as well.

In return, Cynegils gave Birinus the town of Dorchester (upon Thames) to be his diocesan see. It was a perfect location: a Romano-British town right on a road and a river, in the midst of a populated area.

During his 15 years as Bishop of Dorchester, Birinus baptised many people and built churches all over the area, with the king's blessing.

Before he died in 650, Birinus dedicated a church at Winchester. It was a glimpse of the future: for Winchester's growing importance made it inevitable that in time it would also become the ecclesiastical centre of the kingdom.

26th September Wilson Carlile, founder of the Church Army

Wilson Carlile was born in Brixton in 1847 and did not set out to become an evangelist. Instead, he was brilliant at both languages and music, and excelled as a businessman. That is, until an economic recession and serious illness brought him crashing down and finished his career, aged only 31.

Not surprisingly, a serious breakdown followed, when Carlile questioned everything that he had been attempting in life. This search for a new meaning brought him to faith in Jesus Christ, and so turned his world upside down. He later wrote:

I have seen the crucified and risen Lord as truly as if He had made Himself visible to me bodily sight. That is for me the conclusive evidence of His existence. He touched my heart and old desires and hope left it. In their place came the new thought that I might serve Him and His poor and suffering brethren.

Wilson approached two Christians whose passion for ministry was already well known: the Americans evangelists Moody and Sanky, who were at that time in England. Wilson attended their meetings and supplied music via his harmonium. In return, he learned a lot about effective outdoors evangelism.

Carlile then prepared himself for a life of ministry. He was confirmed into the Church of England, studied at the London College of Divinity, ordained in 1880 and served his curacy at St Mary Abbots in Kensington. But Carlile wanted more than comfortable parish life, and soon began outdoor preaching again. He wanted to reach the poor, unchurched, of the community.

Carlile left Kensington to work in a slum mission, and by 1882 he was busy uniting the local Anglican parish missions into one organisation. Here his business skills in planning and organising proved invaluable, and soon he had founded the 'Church Army.' He then founded two training colleges, to train both men and women evangelists. After slight hesitation, the Church of England agreed to incorporate the Church Army into its structure, and even created the office of Evangelist for the Church Army captains and sisters.

In the years that followed, Church Army has done great work in evangelism, as well as in social and moral welfare. It helped support the troops during World War 1. Carlile remained honorary chief secretary until retirement in 1926. He died in 1942.

Feel the tug

Have you ever wondered how you can be certain about who and what God really is? One Christian put it this way: "I'm reminded of the story of the little boy who was out flying a kite. The wind was brisk and large billowing clouds were blowing across the sky. The kite went up and up until it was entirely hidden by the clouds. Then a man came by and asked the little boy what he was doing, staring up at an empty sky. "I'm flying my kite," he replied.

The man replied: "What kite? How can you be sure it is still there? You can't see a thing."

The little boy agreed that he could see nothing, "but every little while I feel a tug, so I know for sure that it is still up there and is connected to me!"

When it comes to God, you don't need to take anyone else's word for it. You can find Him for yourself by inviting Jesus Christ into your life. Then you too will know, by the warm wonderful tug on your heartstrings, that though you can't see Him, He is up there, and that He lives in you. You are connected!

Considering the choosing of Matthew

Saint Matthew the tax collector

Jesus saw a man named Matthew sitting at the tax collector's booth. 'Follow me,' He told him, and Matthew got up and followed Him. (Matthew 9:9).

This month we remember Matthew's call as one of Jesus' 12 apostles. It consisted of a simple invitation, 'Follow me', and an immediately response. The resulting meal at Matthew's house also helps us to understand the challenge of His call.

Jesus' welcome:

At the dinner many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with Him and His disciples (10). Jesus welcomed each person unconditionally, in a way that most Jews would not! In the same way, Jesus welcomes us and shows us how we should welcome others. Our welcome cannot be conditional, expecting people to be like us or to behave as we expect.

Jesus' challenge:

When the Pharisees saw this, they asked His disciples, 'Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?' (11). The Pharisees were upset and avoided sinners, because they believed only the pure and untainted could have access to God. However, Jesus reminded them that they were witnessing God's love in action: 'It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but those who are ill.' (12). When God is at work in the lives of those we don't expect, we need to let Him open our hearts to embrace and encourage what He is doing.

Jesus' compassion:

But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners. (13). The Pharisees were so committed to keeping the law, that they had forgotten God's heart of compassion. Our religious practice is meaningless without love and mercy towards others. In what ways can we express love towards others, especially those outside the community of faith?

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



Another glimpse into the history of our town prepared by our resident historian David Fearnley.

Enter the Warrington Road graveyard through the gate in Heath Road, pass the Garden of Rest and proceed on the path towards Violet Street. To the rear of the first graves on your left, the Stock family, are two very large gravestones 8 feet long, 4 feet wide and 6 inches deep with "Edleston of Haydock" inscribed on the sides laid flat on the ground.

Gravestone 1 -In Memory of John Boardman, of Haydock, who departed this life March 3 1865, aged 65 years. Also John Edleston, late of Crewe in the County of Chester, who departed this life at Haydock, May 31 1894, aged 75 years. Also of Mary Edleston, of Haydock, who departed this life October 11 1894, aged 79 years.

John Edleston, in the above grave, was baptised 20/9/1818 at St. Thomas', Ashton, a son of John Edleston, blacksmith and farmer, and Elizabeth/Betty Edleston (Boardman) of Haydock, who married at St. Oswald's, Winwick, in 1812. John Edleston snr. was baptised 12/9/1788 at St. Thomas', a son of Thomas Edleston, blacksmith, & Hannah Edleston (Worrall), who married at Prescot Chapel, St. Helens in 1779. Elizabeth/Betty Boardman was baptised 22/1/1792, at St. Thomas' a daughter of Henry Boardman.

John & Betty Edleston (Boardman) had 11 children including Mary, born 1815; John, born 1818; William, born 1823; and Betty, born 1826, all baptised at St. Thomas'. Elizabeth/ Betty Edleston (Boardman), of Haydock, died 1827 and John Edleston, her husband, died in 1861, both were buried at St. Oswald's, Winwick.

Until 1852 John Edleston, born 1818, blacksmith, lived with his siblings at Haydock Stocks, Haydock. In 1852 John Edleston moved to Crewe to work as a blacksmith in the railway engineering works.

19/5/1852 at St. Michael's, Coppenhall, Crewe, John Edleston, engine smith, married Mary Clarke, milliner & dressmaker, of Church Street, Ashton in Makerfield. In 1853 their infant son John, was buried at St. Thomas', Ashton in Makerfield. In 1857 their only child, John, was baptised at St. Thomas', Ashton.

Mary Edleston (Clarke) died 1879, aged 60. John Edleston remained in Crewe until c1893 when he returned to Haydock and where he died in 1894, aged 75. John was buried in the above grave with his sister, Mary Edleston (1815 – 1894) and his uncle John Boardman (1799 – 1865) the brother of John's mother Elizabeth/Betty Edleston (Boardman).

Gravestone 2 - In Memory of John Harrison, of Haydock, who departed this life May 30 1888, aged 62 years. Betty his wife, of Haydock, who departed this life February 19 1900 aged 74 years. William Edleston who departed this life February 12 1900 aged 77 years

7/2/1865 St. Thomas', Ashton, John Harrison, 39, farmer, of Haydock, married Betty Edleston, 39, of Haydock, father, John Edleston, deceased. Betty, born 1826, was a daughter of John & Elizabeth/Betty Edleston (Boardman) and sister of John Edleston, born 1818. After their marriage John & Betty Harrison lived at Haydock Stocks, Haydock, and later in Penny Lane, Haydock.

John Harrison died 30/5/1888 and was buried in the above grave at St. Thomas', Ashton. After John's death, Betty Harrison (Edleston) lived on Rams Head Terrace, Haydock, with her sister, Mary Edleston and brother William Edleston.

Betty Harrison died 19/2/1900 and was buried with her late husband at St. Thomas', Ashton. Betty's brother, William Edleston, died 12/2/1900 was also buried in the grave. Mary Edleston died 11/10/1894 and was buried in the above grave of her late brother John Edleston.

The Edleston name has been long established in the area – in the 1600's in Billinge and Winstanley and from the 1730's in Haydock & Ashton. At Bryn in the 1840's there was an Edleston Lane which ran from Bryn Cross to Soughers Lane and which is now Downall Green Road. There was an Edleston Lane Farm on the right side of Edleston Lane mid-way between Bryn Cross and Soughers Lane. Today there is an Eddleston Street at Rose Hill, Bryn.

John Edleston, born 1818, was a blacksmith as were his father and grandfather. Thomas & Hannah Edleston (Worrall), the grandparents of John Edleston, born 1818 and buried in the Warrington Road grave, are buried at St. Oswald's, Winwick. Hannah died in 1793, aged 34, and Thomas in 1809, aged 52. Their gravestone can still be seen laid flat with many other gravestones to form part of the hard-standing area near the church.
