



Letter from Helen

April! We should have had Brexit certainty by now, but as I write this nothing is certain! Looking at all the nature-type activities advertised in the region in March and April there is the expectation that we will have warmer weather, spring will have sprung, but with the effects of global warming, a warm February and storms in March, nothing is certain! A friend is off from work because of mental health issues. She doesn't know when she will be able to return to work – that it itself increases anxiety. Uncertainty creates anxiety. How do we cope with this uncertainty!

We're half way through Lent. We start to remember how Jesus set his face towards Jerusalem. The disciples went with him, but they were not really sure that this was a good idea. Who knew what they would find in that city! The authorities were not exactly friendly. Jesus, of course knew that he was going there to face his death, and three times he tried to tell them, but for the disciples – they were not sure. They didn't understand. It was all unknown!

Life is like that, isn't it! We cannot know the future. We look at

coming events and some of us will see the wonderful opportunities and some of us will see the potential disasters. Some of us will not understand why things have to change. If only we could be sure it was for the best! We do not have certainty but we can have faith. Faith allows us to go forward into the future even though 'nothing is certain'.

"And yet for those who believe some things are certain! This month there are still the dark day of Good Friday and the joy of Easter to come. With Malcolm

JOHN TAYLOR (c1862 1918),

HEATH ROAD, ASHTON IN MAKERFIELD,

GROCER, MINERAL WATER MANUFACTURER & BOTTLER



Having the surname Taylor I was intrigued when asked by David Taylor, one of the intrepid band of regular litter pickers, did I know anything of a 'John Taylor Pop maker of Ashton in Makerfield'. David had acquired a very old pop bottle bearing the name of the pop maker and the address of Ashton in Makerfield. As an incomer, some 53 years ago, I had no knowledge of this local company. David said that he couldn't find anything about this John Taylor on Google and would like to know more.

I thought that if I don't know then I am sure

that I knew someone who would know or could find out. So I set about challenging our local historian and contributor to this magazine David Fearnley to finding out what was known about this local businessman.

To my great surprise and delight he was able to let me have a complete history of the family and this within a space of two days.

John Taylor was born in St. Helens in 1862, moved to Chapel Lane, Wigan, and then, after his marriage in 1888 to, moved to Ashton in Makerfield. He became a grocer & mineral water manufacturer & bottler living in Heath Road, Ashton in Makerfield.

There seems to be an earlier family involvement with Ashton in Makerfield as John Taylor's great great grandfather was probably Thomas Taylor, son of Henry Taylor of Haydock. Thomas Taylor was born on the 21/6/1750 and baptised at St. Thomas', Ashton in Makerfield on the 29/6/1750.

John Taylor's great grandparents were John Taylor and Ann Jameson. This John Taylor, son of Thomas Taylor, was born on the 24/10/1774 and was baptised on the 11/11/1774 at St. Thomas'. He in turn married Ann Jameson at St. Oswalds, Winwick on the 4/7/1803. They had a son William who was born on 20/4/1807 at Ashton in Makerfield. William married Mary Birchall on the 6/4/1834 at St. Oswalds, Winwick and were John Taylor's grandparents. John Taylor's father was William Taylor, the 2nd son of William and Mary Taylor and who was born on the 12/12/1835 and baptised on the 18/12/1835 at St. Thomas'.

They had a son William who was born on 20/4/1807 at Ashton in Makerfield. William married Mary Birchall on the 6/4/1834 at St. Oswalds, Winwick and were John Taylor's grandparents. John Taylor's father was William Taylor, the 2nd son of William and Mary Taylor and who was born on the 12/12/1835 and baptised on the 18/12/1835 at St. Thomas'. At that time the family lived at Florida Stables, Ashton, which was situated on Haydock Lane, Pewfall. William Taylor, snr., was employed as a waggoner probably in the coal pits at Florida. c1859 William Taylor had married Alice (surname unknown) Their son John Taylor. was born 1862..

The 1871 CENSUS revealed that William Taylor aged 35, was an ostler which was a stableman looking after the horses (usually at an inn). Their son, John Taylor, aged 8, was living with the family in Chapel Lane, Wigan.

The 1881 census revealed that John was no longer living with his family in Chapel Lane and at the age 18 he had probably already left home but he does not appear elsewhere on the 1881 census.

As mentioned our John Taylor who born in 1862 at St Helens was married on the 9/5/1888 at St. Thomas' to Ann Naylor. Their first child was Harold born on the 13/4/1889 and baptised on the 9/6/1889 at St. Thomas'. A daughter Eveline Taylor was born 22/4/1891 and baptised 13/5/1891 also at St. Thomas. a second daughter Lillian Taylor was born on the 23/6/1892 and baptised on the 10/7/1892 again at St. Thomas. Marian Taylor was born on the 7/12/1893 and baptised on the 24/1/1894 at St. Thomas. They all described as children of John and Ann Taylor Heath Road, grocer. Another child Percy Taylor was born 8/6/1895 but sadly died one month later.

The 1891 CENSUS reveals that the John and Ann lived at 22 Heath Road The son Harold Taylor also lived there as did Isabel Smith aged 17, described as a domestic servant, born Ashton.

The 1901 CENSUS confirms that John and Ann are still resident at Heath Road but he is now described as a mineral water manufacturer. All the children are now said to be resident at 22 Heath Road along with Martha Richardson, aged 23, domestic servant, Edward Pennington, general labourer, born St. Helens

By the time of the 1911 CENSUS Ann Taylor had died aged 48 in 1905 John is described as a widower, grocer & mineral water manufacturer & bottler, born St. Helens. By this stage he is living at 28 Heath Road along with his son Harold and three daughters Eveline, Lillian and Marian. Also resident was Sarah Smith described as sister in law and housekeeper.

The story concludes, or does it, with the death of John in 1918 aged 56 certainly 28 Heath Road continues as an off licence until 1999. Does anyone out there know what happened to the family?






St. Thomas' C of E Primary School

The LEGO Movie: The Second Part (U)

Directed by Mike Mitchell

Stars the Voices of: Chris Pratt, Elizabeth Banks, Will Arnett, Tiffany Haddish, Stephanie Beatriz, Nick Offerman, Charlie Day, Alison Brie, Will Ferrell, Maya Rudolph, and Richard Ayoade

In a Nutshell: It's hard isn't it? When your movie is just that good, that original and unique but it's also so insanely popular that there has to be a seguel. But how to ignite that spark once more and capture just what it was that worked so well? Well, simply put you just expand upon it all and go deeper, which is where this seguel soars and captivates in equal measure. I can put it out there from moment one, this isn't quite as dazzling and original as that first movie; mainly because how can you be; but that never matters, this film is still an absolute riot from start to finish. It's very very funny, it's sweet and it's exciting.... It has awe some musical numbers and a really terrific message. Once the beautiful message of this movie hits and you realize what the movie has been doing for its running time and how it has weaved it through the story through the whole time you've been watching, it's a real Inside Out moment where you realize just how deep and ingenious family movies can be over almost any other movie you'll see. The voice cast as ever is perfect, with Pratt and Banks both perfect in these roles while once more Will Arnett steals the whole movie as Batman while Haddish is a perfect new addition and steals a ton of screen time, her and Arnett have fab chemistry. The songs somehow even outdo the first movie, you thought Everything is Awesome was catchy? Just you wait, and stay through the credits for the best end credits song ever. All in all, this is one sequel that builds (pun intended) on its predecessor rather than flounders.... It's a treat for all ages, and will be loved in equal measure if there's any justice.

In a Nutshell: Remember 2010? When the most bittersweet and lovely family franchise of our generation came to a beautiful close with Toy Story III and we all blubbed forever while our kids looked at us funny? Well, it's that time again... time to get emotional and look back on another perfect and beautiful franchise. I can say up top that as good as the Dragon franchise is, it doesn't really hold a candle to how perfect the Toy Story films where. But they are still utterly exceptional and the franchise that proves Dreamworks can do great animated storytelling. Whether it's the gorgeous animation and landscapes, the perfectly picked voice cast who once more do sterling work (with one notable exception being someone clearly standing in for an actor who doesn't appear and it's so so obvious that someone is trying to replicate the voice of said actor and it jars a bit). As all these films do, it throws in a love interest for Toothless; but rather than be a gimmick, it boldens the story and proves a jumping off point for driving the plot to where it needs to go and invests some more interesting drama and character into proceedings. I will say that after the emotional sweep of the second film, this is maybe a smidge less but by the emotional finale to the whole trilogy that comes at the end.... Such things don't matter, there won't be a dry eye anywhere because the journey has come full circle and it's a perfect and beautiful ending. A generation has grown up with this franchise and has loved it, and it's subsequent TV shows and spin offs; so in that regard, it really does pay it all off beautifully. Like Toy Story before it, never say never to more; but as a trilogy closer, this is a beautiful way to send it off into the distance.

Thank you that, because Jesus is alive, life has meaning and purpose. When we don't understand why some things happen, when life is diffi-




