


Letter from the Curate

The weather's a funny thing really isnt it? Our European neighbours laugh at us because in their opinion the rapidity with which it changes is our most frequent topic of conversation!



I'm writing this short letter from a tent in most possibly the muddiest corner of Somerset. I'm part of a small group from our parish who've come to a gathering of Christians from around the country called New Wine www.new-wine.org/ There are 14,000 of us this week and there will be another 10,000 next week.

We're gathered as a Church - to worship God together, to learn more about his love, to explore afresh what it means that Jesus shared our humanity

Down through the Roof - Thursday 2nd July

Do you remember the paralysed man who had to be let down through the roof because of the crowds? They just couldn't get him to Jesus. The

man's friends carried him up to the roof and lowered him down to Jesus. He healed the man because he could see the faith they had.

'I tell you, get up, pick up your bed and go home' Luke 5 v24b

This Messy Church session focussed on two themes: the role of the man's friends in the story who cared enough to bring their friend to meet Jesus, and the miracle performed by Jesus, both in healing the man and in forgiving him. We explored how to bring our friends to 'meet Jesus', as well as taking the opportunity to pray for our friends and family members.

We were in the church hall as the weather prevented us from being in the vicarage garden as planned, but a good time was still had by all.

Jesus told the man to pick up his mat and walk. We wove pieces of material and card to create a mat just like the man would have had. A colourful woven mats was made, and is displayed on the notice board in the church hall if anyone would like to see it.

The houses in Jesus' time in that part of the world would have been quite different from our own houses today. We made a house out of cardboard which came complete with steps up to the roof. The man's friends climbed the outside steps up to the flat roof to let their friend down through the hole they had made.

The house was so crammed full of people that the man's friends couldn't get him in the door. They were very determined to bring the man to Jesus. How determined are we to bring our friends to Jesus? On this station we were trying to squeeze as many buttons into a box.

Another popular station was the food station. We created an edible model of the scene using biscuits, icing, fruit winders and jelly babies. This

helped us think just how creative the man's friends were in getting him to lesus.

Don't drop the egg was a fun station that really gave us all something to think about. We were in pairs and had to work together to carefully lower the egg down to the floor. This was done using cord and a plastic dish with an egg balanced inside the dish. This helped us realise just how difficult it would have been for the people lowering down the man and trying to prevent him from being tipped out onto the floor. How much faith and determination they had!

On another table we could decorate and then build our very own cardboard man, whose arms and legs moved in any direction. The man would have been able to do this after being healed by Jesus and would have felt wonderful to be able to move again.

Prayer station is a favourite station for us with the opportunity to be prayed for and to listen to what Jesus might be saying. As well as being anointed with oil we could take home a pebble or diamond with a cross on it. Have you ever put raisins inside a glass of lemonade? Why don't you try it at home? The raisins move and dance about in the liquid. How would the man have felt being able to dance after all this time not being able to move?

Beautiful flower arrangements were made with help from ladies from Flower Guild. The flowers could then be given to someone we care about, just as the man's friends cared about him.

As the hall was tidied and cleared, Sue took the children into the other hall for a sing, dance and a talk which they all enjoyed. We finished with hot dogs and ice pops, which were a welcome relief in the warm weather. We all sat around one long table, chatting and eating together.

Our next messy church will be on Thursday 8th October from 3.30 to 5pm in St Thomas's school. Maybe you know someone who doesn't go to church? An invitation to Messy Church may bring them closer to knowing Jesus. Please think about and pray for anyone you could invite along.





In a Nutshell: The tagline and the trailer for the first Jurassic Park movie told us it was 'An adventure 65 million years in the making'... well thankfully this time around, it has only took them 14 years. And truly time is a friend to us all. I'm not ashamed to say that this might just be a ramble and jumble and a lot of excited praise because Jurassic World is a triumph in every way. It's an easy place to start by saying that while the character development isn't note perfect, the performances and the fun they're having definelly helps to sell the adventure, and the tension and most certainly the character.... not to mention that these are just simply great people to spend time with and to will on to survive and do good things, or simply to boo at because some of them are evil. Performance wise, Pratt particularly cements his status as a superstar with a role that's half serious hero and half likeable cad, whilst Vincent D'Onofrio does a wonderful line in slimy characters that you instantly take against... whilst Jake Johnson steals scenes life right and centre from simply behind his computer. The effects are flawless like it needed to be said, doing the best to blend the CGI with practical effects like in the glory days, and it's something to behold once more and will make you feel oh so young again. Like that first Jurassic Park movie (and to mild degrees it's sequels) this makes the thrill ride grade on the simple basis that whilst it's thrilling, it's also manages to be totally terrifying and scary in the best way possible... the way kids love to be scared! The simplest advice I can give regards Jurassic World is just to go and see it... it does everything you'd ever want a new film like this to do.... it beautifully recaptures the mood and energy of the original with a new very likeable cast, fabulous resources and effects and so many flashbacks and homages to the original movies....this all boils down to it being basically one big rollercoaster ride and a great homage to the original! No expense was spared.... Rating: 10/10

is a big rarity.... good thing then that Spy fits this bill beautifully and flies past any barriers and obstacles with maximum ease. Granted I don't want to go off on one and suddenly make it seem like a perfect movie, it's not up there with the greats like Austin Powers but this is still one of the best action comedies to come along in a long time, because whilst the comedy is just great, the action and the story matter too and aren't just in there to move everything along. You care for the characters, and the mission they have to achieve and how they behave and how others behave towards them, and that distinction is important... it's good to care about something in a film that could just be hilarious fluff. Heart to this is the wonderful lead

turn by Melissa McCarthy, who is at turns her hilarious self but also imbuing a sense of wanting to do right and a real character as opposed to simply a comic character. She is ably supported by a great support cast featuring fun work by Byrne, Law, Janney, and the wonderful Serafinowicz as well as a fun sidekick role by Miranda Hart... but by passing all

these is the amazing Jason Statham, not a complete stranger to comedy but excelling here in a fantastic comedy performance is simply wonderful in all ways as a delusional hard man secret agent... it is he who scores the biggest laughs and indeed needs his own movie. All adding up to a great fun action comedy but one that remembers that character and plot can go alongside spectacle and hilarity.... it's one heck of a fun time! **Rating: 9/10**


