Thinking about that, I wonder what your Christmas greeting style is, and the message you convey? It may be along these lines: "I wrote a letter to Santa and told him to bring you everything you wanted for Christmas, so hopefully he will answer and make all you dreams come true." ### Bishop Paul's Christmas Message

### A family flees for its life.

A family flees for its life. They have been living under the shadow of a murderous regime and they know that at any time the slaughter may reach them. They have no time. The journey is arduous and dangerous and there is no certainty of what they may find when they reach their destination.

This is a very present reality. It is the type of story we see almost every day on our news reports. The plight of the refugee, desperately crammed into boats trying to find a place of sanctuary. We feel sympathy, powerlessness, frustration. We look at the desperation and wonder how we have got to this in the 21st century. We call out and ask where God is in this suffering.

Yet this is God's story. The family are Jesus' family and the tale is of the flight to Egypt. In it, as we know, the Christ child is being whisked away from Herod's pogrom. In it the only option is to travel to a strange land, a land full of potential danger and to an uncertain future.

So God became a refugee and as such is in the refugee's story. And he calls us to follow him into that story, to get alongside those in distress and above all find appropriate ways to welcome the stranger to our door.



In many ways the welcome of the stranger is central to the Christmas story. It is a harsh story in a difficult setting and it is one we dress up to be a picture postcard at our peril. Jesus's parents had been immigrants in Bethlehem struggling to find a place of shelter where they

could have their child. They had been turned away many times and it was left to the poorest in society to offer a true, sacrificial welcome to the Lord of all. How often is that the case? The rich turn the needy away while those who could be seen to be in need are the ones that offer most love and comfort.

So Christ's story compels us to offer a proper Christmas welcome this year. And Christ's teaching reinforces that command. The command that the God of justice has echoed over the centuries. The command that is writ large throughout scripture. Jesus told us to look after the cold, the homeless, the hungry. Our neighbours. But Christ knew what that experience was like and Christ knew that all of humanity needs that love.

The media image of Christmas is one of self-indulgence. The time to spend, to party, to eat, drink and be merry. Jesus wouldn't want to deny you pleasure – he helped one party in Cana really get swinging.


But if Christ's story, the story of his beginnings, the story of his



life is to continue to have lasting relevance and meaning then we should pause in the indulgence of our selves. And this Christmas look to indulge someone else. Support them, love them, aid them and bring them the welcome that so many denied to our Lord.

Then we can use Christmas to remind people that the birth of Christ made a bigger difference to the world than just a picture postcard story.

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
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


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

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#### The Greatest Gift of All

We'd been going to church every Sunday for as long as I could remember. Third pew from the front and always on the left hand side. You'd find us there each week; me, mum and David; saying our prayers, singing joyful hymns and greeting the other church goers with polite smiles and brief exchanges.

"How lovely to see you!"

And on it went, week on week. It always seemed a bit of a surreal experience for me-church. I'd tag along each week with mum and David but would struggle to connect with some of the liturgy: 'word became flesh' and all that. But I never dared to question. Mum and David both seemed to connect with God in a way I never could. They spoke the words of the service with such confidence and enthusiasm and I never caught them counting the number of women's hats during another of the vicar's dreary sermons. I felt a bit of an outsider at time; not part of God's chosen elect. Yet dad always made me feel better.

Sunday was dad's 'relaxing day' after a busy week at work, or so he said. He only came to church for Christmas day and funerals and, even then, he would sit squashed into the pews; twiddling his thumbs and fiddling with his shirt collar. We'd play 'I spy' and then hangman on the back of the service sheet until mum would nudge us back into submission. Dad was my ally. He never stopped mum from taking me to church but sometimes I would hear them arguing about it at night. Mum told me that she prayed for me and dad every day and knew that one day we would come to know 'the amazing nature of God's grace'. I wish I had the confidence that she did. Her faith and belief seemed as solid as a rock compared to my shaky doubts and uncertainties.

Christmas was always my favourite time of year growing up. I loved the bright lights, rich food and general merriment that shone on people's faces. Even at church I felt something

special about that time of year. Singing carols with gusto, holding a lit Christingle and dressing up in old tea towels and blankets to re

-enact the story of the Saviour's birth. Everything felt special and magical. Even dad got caught up in the merriment; strewing lights all around the house and playing Christmas songs on the radio at every opportune moment. We'd decorate



the house a week before Christmas and I'd marvel at every bauble-old and new-home made and shop bought-expensive and tacky. The tree always looked a mismatch of colours and sparkle but, compared to some of my friends' pristine colour coordinated creations, I wouldn't have wanted it any other way.



My favourite Christmas decoration was our wooden Nativity scene. Granny had bought it for my mum and dad when they celebrated their first Christmas together and it was brought out year on year without fail. I always thought the statues of Mary and Joseph looked so peaceful and content; staring down at the

newborn babe lying in the manger. Dad always played hide and seek with the figures and we'd find Mary hiding in the wine cupboard or the Wise Men gorging on chocolates. I could spend hours sat in front of that stable; marvelling at a story thousands of years old but still the greatest story ever known. Christmas for me was a time for family; for lots of food, games and endless programmes on the BBC. It was perfect...but then mum grew ill.

Cancer. I loathe that word and everything it represents. It all happened so quickly, or so it seemed to me and David. I think mum and dad had known about it longer but were keeping it a secret; protecting us or so they say. Three months with endless hospital visits and the last few weeks spent in a hospice. Mum stayed strong throughout it all; joking about her hair loss and chatting cheerfully to her endless stream of church visitors. I wanted to tell them to go away. How could they possibly understand what we were going

through? How could this be part of God's big plan for my mum's life? In the end mum passed away peacefully in her sleep; clutching her holding cross and with a look of peacefulness etched across her face. Her pain was no more but ours had only just begun.

Dad took mum's death very badly and shrank away into himself. He barely acknowledged me and David anymore; aside from comments about making sure we ate enough and finished our homework on time. The vicar came to visit us quite a few times but dad would often feign a headache; leaving David to chat away whilst I stayed mute next to him on the couch. Months of this darkness and putting on a brave face continued. I stopped going to church, leaving David to visit alone. Dad said nothing about this; just carried on working and grieving. Endlessly grieving.

Christmas came around before we knew it. Our first Christmas without mum. How would we bear it? Dad didn't want us to get the decorations down from the loft but me and David persisted and eventually he reluctantly agreed. There was no jolly Christmas music playing in the background as usual; the tone was sombre and cheerless as we unpacked and decorated. Adding colour to a dark and empty house. We finally reached my favourite box- the crib scene- and dad and David took a step back, allowing me to carefully remove the paper wrapping of each character and place them in their timeless positions. Eventually I took a pace back and surveyed my finished handiwork but something, or someone, appeared to be missing. Then I saw it; the crib was empty! Where was baby Jesus?

All three of us searched high and low amongst the decoration boxes and in the loft but there was no sign anywhere of the baby. Dad and David shrugged it off as an ornament that had just got lost and could easily be replaced in the January sales. However, to me, the Nativity scene was damaged. It had lost its main purpose and I found myself deliberately avoiding looking at the crib when I entered the living room.

Soon Christmas day dawned bright and clear, with frost settling across the town like a blanket of icing. Me and David sat by the tree; steadily opening

the presents that mum had helped dad to choose and forcing ourselves not to cry. We needed to be strong for dad. Before long there was only one present left under the tree. It was labelled to all the family and had been printed in mum's elegant script. I passed it to dad to open and I could tell he was as shocked as we were by this mystery gift. Gently he peeled back the layers of wrapping and there, nestled inside, was the missing wooden figure of baby Jesus and a note. Fingers trembling, dad read the note aloud in as steady a voice as he could muster

My dearest family, I bet you were shocked to find this little baby missing from our Nativity scene this year. I feel that a lot of the time we forget the true meaning of Christmas and the special role that this baby had to play- both then and now. I know my death will have been hard for all of you but I want you all to know that where I am now there is no pain and I am with Jesus and my God. Jesus saved my life and I truly believe that he can save yours too. Death is not the end but the beginning of a new life in heaven with God. I look forward to seeing you again, but hopefully not too soon! Love always, Mum xx

Dad gently lowered the piece of paper from his face and I saw his eyes were glistening with tears. Without saying a word he came and knelt before me and David; clasping baby Jesus tenderly in his hand, and he prayed out loud-asking God to forgive us our wrongs and to help us to keep Jesus at the centre of our lives from now on.

A strange sense of calm and peace filled my body as dad lovingly spoke these words and I prayed too, earnestly this time, echoing dad's call for forgiveness and peace. We sat like this for a long time; basking in the moment and in the sheer nature of God's glory. Finally we all opened our eyes and seeing the look of peace spread across dad's face, I knew then that everything was going to be okay. This Christmas mum had given us the best gift we could ever wish for- the gift of Jesus.

### The Film Review With Rob Carson



Spectre (12A) Directed by Sam Mendes

Stars: Daniel Craig, Ralph Fiennes, Christoph Waltz, Lea Seydoux, Monica Belluci, Dave Bautista, Naomi Harris, Ben Whishaw, Andrew Scott, and Stephanie Sigman In a Nutshell: So, when you have a movie that is as truly fantastic as Skyfall was, not to mention a James Bond movie as well and a very very successful one... the easy route would be to crank out yet more standard fare for the money machine. But thankfully, all who are involved with this fantastic follow on to that gem have avoided quick speed and general laziness that has led them to crank out yet another Craig/ Bond masterpiece in their sweet time as opposed to just throwing it in your face and hoping you're satisfied. So with all that said, we now have Spectre.... and here comes the review part. To start with, it goes without saying that at this point.... Daniel Craig is terrific as Bond as usual, doing more and more of the emotional back story and soul searching that so helped Skyfall.... acknowledging both time and his own frailty as he goes through the plot. And what plot there is, a labyrinth of twists and turns and beautifully done action.... to say too much would be to unearth its secrets and surprises, and it's far too good to be doing any of that... but what I can say is that it is a beautifully layered story that harks back to all of Craigs' previous Bond outings as well as exploring a thrilling new plotline that is in the mould of proper vintage and classic Bond. You have a great support cast across the board from the dependable Waltz sinister charm to the terrific Andrew Scott as an shadowy new government figure and Ben Whishaw who is just wonderful once more as Q, not to mention Lea Seydoux as Madeline Swann... one of the most terrific Bond ladies yet plus Dave Bautista just having a ball as a deadly henchman. What more do you need? You've got a terrific cast, some of the best action sequences yet... a terrific plot with depth and danger and just about everything you could ever want.... James Bond will return and he'll be welcomed with open arms!

Consider it re-invented once more.... because before any other aspects of the movie, the sequence itself where Petit does his thing... is one of the most audacious, jaw dropping and beautiful sequences put on cinema for at least a good few years, and is the best argument you'll ever see for seeing a film at the cinema, or more ideally on a IMAX screen (it's no surprise this film has a special early IMAX release)... with it's depth, vision and wonder all combining for something that will make you speechless and breathless and leave you exhausted in the best way you can. It's helped by a lively fun cast, led by Joseph Gordon Levitt who while sporting a strong French accent that won't be for everyone, so completely becomes the

character of Petit, that you can't help but be charmed by this crazy and lovely individual. The plot itself and the events that unfold prior to the big event are maybe less by comparison, but it's still thoroughly enjoyable and engaging throughout and really makes you root for the team leading up to the event while also really building up the suspense to the event itself. in all, making for a fantastically enjoyable romp that culminates in something so completely unmissable that you'd need to be examined if you let this pass you by... it is a compulsory piece of cinematic history, and something to be cherished and awed at, on the biggest screen you can manage. Just hold your breath and hold on!
