

Letter from Flic



"Let Heaven and Nature Sing"

As Sam and I went on a wintry walk recently, a stunning flock of starlings flew over us. I was reminded that in the eastern churches' telling of the Christmas story, the miracle of God becoming fully human in Jesus is only possible because all parts of creation offer something to make it happen. The angels offer a song, the heavens a star, the earth offers the cave in which Jesus is born, the desert, its grass for the manger, the ox and the ass offer their warming breath, and of course Mary offers her very self to bear the child.



In other words, God can't become human without all of parts of nature joining in the miracle. I love this wonderful image reminding us of God's intimate and earthy relationship with all that is created.

Given today's climate crisis, this image is, perhaps, all the more precious. John 3:16 reminds us: "This is how much God loved the world: he gave his Son, his one and only Son". The word for "world" that John uses is not just talking about us humans, but about the whole beautiful and created order. God has not only taken on flesh and blood, but has entered into all the joys, quakes and vast ecosystems of the amazing world we share. In other words, God's saving work is way bigger than we often think! This is especially joyful news for the poorest people in our world who do the least to cause pollution, yet are the most affected by fatal famines, floods, hurricanes and heatwaves.

It will take a miracle to halt climate change. But the eastern telling of the Christmas story reminds us that when each of us offers what we can to God, the miraculous really can happen.

"What can we offer? We can transform our world together by doing every-day things, like cutting down on single-use-plastic in our Christmas present shopping, taking our own water bottles/thermos mugs for our Christmas journeys, and even by reducing how much meat we feast on (the meat industry being one of the biggest contributors to carbon emissions). We can also pray for our world leaders this Advent as they meet in Poland to agree on how to tackle climate change together. Next year we'd love to gather those of you who are interested, to chat about what we can offer as a hub to help care for God's creation (please be in touch if you are interested, we'd love to hear from you!)

Perhaps, as each of us joins in God's saving work his Christmas, together we'll catch that joyful glimpse of heaven here on earth: God-With-Us, Emmanuel.

Bishop Paul's Christmas Message 2018

In the dark, small hours of the night, the time when our sleep is most disturbed as sombre thoughts invade our minds, a child is born. No ordinary child. A child born to banish the darkness and shining a light of hope into all our hearts.

On that night, fearful shepherds gathered around the child to worship him in wonder before going out to tell others. Shortly afterwards the child would be visited by wise people from the East, again worshipping him before heading off to share the news. And throughout his life Jesus would be encountered by many who reflected in wonder and then shared what they had seen.

Was there a common thread?

Of course. Everyone who encountered Jesus was transformed. Transformed in different ways. The shepherds found strength. The Eastern sages had their intellectual curiosity satisfied. The blind were given sight. The outcasts received friendship. The hungry fed. The poor given hope.

They were transformed. How were they transformed? An encounter with Jesus transformed them. How do we know they were transformed? Because they stepped up and spoke about that transformation. In other words they had an inner journey of encounter and an outer journey of proclamation.

Over the last year in the Diocese we have been developing our Rule of Life. I have been talking about both the inner and outer journey. The inner journey where we Pray, Read and Learn as we try to deepen our faith, and widen our understanding of what it means to know Jesus and to act as he did. The outer journey where we put that action into practice - we Tell, Serve and Give. In these ways we show what it is to be a disciple of Christ, part of a transforming movement that longs to make a bigger difference so that more people know Jesus and there is more justice in the world.

Because the world is longing for that justice. From the massive political uncertainties and conflicts between nation states, to the fearful parent wondering how they will feed their child. We see darkness surrounding us, we have our own pressures, the fears and stresses of the world engulf us. In such a world we need hope.

Some seek for hope in luxury, in the excessive commercialism of Christmas. Expensive presents, lavish parties, over-indulgence. Attempts to find release from the day to day. But as people of faith, we find hope in Jesus. In the precious Christmas gift who transformed the lives of those he encountered. Who can, and is, and will, and wants to transform you, and me.

I pray for you, friends, that you seek hope in Jesus, I pray that you encounter that living and transforming Jesus - and I pray you tell others about that Jesus in word and action, this and every day.

Africa Fund News

The Africa fund supports two amazing Christian-run projects in south west Uganda: a children's home at Rukungiri and the Kigezi Diocese Water and Sanitation Project which provides outlying communities with access to clean water and proper sanitation. Both projects play a massive part in saving and changing lives.

Each month generous donors support the Africa fund with standing orders. However, the monthly income does not match our donations from the fund to the projects we support. Events like our sponsored walk and evening meal therefore play an invaluable part in helping us to meet our commitments.

The Story of the Christingle

The word 'Christingle' actually means 'Christ Light', and celebrates the light of Jesus coming into the world. Stories of how the Christingle began originate from the Moravian Church, which is found in the Czech Republic. The Moravians have held Christingle services for more than 200 years, and according to them, this is how the first Christingle might have been made:



Many years ago the children in a village were asked to bring a Christmas gift to put beside the crib in the

church. One family was very poor, and had no money for gifts, but the three children were still determined to take something. The only nice thing they had was an orange, so they decided to give the Christ-child that.

But then they discovered the top was going green, so the eldest cut it out, and put a candle in the hole. To add some colour, one of the girls took a red ribbon from her hair and tied it around the middle of the orange. It was hard to make the ribbon stay still, so they fastened it in place with toothpicks. The toothpicks looked a bit bare, so the youngest child added some raisins to them.



The children took their decorated orange lantern to the church for the Christmas Mass. The other children sneered at their meagre gift, but the priest seized upon it with joy. He held it up as an example of the true understanding of the meaning of Christmas, for the following reasons:

The orange is round, like the world; the candle gives us light in the dark, like the love of God; the red ribbon goes round the 'world', as a symbol of Christ's blood, given for everyone; the four sticks point in all directions, and symbolise that God is over all: North, South, East and West; and the fruit and nuts (and sweets!) remind us of God's blessings.

The Children's Society first introduced the Christingle Service to The Church of England in 1968. This candlelit celebration is an ideal way to share the key messages of the Christian faith, while helping to raise vital funds to help vulnerable children across the country.

Christingle services

This year, there are a number of Christingle services across our hub. On December 2nd, St Luke's and Holy Trinity will be lighting their Christingles as part of their morning worship. St Peter's will be at 4pm at St Peter's school on December 23rd and St Thomas' Christingle service will be during the morning worship on January 6th.

There is something truly magical as we light the first Christingle candle, then share that light with each other, turn off the lights and sing "Away in a Manger" with faces shining.



A Star is Born (15) Directed by Bradley Cooper

In a Nutshell: There's a reason that certain stories are told time and time again, be it that they're just easy money or a easy sell, or that you can adapt them any which way you want for a new generation and they'll always work in so many ways and completely win over that generation too like so many others before... and in the case of A Star is Born it's been told countless times and for each generation, a new version of the story is told that works for it's respective generation and wins them over as well as the generation that enjoyed the previous versions, they fall for it anew like they never heard it before. Two things stand out boldly here that differ it from previous versions too, firstly the directorial debut of one Bradley Cooper, who here proves just how much of a talented human being he truly is, because not only is his performance absolutely jaw dropping but his direction is so raw, so beautiful and nuanced that you wouldn't believe this was his debut, you'd have him pegged as a classic director. Secondly though in a way not always too surprising, Lady Gaga goes from simply being an extraordinary musical talent to being a jaw dropping actress also with a performance that matches Coopers' at every turn, both of them are very much guaranteed to win or be nominated for awards glory very shortly. With such great talent, naturally comes a soundtrack bursting with beautiful raw original music, with some terrific new songs that are sure to stick emotionally in the memory long after the movie has finished. It rounds it all off with a lovely supporting cast of familiar faces who all give sterling support, with Sam Elliott the most nuanced of all as Bradleys' characters brother, some of the scenes he get will knock you out with the extremely subtle and beautiful moments he gets that are so simple yet so effective, a third performance that surely deserves all the accolades. The greatest strength of this terrific piece of cinema is that it tells a well-worn story in a fresh and emotional way, and never leaves you going 'well I saw that coming' and tells such a simple cliched plot in a natural and beautiful way that will leave you breathless and in emotional ruin... do yourself a favor and see it immediately.

In a Nutshell: It is so incredibly hard to condense most extraordinary lives into big bold blockbuster biopics; how can you tell such explosive and bombastic stories in a decent running time without losing everyone... yet it's been done time and time again? Witness the terrific Joaquin Phoenix and Reese Witherspoon tearing up the screen as the Cashs' or just how explosive a pre-Panther Chadwick Boseman was as James Brown? Yet both arguably still probably skipped through stuff and told a linear tale of highlights... and so we come to the most extraordinary musician of all time and the most dynamic tale ever told. So how do we even begin to tackle this one? After a huge bout of production history, the answer is complicated I guess but it's been solved by simply telling what you can of the huge history in that same whirlwind bite size way but with perfect performances and great love and respect for the artists and their music. After much casting changes, Rami Malek was cast as Freddie and he's simply perfect (yes, there's part of me that thinks Sacha would have been perfect too but oh well), nailing the vulnerability and the voice and the mannerisms and also nailing the arrogance and pomp that made him such the perfect wannabe star and then the perfect superstar... it's simply a perfect and beautiful portrayal. The other three members of the band too are perfectly portrayed, you'd think you were watching a documentary with how much they act and look like them, especially Lee as Brian May who is simply note perfect. Rounding out the cast is a bunch of reliable faces in key roles and a beautiful turn by Lucy Boynton as Mary, who was a key role in Freddie's life and stuck with him through everything. The music is as amazing as ever, it's not redone or reworked, the simple original tunes are worked into the story and the performances are simply perfect, you wouldn't realize it was mimed or lip synced. The great thing about this film in the end, is even though it skips over some bold and important events in their fullness, it stills recognizes and addresses them and makes them an important part of the narrative... it tells what it needs to tell in a beautiful, enjoyable and crowd-pleasing way... if you've had your doubts about this film doing what you need it to do... then give it a chance because it will surprise you, it will move you.... It will, it will rock you!




