


Marriage

Letter from Sian

Those of you who have got to know me over the last few years will probably be aware that one of my favourite Bible verses is John 10:10. In this verse, Jesus, the Good Shepherd, explains his purpose, the reason he came, and, in just a few words, he compares the damaging effect that the thief can have on his sheep with the abundance of life he can offer:

The thief's purpose is to steal and kill and destroy. My purpose is to give them a rich and satisfying life. (New Living Translation)

A thief comes to steal and kill and destroy, but I came to give life—life in all its fullness. (New Century Version)

A thief is only there to steal and kill and destroy. I came so they can have real and eternal life, more and better life than they ever dreamed of. (The Message).

Now, you might either smile or cringe when I tell you why this verse has been in my mind so much recently. Our Jack Russell terrier, Julie Andrews, is nearly eleven years old. We've had her since she was five. She came to us from an elderly couple who practically worshipped her but couldn't look after her any more. It was a bit of a shock as she moved from her privileged life into our chaotic house where there was another big dog (Rio), two cats, one of whom had just had kittens and numerous people. It took her a while to settle and for us all to enjoy each other's company. Julie is great fun, quite bossy at times and a real character, but it is only in the last few weeks that I've seen her in her element...

instinct kicked in: something took over as she chased the poor rodent across the garden, almost teasing him as he squealed across the grass. He escaped eventually but I don't fancy his chances for long, as every time the back door opens, Julie Andrews is on RatWatch!





Letter from Sian

Happy as she is, it's like she's discovered her purpose (Jack Russells are known as "ratters") and, as well as reminding me of Jesus' words in John 10, it has made me think of that great film, Chariots of Fire. Eric Liddell, the gifted athlete, who put his faith before his running, said this: "I believe God made me for a purpose, but he also made me fast. And when I run I feel his pleasure."

Please forgive me for using the example of a terrier and a rat for getting to this point, but to know God's pleasure when we are in line with his purpose is the most fulfilling thing. It gives us a passion and a focus that makes life more exciting and meaningful.

This week at St Thomas' School we had a visitor called Rafat Mamood from Building Stronger Communities. She came in to talk about treating everyone the same even though they are all different in a unique way. In a whole school assembly she told us that her name means RESPECT and that was what her talk focussed on. She did some activities with Year four and five so we interviewed Abbie from Y4 and she told us "When the visitor came into our classroom she talked about different people and why they are different. THE CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

This is Amanda's story. At the age of 12 Amanda was placed in care because of problems at home. Lonely isolated and scared, Amanda felt she had no choice but to run away from everything. Amanda was in real danger as criminals sought to take advantage of her vulnerability and exploit her. Fortunately the police found Amanda and referred her to Gillian, a project worker from the Children's Society. Gillian worked with Amanda, providing expert care and support. Through the Children's society Amanda received help and is now trying to resolve her problems at home. This is only one example of the sort of work and difference that the Children's Society can and does made for young people.

Last year about 80 parishioners of St Thomas and St Luke's churches helped to fund this work, by either saving small change in a collection box or making a donation. In 2018 the total raised was £1675.00 I would like to thank everyone who helped to raise this amount.

On 9th December 2018 St Luke's held their Christingle service and on 6th January 2019 St Thomas also held their Christingle Service. This is a lovely service when we distribute the Christingle oranges and when everyone is arranged around the church the candles are lit and a carol is sung. This also raises money for The Children's Society. I would like to thank St Thomas's school who helped a great deal by distributing and collecting candles. The total raised by the churches and the school was £400.00. Thank you to everyone who helped to assemble the Christingle oranges and to everyone who contributed to raise this amazing amount.

This is another local history article by our friend David Fearnley for which we are extremely grateful.

JOHN ASHTON (1711 - 1759), ASHTON IN MAKERFIELD

16/9/1711 John Ashton, son of Nicholas and Margaret Ashton, of Ashton in Makerfield, was baptised at St. Thomas' church. Forty four years later, in 1755. John financed the building of the first canal in Britain - the Sankey Brook Canal which connected St. Helens to the River Mersey. John probably attended the Free Grammar School in Seneley Green because in 1748 he gave a large financial donation to the school. The Free Grammar School was founded in 1588 by Robert Birchall/Byrchall, yeoman, of Ashton in Makerfield who recognised the "great abundance of poor persons and of youth and young children living in Ashton in Makerfield, altogether destitute of good discipline or school of learning for their good education" and that he was placing £74 (£29,000 today) in trust "to provide a sufficient person to teach all such youth and young children in Ashton". The school was erected at Seneley Green on land 44 feet long and 30 feet wide donated by Sir Thomas Gerard in 1589. In 1727 the original school was replaced by a stone building on School Lane, Garswood. This building is now Garswood library. John was the only son of Nicholas and Margaret Ashton. Nicholas Ashton was of a farming or yeoman family in Ashton but by 1718 he also owned lands at Parr and by 1728 he also owned lands at Eccleston. Margaret Ashton, maiden name Orrell, was the daughter of James Orrell of Parr, Blackbrook, where the Orrells owned lands and coal mines

During the 1730's John Ashton moved to Liverpool and married Elizabeth Brooks daughter of John Brooks of Liverpool. In 1746 John bought the large "Dungeon" salt refinery on the River Mersey at Hale, near Liverpool. John refined rock salt brought from Cheshire and he made a fortune. In 1748 John Ashton of Liverpool gave the Free Grammar School at Seneley Green £100 to be invested in stocks and shares and the dividend to be used by the school on condition that the schoolmaster was "to employ the whole time of school - hours of the first day of teaching in every week in the best manner they could, to instruct all the children sent there, in the principles of religion, virtue and morality". This donation and instruction was, along with other donations, engraved on 2 stone tablets which were mounted on the walls inside the Free Grammar School at Seneley Green.

In 1890 when the Ashton Grammar School moved to Old Road the 2 stone tablets were displayed in the Old Road premises. Old Ashtonians may recall the 2 tablets which also included a donation of £100 by John Lowe of Westminster in 1707 whereby "all pupils were to be given 5 shillings worth of cakes and ale every 4th July". In 1965 when the Ashton Grammar School moved to Warrington Road the 2 stone tablets moved again. Today the tablets can be seen on the stairway inside Byrchall High School.

In 1749 John Ashton held the position of Town Bailiff of Liverpool. When he made his will in 1753 he described himself as a cheesemonger and merchant. In fact he was one of the most important merchants in Liverpool and was a member of the Company of African Merchants involved in the slave trade. His ships sailed from Liverpool to West Africa carrying goods, weapons and rum which were exchanged for slaves, transported the slaves to the West Indies(Jamaica) and North America to work on the large farms or plantations and returned to Liverpool carrying cotton, tobacco and sugarcane. Ashton Street, in Liverpool, is named after John Ashton.

John Ashton's salt refinery at Hale was a large consumer of coal. Transport of coal, from the coal mines of South Lancashire, by cart and packhorse was difficult and expensive due to the poor conditions of the roads. John realised that if there was a waterway link between the coal mines to the River Mersey then transport costs would be less and vast profits could be made. In 1755 John Ashton was the main promoter and investor in the construction of the Sankey Brook Canal built to bring coal to Liverpool from Haydock, Ashton and Parr. From his wealth due to the salt and slave trade John invested £9,000 (£2 million today's value) in the canal and was the largest shareholder holding 51 of the 120 shares issued in the canal company. From 1755 - 1835 the average yearly dividend or profit of each share was 33%.

John's son, Nicholas Ashton(1742 - 1833), took over his father's business in 1759. In 1772 he bought Woolton Hall between Liverpool and Hale. He employed the architect Robert Adam to enlarge and remodel the Hall. Nicholas was High Sheriff of Lancashire, trustee of the Bluecoat Hospital and founder of Liverpool Athenaeum (a club and library for the merchants of Liverpool). Nicholas' obituary 1833 includes the following "son of John Ashton the first who carried into execution the project of a navigable canal in the Kingdom".


Oberammergau Passion Play and Visit to Austria 13th - 20th May 2020

Fr Alec Parkinson, Curate at St John's Pemberton, is planning to lead a group to attend the Passion Play at Oberammergau for the 2020 performance. This is combined with time among the sparkling lakes and majestic mountains of Austria - giving the op-



portunity of fellowship together with the common purpose of attending the Passion Play.

We will travel together as a group, with an itinerary of included coach excursions and walks. We begin with five nights in Austria



at the four star Gutshof Hotel, which is in Strobl, near Salzburg. Then we travel to Oberammergau for a two night stay at the end of our holiday, with top grade tickets for a performance of the Passion Play.

Oberammergau Passion Play and Visit to Austria 13th - 20th May 2020



The play is an intense emotional experience and this tour is an opportunity to share this unique event with like-minded people. Our aim is to encourage a real feeling of sharing as we participate together in this landmark Christian event.

The cost will be £1,715 per person, including flights from Manchester, luggage, breakfast and dinner each day, and all gratuities. (supplement for single rooms £235). The tour operator for this trip is the ATOL registered McCabe Pilgrimages.

Whilst in Austria, the programme includes excursions with local guides. There'll be a day in Salzburg and also a trip around the nearby Lake Wolfgang. Also there is a steamer which plies Wolfgangsee and there's a mountain railway.

Advent Journeys with Compline 2018

Many across the hub prepared for Advent through walking and praying together. We asked Maurice Smith, whose idea it was, to share his experiences:

Three words you may not have expected to find in the same sentence,

but here we were, at pop-up Theology and Compline in St Aidan's Billinge on the first Thursday in Advent, exploring the story of the Nativity. Of course, the journeys from Billinge to Downall Green to Bryn to Ashton over the next few weeks could not hope to replicate the 70+ mile journey made by Joseph and Mary from Nazareth to Bethlehem (although it is the month that many of us are contemplating our tax returns). But the journeys did have some symbolism of making a physical journey, during Advent, to meet with Christ (finding any wise men amongst us might have been more tricky).



The reception that we pilgrims received in our four churches in the South Hub was warm, welcoming and hospitable; thank you – our sermon series this month reflects this message. A surprise was the strength and communal feel of the singing – not a normal feature of Compline, a service of night-prayer. And it was refreshing that Compline was led, in each service, by someone whose traditions lay in a different worshipping community.

For me, this was the most significant 'message'; the message of being one community. We are, and we witnessed as, one community of Christian folk. We will all have our preferences of church building or styles of worship but whatever those preferences are, we are bound together by our Christian faith, travelling on a pathway, whether smooth or rugged, to meet Jesus – in the manger or on the cross – from the darkness, to the light.


As the night watch looks for the morning, so do we look for you, O Christ.






A short story from the Bible








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
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The Film Review



Mary Poppins Returns (U) Directed by Rob Marshall

Stars: Emily Blunt, Ben Whishaw, Lin Manuel Miranda, Emily Mortimer, Meryl Streep, Colin Firth, Dick Van Dyke, Angela Lansbury, Julie Walters, Pixie Davies, Nathanael Saleh, Joel Dawson, and David Warner

In a Nutshell: Gosh it must be hard coming back after all those years to revisit an old favorite, just ask Walter Murch, who had the unenviable task of Returning to Oz in 1985, some 46 years after the Wizard first was of Oz. It's regarded as a creepy cult classic, I personally love it even if it is flawsville USA. So, imagine how trepidacious it must be now some 54 years after Mary first Poppins'd into our lives, that Disney have put their whole arsenal and armada behind a seguel to that bonafide gem. Frankly I'd assume it looks nicer than Oz. Well, without diminishing the efforts of Fairuza Balk and that Moose head... this is certainly leagues ahead in more ways than one. Evoking the spirit, the life, the characters, the magic, and everything else in some many ways.... This is a film that for me, stands toe to toe with the original and never ever feels like it's rehashing it. It drops beats and familiar ideas but in new and exciting ways, and it also feeds into the original in plot lines and moments that are picked up and expanded and woven into the beautiful fabric of the plot. Helping this along are pitch perfect performances that fully embrace the spirit of the Poppins universe with Blunt leading the charge as Poppins herself, bringing that same mix of whimsy and a tougher edge just like Julie Andrews did whilst being totally different too. This is complimented by Lin Manuel Miranda who is terrific as the light lamper who is the Bert of the piece so to speak, charming and lovely and thrusting the movie forward throughout, he's a delight as are Mortimer and Whishaw as the grown up Banks, Whishaw especially is heartbreaking, whilst there are great scene stealing turns from Firth and Walters as ever and some nice vintage cameos. The old school animation sequences and their seamless blend with the live-action, the wonderfully charming songs, the way it evokes the spirit of the original in every frame and motion. This is a delight from start to finish, easily the loveliest film I've seen in years, practically perfect in every way. Don't stand there like a codfish, go see it immediately and fall in love with the magic of Poppins all over again....

Mortal Engines (12A) Directed by Christian Rivers

In a Nutshell: One of the biggest and trickiest things you can do in modern event cinema is to try and create bold new worlds and characters on a big scale. It's so easy to do yet another sequel or remake or reboot or adapt a very wellknown property and have a sure-fire success, but it's bolder and more dynamic to do something kinda new and unknown and sit back and hope it hits. Peter Jackson in his producers' hat has done just that, giving the reins over to unknown Christian Rivers to adapt some fairly well-known books for the big screen. So, whilst not overtly original, it still comes across as something bold and fairly original in scope and scale even if it not always hitting every single note to truly make it sing. You have decent performers making the characters work, as Hugo Weaving is a terrific villain for the piece whilst also managing the right levels of sympathy and pathos amongst simply being a nasty piece of work whilst Sheehan and Hilmar do decent enough work as our young leads whilst Jihae steals every scene and Lang provides the one truly great performance and thread of the movie as a vicious robot assassin with a plot twisty secret that really soars when it hits. If this review feels a jumble, it's because the film can too; its bold and beautiful and really soars with its world building and the effects truly make our jaw drop as the central conceit of the future being cities on wheels consuming each other really grabs your imagination and takes you with it, even as sometimes the human aspect fails always to truly engage and ends up a bit of a mish mash. Kudos though for a truly bold attempt to do something new, all in all this is well worth seeking out because it is always engaging and exciting and it's just a marvel to see something this daring and exciting trying it's best to really do something different. Give it a whirl and you may yet find yourself swept along....
