

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Winter Now


'Tis winter now; the fallen snow



Life on a spin

Many years ago, at the Pleasure Beach at Blackpool, there was a certain 'ride' or amusement that was strictly for the physically fit. It consisted of a flat wooden disc about 20 feet in diameter and set at an angle of 45 degrees in the floor. When it began to rotate, the aim was to get to the centre where there was a pole. As the disc rotated faster and faster, everyone who failed to get to the pole got flung off. Nowadays there's probably a European Community regulation banning it as far too dangerous!

The principle of the game was a basic law of physics. When any wheel rotates, the outer rim moves fastest of all. Half way to the centre and you are moving a lot more slowly. And, at least theoretically, at the absolute centre will be a point which is totally still. That's why anyone who reached that pole could stand there quite comfortably.

We have just started the Church's season of Lent. It's generally thought of as being a time for giving up chocolate, wine, whatever. But it's really a time to remind us that in our own rapidly spinning world, God is the still centre.

All around God is motion, sound, change and decay – galaxies circling, seasons and years rotating, life developing and decaying. And at the still centre, where there is no variableness, is God, the same yesterday, today and forever.

Only about seven weeks ago Christians worldwide were thinking of God getting involved in a special way in the ever moving and changing life of the world. And one great characteristic of Jesus was His stillness. Busy, harassed, injured people found someone with neither clever chat nor idle gossip, neither vulgar boasting nor loud opinion. His life always seemed to rotate round a still central point, which gave Him balance and authority.

"Be still then and know that I am God" wrote the Psalmist. Lent is a time for us to try and do just that – to find the still centre of God in our own individual lives.

Of course, we're all of us very much in the world, and must live our lives in all of its busyness. But it may do none of us any harm to be a little more silent than we often are – quick to listen and slow to speak. And the more silent spaces we give ourselves, the more we'll give that still, small voice within each one of us the chance to be heard.



May we be able to fill the year ahead with peace and love.

I pray for peace in our world, especially in the Holy Land, and wish a ceasefire including the release of the hostages.

I hope that you had a blessed Christmas and feel refreshed as we begin this new year. I pray for you and your community as you seek to work humbly for God in whatever way you are called to serve.

As you do so I would like to encourage you to consider how the bible will feature in your thoughts during this year. It may seem strange for a bishop to be saying this to a Christian community.



Yet as I have spoken before this is a longstanding concern of mine. That Christians have lost the knowledge of God's great story as written in the sixty-six books that make up our bible. We must reclaim that story and see it as our story. And we must be confident in telling it. Young and old, lay and clergy, we must be confident in the story and be able to show how our story fits into God's great story.

I don't want this to be a fad or an initiative. I want us to consciously weave our understanding of the bible and biblical study into all that we do over the next and future years.

We have the rule of life where we are encouraged to pray, read and learn and I would ask you think about how you use this discipline to reengage with your bible, to maybe delve into places that you haven't visited for a while. You will find great joy in the exploration. Our rule of life challenges us to continue to place scripture at the heart of what we are doing.

As will the rhythm of our clergy study and retreat days. I want to model what you can also do in your settings and places where you gather and worship. I am using the opportunities from our calendar to be able to think around the bible. I want to encourage you to do the same in your setting.

Some of you may choose to read the whole Bible in this year. Some may want to read the books in the Bible you are not familiar with. Some may want to reread the familiar parts of the Bible with fresh eyes and ears. You may want to look at the provision you have in your congregation for studying the Bible. 'Disciple' means 'student.' We are all called to be learners as disciples of Christ.

Let's make 2024 a year where we consciously read, engage with, and study the Bible in every possible context, making a commitment to learn our own story in Christ and to share it confidently.



Faith leaders call for change to asylum-claim system

Bishops and other faith leaders have joined forces with the Bishop of London to call on the Government to make a change in the leave-to-remain status situation for asylum seekers.

They say they want practice to match policy, for there to be better communication with asylum seekers, and for the timeframe to be extended.

While the faith leaders welcomed the Home Office's efforts to tackle the backlog in asylum claims, they expressed concern "at the number of refugees who, on receiving their leave-to-remain, are becoming street homeless."

The faith leaders said this meant a growing demand on London's churches, mosques, gurdwaras, synagogues and temples, for support with accommodation for those who have just achieved refugee status.

The faith leaders ask that Home Office to abide by its policy that refugees be given a minimum of 28 days from the date when they receive their biometric residence permit (BRP) before having to leave their accommodation. They also ask that the eviction notice period be extended from 28 days to 56, to allow adequate time to apply for Universal Credit and other benefits.

Bishop Mullally said: "Our churches are doing what they can to meet the need, and we all want to avoid further strain on our crisis systems. Homelessness increases the burden on the NHS, and has an overall impact on health, well-being, and the economy."

4th February - Phileas, the brave bishop and martyr of Egypt

When did you first encounter Christianity? If it was as an adult, then Phileas is a saint for you. His life shows that Truth matters, whenever you encounter it, but is also a warning that you need to count the cost of becoming a Christian.

Phileas was a rich man living in Egypt at the end of the third century, when he first met Christians. Highly educated, he did not convert quickly, but instead studied their Gospels, and also at least part of the New Testament. Only then did he conclude that Jesus was indeed the Son of God.

It was good that Phileas had done his research and was firm in his faith, because after his conversion, events came thick and fast. In those pressured times, the Church hadn't the luxury of long training programmes for leaders, and so Phileas was chosen to be bishop of his city in the Thebaid, a desert region of ancient Egypt.

Sadly, the new bishop hardly ever had a chance to pastor his flock. Soon after his consecration at Alexandria in 303, Phileas was arrested under the edicts of the Roman emperor Diocletian. He spent the next three years in prison, deeply moved by the willing martyrdoms of other Christians around him. Finally, in 306, it was Phileas' turn. He faced the questioning of the prefect, Culcianus, who could not fathom why such a previously wealthy man had thrown his life away to follow some (long dead?) carpenter from Galilee.

Phileas' strength now was that he really knew what the Bible said. And so when questioned about Jesus's divinity, he replied that "... He performed the works of God in power and actuality... He cleansed lepers, made the blind see, the deaf hear, the lame walk, the dumb speak, He drove demons from His creatures at a command; He cured paralytics, raised the dead to life, and performed many other signs and wonders."

Still Culcianus urged him to save his life, by sacrificing to the gods. Phileas again had a biblical answer ready. Paraphrasing St Paul, he said that the sacrifices which God requires are "a pure heart, a spotless soul and spiritual perceptions which lead to deeds of piety and justice..." Pressed one final time, he replied "I have reflected many times, and this is my decision." And so, he was led out and beheaded.

What's so special about Jesus?

The gospels record that people were astounded by many of the things that Jesus said. Even His enemies, intent on trapping Him, admitted: "No one ever spoke the way this man does." (John 7:46)

Furthermore, "the crowds were amazed at His teaching, because He taught as one who had authority, and not as their teachers of the law." (Matthew 7:28-9)



For in Jesus, we find something without precedent in the span of human literature. While urging humility on others and while giving the impression of the ultimately humble person, Jesus' teaching and claims are basically egocentric and completely focussed on Himself. In ordinary life, that would get a person labelled as crazy or as a megalomaniac!

Just think of the few astounding claims Jesus made about Himself. "I am the Resurrection and the Life." (Jn 11.25) "I am the Bread of Life." (Jn 6:35) "I am the Light of the World." (Jn 8:12) "I am the Good Shepherd." (Jn 10:7,9) "...whoever lives and believes in Me will never die." (Jn 11:26) And – most staggering of all - "anyone who has seen Me has seen the Father." (Jn 14:9)

CS Lewis comments on the inescapableness of Jesus' uniqueness: "There is no half-way house, and there is no parallel in other religions."

That Jesus cannot be ranked among a pantheon of religious leaders or prophets becomes further obvious when one reflects further on His claim of being at both the beginning and at the end of Creation and of History. He said: "I am the First and the Last" (Rev 1:17), as well as: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me." (Mt 28:18).

Clearly the disciples accepted this, as John begins his gospel with these words: "In the beginning was the Word (Jesus) and the Word was with God and the Word was God... Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made....The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.... and in Him all things hold together." (Col 1:16,17)

When we look at what Jesus goes on to say about the end of history, we are even more startled, as when He said of any person who follows Him: "I will raise him up at the last day." (Jn 6:40) This was the local carpenter, remember! And when we note that throughout the Bible final judgement is a function reserved to God alone, it is astounding to register that Jesus says of Himself: "For as the Father has life in Himself, so He has granted the Son …. authority to judge because He is the Son of Man." (Jn 5:26–27)

Yes, between Creation and the end of History stands Jesus. That also means, of course, and we note it with comfort, because everything in between is His also.

During this Lent, why not spend some time just quietly thinking about these claims of Jesus?



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

At one time this scheme involved very many of our regular worshippers, however with the introduction of the Parish Giving scheme many former users of the envelopes transferred to this system. The freewill envelopes are still in use, and I am using this parish news to say that I have four sets of envelopes not currently in use. If this is of interest to anyone, please let me know.



This month gives us the opportunity to read a further glimpse into our past thanks to David Fearnley:

ASHTON IN MAKERFIELD GRAMMAR SCHOOL, WIGAN ROAD

1885 a scheme for a new grammar school to replace the Seneley Green school was drawn up and agreed in 1886. Under the new scheme the old Ashton Apprentice Stock Charity, under which girls were apprenticed out into millinery and dressmaking and boys into trades and farming had, with changing times, ceased to be of any practical benefit. The Charity Commissioners merged its funds with those of the Seneley Green Free Grammar School Charity to form the new Ashton in Makerfield Grammar School scheme. 12 governors were constituted – 1 appointed by the lord of the manor of Ashton (Lord Gerard); 1 by the Ashton Local Board/Council; 1 by Liverpool University and 3 by the Ashton Linen & Woollen Charities - each to serve for 5 years. 6 other governors were co-opted and to serve for 8 years.

Pupils were to enter the school at the age of 8 and to leave at 16. Tuition fees, set by the governors, were to be between £4 - £8. If the governors so desired the new school could take boarders but this was never enacted. The school was planned for 70 day pupils but eventually built for 130 with the governors arguing that the growth of the town necessitated the increase and because the school was to teach technical instruction it could obtain an additional grant via the 1889 Technical Instruction Act.

1890 Lord Gerard provided the site of 3,400 square yards fronting Wigan Road, Ashton in Makerfield, in exchange for the Seneley Green old school site.

1890 Wigan Observer: Wigan Road, Grammar School, Ashton in Makerfield: Competition – Architects. The governors of Ashton Grammar School invite plans and specifications for the erection of a Grammar School and Master's House on a site in Wigan Road, Ashton in Makerfield. £10 to be paid for selected plans.

1891 building of the new Grammar School and Masters House began, the total cost £2,678 1s 3d (£280,000 today) was met by the merging of the funds of the Ashton Apprentice Stock Charity and the Seneley Green Free Grammar School Charity in 1885. The old Seneley Green school became the Garswood RC Infants School and later Garswood Library.

December 1892 Mr. Edward Burnett, formerly Assistant Master at King William College, Isle of Man, was appointed headmaster. He was in control of the internal organisation, management and discipline in the School. The headmaster was to live in the Master's House and receive a salary of up to £70 pa. plus a capitation fee of £2 - £5 for each pupil in the School.

23/1/1893 Ashton in Makerfield Grammar School, Wigan Road, was opened by Lady Gerard. W J. Melville, Rector of Ashton took the chair, those present included Lady Gerard, Rev's. H. Siddall (St. Thomas'), H. Wilson (Congregational Chapel), F.C. Hurley (curate St. Thomas'), J. Stead (Park Lane Chapel), governors/councillors J. Gaskell (hinge maker, Burgrave Lodge, Wigan Road), W. Valiant (Claremont House, 16 Gerard Street, manager "John Whitley hinges", Gerard Street), C.F. Clark (Cranbury Lee, Park Lane, manager Garswood Coal & Iron Co.), Dr. Hannah (Ashton medical officer of health, Rock House, 41 Gerard Street), T. Crompton (Thomas Crompton hinge makers, Downall Green), Dr. Latham ("Elmfield", 90 Wigan Road), W. Painter (landlord "Robin Hood"), J. Pimblett (farmer, Edge Green Lane), C. H. Astle (butcher, Gerard Street), E. Burnett, headmaster.

The Ashton Grammar School was older than all other grammar schools in the area except Winwick. The first lot of boys in the new school were those elected under the Ashton in Makerfield Grammar School scheme providing scholarships. 10 scholarships, each of £5pa were given to boys attending local elementary schools. In 1893, 4 came from St. Thomas', 2 from St. Luke's, 3 from the Rectory and 1 from the British school. Josiah Gaskell and Lord Gerard were the only two governors descended from members of the old governors board of 1631. Lady Gerard declared "I have great pleasure in declaring the grammar school open and I wish it every success which it deserves".

23/1/1893 Wigan Observer: Ashton in Makerfield Grammar School. The new and handsome premises recently erected by the governors are now completed. Duties will resume Monday, January 23rd. Fees 4 guineas pa, paid terminally in advance. Boarders and full particulars from Mr. Edward Burnett, headmaster.

1899 a chemistry laboratory, costing £138, was erected in the grammar school. Girls were not admitted.

In 1899 W. Ewart McClure, formerly of St. Helens Grammar School, was the headmaster. In the 1960's there was a large portrait of McClure hanging in the assembly hall at the Old Road end of the school. 1929 succeeded by Frank Gardner Hall. Then E. Roscoe, of Walkden.

In **September 1901** girls were admitted – 11 in total and by 1908 girls were playing hockey.

1901 Wigan Observer: Ashton in Makerfield Grammar School: Girls & Boys. Fees Girls £1 1s a term Boys £1 8s a term. Inclusive charge for books and stationery – Girls 6s a term. Boys 7s a term. 3 terms a year.

As well as academic subjects technical instruction classes were held in the grammar school – maths, applied maths, geology, practical chemistry, mining, freehand drawing; in the Council Offices, Bryn Street, – book keeping, shorthand, music, dressmaking, laundry work, needlework; in the Rectory school, N. Ashton, – dressmaking.

1906 Wigan Observer: Ashton in Makerfield Grammar School – the governors of the Grammar School offer for sale Charity Farm, Arch Lane, N. Ashton, occupied by Henry Whittle – house, outbuildings, , land, mines and minerals. Total 7 acres.

The Trustees of the Seneley Green Free Grammar School Charity acquired Charity Farm of 12 acres by a grant of Bryan Sixsmith by lease 24/6/1629 whereby the farm "with all mynes, quarries, etc. was in consideration of £100 conveyed to them upon trust to use the rent and profits for the use of Seneley Green School paying Sir Thomas Gerard of Bryn and heirs 7s 8d(38p) pa".

Sixsmith got the farm from Sir Thomas Gerard by a deed 10/4/1598 for £16 7s 4d paying rent of 7s 8d.

1936 plans to buy 16 acres of land at Weathercock Hill Farm, Garswood Road, Simms Lane End, to build an amalgamated Ashton and Upholland Grammar School met with opposition in both areas. The outbreak of war ended this plan.

Headmasters in 1950's: A. G. Standing, Kenneth Allen.

1965 the Wigan Road Grammar School moved to a new site on Warrington Road, Ashton in Makerfield.
