


When your world has gone wrong

Light! Sunbursts of light!

Our Team Rector, Neil, sees the Christ light of hope burning brightly across Church Wigan even through a difficult winter.

Taking place during the darkest days of the year, the ancient tradition of Advent has always drawn on images of light and darkness, recalling Isaiah's prophecy of great 'sunbursts' of hope for those living in shadow and the Fourth Gospel's poetic description of Jesus as an unquenchable light. Advent is a bright candle in the gloom of our present difficulties, and its focus on Christ's Second Coming, when he will usher in the new creation where there will be no more sickness, or tears, or even death, helps us remain watchful and hopeful even when circumstances seem to point only to disappointment and defeat.

Certainly, the Advent imagery of 'light! sunbursts of light!' illuminating the deep shadows of our current situation is apt for us in Church Wigan this winter. The cost-of-living crisis is already tightening its fearful grip on many; yet our pantries, 'Warm Spaces' and diverse hospitality offered by the church are blessing a host of neighbours both young and old. The desperate legacy of Covid in the church has been, generally, to wither Sunday attendance and traditional sources of income; yet where the church is reaching out to its neighbours in practical demonstration of God's love, there is more growth than we've seen for a long time. Moreover, income for ministries such as our 'Lifted' social justice network and Wigan Next Generation has been staggering. Light is shining brightly despite the darkness.

Difficult days are ahead, for sure. The Right Buildings Review has begun and while it is desperately needed, it will inevitably bring us some heartbreak and lament. But let the stories of hope stir up our faith that God will be with us on our journey through the shadows.

January Holy Days

6th January: Gold, frankincense and myrrh for the infant Jesus

Epiphany is also known as 'Twelfth Night', or the last night of the Christmas festival. According to the song, it is also the day when that over-enthusiastic 'true love' of yours dumps no less than 78 presents on your doorstep, among them a dozen leaping lords of the realm and a final partridge – to go with the 11 you have already been given.

In many parts of the world, 6th January is celebrated as Christmas Day. As we Western Christians are packing away our tree, the Greek Orthodox world and Catholic Spain are giving presents and celebrating the wise men, or magi. For what better time to give presents to each other, than on the day the wise men presented gold, frankincense and myrrh to the infant Jesus?

What do we make of these presents? Gold is for kingship, proclaiming a royal child. Frankincense carries a feeling of worship about it: it was used in the temple worship and indicated access to the presence of God. Frankincense is thus for worship and incarnation.

The third gift, myrrh, finds it place at Calvary. After the crucifixion, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea prepared Jesus' body for burial, using myrrh as an embalming fluid. Thus, when the wise men visit the baby Jesus, the shadow of the cross already falls across the crib. But myrrh is also symbolic of love, so you could say that the third gift is about adoration as well as death. And Christ's death on the cross is for love of the Church, His bride.

As for the magi, they were not Jewish grandees, but foreign Gentiles. And so it was clear, from as early as the manger in Bethlehem, that Jesus was not just the Messiah for the Jews, but the Saviour of the whole world.

1st January: The naming of Jesus

Matthew and Luke tell how the angel instructed that Mary's baby was to be named Jesus - a common name meaning 'saviour'. The Church recalls the naming of Jesus on 1st January - eight days after 25th December (by the Jewish way of reckoning days). In Jewish tradition, the male babies were circumcised and named on their eighth day of life.

For early Christians, the name of Jesus held a special significance. In Jewish tradition, names expressed aspects of personality. Jesus' name permeated His ministry, and it does so today: we are baptised in the name of Jesus (Acts 2:38), we are justified through the name of Jesus (1 Cor 6:11); and God the Father has given Jesus a name above all others (Phil 2:9). All Christian prayer is through 'Jesus Christ our Lord', and it is 'at the name of Jesus' that one day every knee shall bow.

News from our churches

Toys and gifts

This year thanks to the amazing generosity of St Thomas's congregation we were able to supply 3 toys/gifts to 68 children aged 0-18yrs from the 2 homeless units, 2 women's aids, Stay Well centre and children of asylum seekers. Finance

We face the beginning of another new year with continued difficulties we hope and pray that the worse effects of the covid pandemic are behind us but ahead we face the cost-of-living problems, and the energy price hikes. It is against this background that once again I am including this reminder of our dependence as a church on our church members for our finance. We are all having to give serious consideration to our personal budgets looking to the year ahead. Can I urge you

to also reconsider your personal response to your donation to St Thomas and St Luke's. If you use our envelope scheme and we are very grateful for your regular offerings, new sets for 2023 are being distributed for use in January.

The Parish Giving Scheme has been of great benefit to our church finances since it was set up a few years ago. The schemes can be commended for its advantages to the church. This scheme involves a payment direct from your bank in the sum that you decide however, if you are a taxpayer, we receive the gift aid tax refund within ten days of your monthly donation being received rather than having to wait for the completion of the annual claim at the end of the tax year. Our resident historian David Fearnley has penned another article reflecting on the past of our town and its people.

204 of the 250 miners were killed leaving 93 widows and 282 orphans. Many of the deceased could only be identified by their clothing or pocket watches. The majority of the miners came from Haydock and some from Ashton and Newton. 11th – 16th June there was a continuous procession of horse - pulled hearses as 42 of the deceased were buried at St. Thomas', Ashton.

Many families lost several members since many of the younger boys were employed as pony drivers or as drawers working alongside their elder brothers or fathers taking full tubs of coal to the haulage and returning with empty tubs. The explosion was the result of a great inflow of gas, probably due to a roof fall, the cause of ignition was not determined. A relief fund was set up by Lord Derby, of Knowsley Hall, Liverpool, which raised £25,000 (£2 million, today).

THE WOOD PIT, HAYDOCK, DISASTER 7/6/1878 (Part 1)

A gravestone within the Warrington Road graveyard bears the tragic inscription - "In Memory of Catherine, wife of Nathan Boon, who died 24/3/1877 aged 42. Nathan Boon, aged 45, Isaac their son aged 21, John their son, aged 19, Thomas their son aged 18, William their son, aged 16, Joseph their son aged 14. Who lost their lives in the Wood Pit Explosion June 7, 1878".

The Wood Pit, on Vista Road, was owned by Richard Evans & Co., of Haydock. On the morning of June 7th 1878 250 men and boys began their shift at the Wood Pit. At 11am there was a terrific explosion below ground due to an ignition of firedamp/gas. The force of the explosion ran along the underground workings and up both the down and up shafts sending smoke and dust into the sky. Underground was a scene of carnage with mutilated bodies and ponies scattered throughout the tunnels and coal tubs embedded into the roof of the workings. Those not killed by the explosion succumbed to the afterdamp of poisonous gas produced by the burning gas.


