

Letter from Sian

One recent sunny morning, as Julie Andrews (the Jack Russell) and I walked around a corner at Three Sisters, a man's voice said, "Put your brakes on before you get to that lady!" I looked up to see a little lad riding his brand-new bike. He screeched to a halt in front of me, glanced up and grinned from underneath his matching crash helmet. His dad proudly announced, as he put his steady hand on his son's shoulder, that he'd only been riding unaided for the last five minutes. I'm not sure what impressed me most: the boy's confidence or the fact that his bicycle and protective gear was all co-ordinated. (Or the fact that I was called a lady!)

What I do know is that that dad would be doing a lot of running along behind, alternately shouting words of warning and encouragement for a few days and weeks to come.

I reflected, as I walked away, on our relationship with God and how, at this time of year, when we have celebrated Easter and stood with the disciples as they watched Jesus disappear again to be with his Father, we are told to wait for the Holy Spirit. In fact, two men dressed in white come and stand with the disciples and say,

"Men of Galilee, why are you standing here staring into heaven? Jesus has been taken from you into heaven, but someday he will return from heaven in the same way you saw him go!" (Acts 1:11)

This is when the disciples, who had been straining not to lose sight of Jesus, begin to learn how to "go it alone", just like the cycling lad. Except that they were never alone and they had been promised a gift, baptism of the Holy Spirit. (Acts 1:5) Although it had been a journey of ups and downs to this point, they knew that Jesus always keeps his promises, even if it involves waiting.

And so, we find ourselves at a similar point in this season. As we look up to

Jesus, who is seated at the right hand of the Father, we are called to draw on the strength of the Holy Spirit: the giver of life, power, love and peace; leader, helper and speaker of truth; healer, advocate and the one who frees us from bondage; inspiration, guide and joy. He equips us to share the good news and love of Jesus, living for his glory.

In the words of Bishop Paul, we are "Called to pray, read and learn. Sent to tell, serve and give." He breaks it down like this: "In the inner journey you are called by God to pray, and to read scripture, and to learn from one another. In the outer journey you are sent by God to tell our friends about Jesus, and to serve those in need, and to give our lives, our time and talents and money, back to the God who has given us everything."

Even though we so often feel a bit wobbly, like the young Bradley Wiggins at Three Sisters, we too can feel the steadying hand of God on our shoulders, giving words of encouragement as we set out, and warning when we try and do it all in our own strength. When the Holy Spirit fell at Pentecost, he filled the whole room, like a roaring windstorm, and at the same time settled on each person, like a tongue of fire. Let's ask him to refresh us and ignite us, just as he did then, as individuals and as a whole

SOROCOLD OF ASHTON IN MAKERFIELD

From c1590 to c1690 there lived in Ashton in Makerfield a family with the unusual name of Sorocold. The Sorocold family originated from Manchester and Salford where, in the early 16th Century, they were a wealthy and influential family, one of the leading gentry families of Manchester. They were mercers (dealers in cloth), vitners (dealers in wine), and shearmen (tailors cutting cloth). They owned the "Eagle & Child Inn" in St. Mary's Gate, and property near the Shambles in the Smithy Door, one of the oldest streets in Manchester, and where many of the most influential inhabitants lived. Some of the early buildings of the Shambles are preserved today in the grounds of Manchester Cathedral. The Sorocolds intermarried with other influential families in Manchester such as the Strangeways, Hulmes and Prestwichs, areas of Manchester today are named after these families. In the late 16th Century Edward Sorocold had settled in London and was selling cloth in the city. He became a member of one of the great livery companies or guilds in London - the Merchant Taylors - and thereby became a freeman and Citizen of London with the right to export cloth overseas. Other members of the Sorocolds also became Merchant Taylors. The Merchant Taylor Guild set up many schools including Merchant Taylor School, Crosby, Liverpool.

In the late 16th Century the Sorocolds moved outwards from their origins in Manchester to the following areas Barton, Salford, Eccles, Tyldesley, Worsley, Leigh, Pennington, Golborne, Lowton, Ashton in Makerfield, Haydock, Newton in Makerfield, Croft, and Liverpool. In the late 16th century the Sorocolds arrived in Ashton in Makerfield with the marriage of George Sorocold, of Barton, near Manchester, to Jane Ashton, of Bamfurlong Hall, Bamfurlong, near Wigan. In Ashton in Makerfield the residences of the Sorocold family were Eye Bridge Farm(now Heybridge Farm) and Dock Lane House. Dock Lane House was situated on Dock Lane, now Liverpool Road, Ashton (either on the site of Home Farm/Worthingtons or on the site of the military vehicle yard). Eve Bridge Farm is just within the boundary of Ashton and is situated on the Golborne - Abram road c250 yards before the canal bridge at Dover Locks, Abram. Although on the extremity of Ashton there once was a more direct route to Eyebridge Farm - along Golborne Road, into Edge Green Lane, following the track that led from Edge Green Lane/Riding Lane along Locker Lane (the path through the farmyard near the S shaped bend on Riding Lane, near the Harrow Inn) eventually crossing the present Wigan -Warrington railway line and 150 yards onwards reaching Eyebridge Farm. The Sorocolds were probably the wealthiest family in Ashton after the Gerards.

They were involved in the buying of property and lands and the rights to mine coal in Ashton. Despite the Sorocolds being such a wealthy and influential family very little information is recorded on their activities in Ashton. In the mid 17th century George and Jane Sorocold's grandson George and his wife Elizabeth Sorocold (Birchall) and children James, John, George and Alice lived at Eye Bridge Farm. James and George attended Winwick Grammar School. In 1649, when there was an outbreak of plague in Ashton, a Edward Sorocold and others personally financed the food and assistance given to the township. They petitioned the court in Lancaster for assistance stating "that Ashton hath been for these eight months last past and asyet doth ly under gods heavy hand of the plague" and that they had spent over £360 of their own money to provide relief for 400 people of the township. In 1654 Alice Sorocold, daughter of George Sorocold, married John Launder, the vounger, whose father John Launder, the elder, of Winwick, in 1634 had purchased the New Hall (later named Garswood New Hall), Ashton. In 1655 Alice died in childbirth along with her infant daughter Elizabeth. In 1661 John Sorocold, of Eye Bridge Farm, serving in the Earl of Dundee's regiment in London, was killed in a drunken brawl on a London street, Roger Lowe, an Ashton shopkeeper, recalls in his diary the merry times that Roger had with the Sorocolds or their servants in the inns and taverns in Ashton. In 1675 Roger writes that recently 7 people had died at Eye Bridge Farm including 3 within the last few weeks of fever. In 1674 John Sorocold, the younger, died at Dock Lane House, Ashton, leaving no will. Thomas Birchall, of the City of London, merchant taylor, was granted the right to administer the estate of the deceased. In 1688 a report on the poor state of the Kings highways in West Lancashire required that each parish provide a gentleman to inspect with the parish overseer of highways what work was necessary and to keep an eye on the work in progress. Mr. George Sorocold was nominated for the Winwick parish.

In Lancashire the Sorocold name disappears c1790 and today the name Sorocold seems extinct in Britain except for a southern branch named Serocold in the Cambridgeshire region. George Sorocold left Eye Bridge Farm and moved to Derby c1685. No trace of the family remains at the farm although if you enter the old barn you will find engraved on one of the large oak cross-beams "GS 1673"!







Movie Reviews

Avengers: Infinity War (12A)

In a Nutshell: What even is expectation at this point? We are in our tenth year of the MCU the Marvel Cinematic Universe that started in 2008 with the now iconic Iron Man... and it seems every film thus far has led to this moment, that film teased The Avengers and in that 2012 smash hit, they teased their greatest foe Thanos who finally comes to play in this latest installment slash finale to the grand plan they've been at this whole time. So what even is there to say other than most anticipated movie ever? And does it deliver? Well I do not even believe that any film ever could live up to that insane level of hype... but I still believe it does its job with flying colours, somehow managing to juggle ever character ever in a feat not yet tried in which you have not just ever Avengers characters, but Guardians, and more recent characters not yet in the typical Avengers lore such as Black Panther and co... and manages to give everyone the right amount of time and character, which is easier given everyone is already set up and loved and cared about thanks to their respective movies, which gives this movie the unique aspect of focusing on Thanos and giving him a heck of a lot of character and pathos as well as establishing him as the scariest foe they've faced yet and that really pays off, you really buy into his motives and he works well as a character and a antagonist. Naturally, everyone is solid and fun in their usual roles, not really singling anyone out though Pratt and Ruffalo have some interesting moments to work with as well as Benedict and Zoe, while as mentioned Brolin brings a lot to the role of Thanos and gives him some terrific extra depth while always being believable which is though given what he looks like on screen. I've always been more a fan of the stand alone stories, they all connect but the Black Panther or the Ant Man, Iron Man, Thor.... and I've only just realised this now, because even though the way this juggles so many plot threads and story arcs is impressive.... I can't delve into anything for spoiler reasons, so that's your lot really.... it does feel a bit quick and dizzy at times jumping through so many plot points and characters and arcs, that you do long to just focus on one story and character just for a bit. But that said, it' is in the end, a really hard film to sum up and do justice to in a review except to say fans are going to love it, outsiders will have some fun but will lost and even the most natural person who sees these regularly but isn't up on everything may be a bit puzzled too.... but man what a ride it's been and what a pay off this is, get ready to be very emotional! I'm not even going to hint at anything more....

In a Nutshell: In this age of loud explosions and crashes and bangs, and every jump scare being orchestrated by loud noises.... it's with the gentlest of ironies that the best horror movie since It Follows, revolves entirely around complete quiet and stillness, a bit like that movie dealt with the terror of what isn't quite catching you but lingering in the background slowly creeping up.... Hollywood might finally be cottoning onto the basic idea that less is more and there is more to creep and unnerve in the idea of the threat and the suggestion more than the actual obvious... and here it really does pay off, both in just how utterly terrific and nerve shredding this film is and in the fact it's a mega success and already seguels have been ordered, hopefully not diluting the bold ingenuity on show here. Also surprising, is it's masterminded and directed by John Krasinski, best known for deadpan looks in The Office and various movies, and not only is he utterly compelling and bold as the film's male lead, he also completely nails every aspect in directing this movie from mood, to look to feel.... he's a real one to watch and a complete revelation. Not too surprising is the female lead, also married to Krasinski, Miss Emily Blunt, always utterly unmissable and again simply dynamic here, whilst newcomer Millicent Simmonds is utterly fantastic, the fact that the actress is hard of hearing adds that touch of realism to the film rather than having a actor who can hear play someone who can't... it shows a new step towards casting people who really do fit the roles and a bold new direction, and also plays straight into another few twists that occur within the film that are clever and fun. With it's bold and brilliant premise, great performances and direction... it's perfect running time and nerve shredding throughout... this is a perfect exercise in great terrifying movie making, just be sure to be very quiet and no rustling in the aisles....
