You can marry in a C of E church of your choice if certain criteria are shown to be met. For details please contact the vicar or call in at Vestry Hour on a Thursday



Letter from the Vicar


I was at the opticians recently, sitting in the chair staring at the ever smaller letters on the wall ahead of me. The optician carried out the familiar exercise of placing a lens in front of my right eye and asking, 'is it better with or without?' Then another lens, 'is better or worse?' Finally, with both eyes tested I was issued with my prescription.



Many people that I meet have no real need for Jesus until things go wrong or there is a crisis to

be faced. Life is fine on their own terms until a little of God will help out for a while. When we go through those trials and testing times in life, and maybe also the joys and celebrations, we can all ask ourselves the question 'is this better with or without Jesus'. Does knowing him in our lives, particularly in the times of trial and celebration where He may be very close to us make life better or not? It's a question that we may ask ourselves, Christian or not.

As we journey through Lent to the Easter miracle of the resurrection we may contemplate both who the risen Christ may



be for ourselves at this point in our lives, and also how our life to come may be better with him rather than without.

One of my favourite authors, Henri Nouwen writes: "Lent offers a beautiful opportunity to discover the mystery of Christ within us. It is a

gentle but also demanding time. It is a time of solitude but also community, it is a time of listening to the voice within, but also a





time of paying attention to other people's needs. It is a time to continuously make the passage to new inner life as well as to life with those around us. When we live Lent attentively and gently, then Easter can truly be a celebration during which the reality of the risen Christ will reverberate into the deepest place of our being."

Whether it is a particular issue or a life decision, God's prescription is to know the presence and the reality of the living Lord Jesus in all aspects of our life. You are welcome at St Thomas and St Luke's to travel with us this Lent and Easter and beyond. I pray that you truly discover or rediscover how much better life is with him than without.

The Pharisee and the Tax Collector

Do you remember this parable that Jesus told about two men with very different attitudes to prayer?

Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'

But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.' (Luke 18:10-13).

The next verse tells us what Jesus told his listeners. "I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

Our mission in this Messy Church was to remind ourselves that we should always pray for the right reasons and that we should avoid showing off or thinking that we are better than other people. We also wanted to remind everyone that Jesus brings hope and that no one is beyond the reach of God's love and forgiveness.

As usual we did this through a number of activities or crafts; some messier than others.

We made up our own 'disappearing solution' adding various amounts of vinegar, bicarbonate of soda, baking powder, washing up liquid and lemon juice to a bowl of water. When we put pictures that we'd drawn of some of the things that we had done that were wrong – they disappeared, just like our sins are washed away when we say sorry to God!

On another table, we drew or wrote more of the ways that we mess up and then pushed these pieces of paper into a gloopy mess made from baked beans, rice pudding, gravy browning and brown sauce. That was messy!

We chatted about what prayer was and made different things to help us to remember to chat to God; prayer bracelets, prayer tassels and our own version of a Jewish phylactery.

The Pharisee boasted in his prayer that he gave away a tenth of all he gets, just as the bible instructs us to do. Jesus loves us to share the good things that we have and so each person could take two pieces of fruit and dip them into melted chocolate - one to eat and one to give away to someone else.



It seems sometimes as though peacocks are showing off when they spread out their tail feathers, a bit like the Pharisee boasting about how good he was. We made peacock fans to remind us that we shouldn't boast when we pray or at any other time really.

It is always good to pray for other people and so we had a world map out to allow everyone to choose a country and then pray for it.

Having talked about how we should and shouldn't pray and about how God forgives us when we ask him, everyone had the opportunity to be prayed for and to be encouraged saying their own prayers.



While we ate our hot dogs and muffins we chatted about How many times have you said sorry today? Do you find it easy or hard to say sorry? Why? How do you think the tax collector in the story felt when God forgave him?

Our next Messy Church will be on Good Friday on 3rd April at 10.30am in the church hall. We are looking for people to help us as most of the usual team will be in the Good Friday service in church. At the end of our Good Friday Messy Church we join with others from our church family in the hall at noon for lunch of pre-ordered chippie fish & chips (sign up in church) or fish fingers and oven chips.





St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. If you've ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you'd think he was the patron saint of New York as well... the flamboyant parade is full of American/Irish razzmatazz.

It's all a far cry from the hard life of this 5th century humble Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde. But as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God".

Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including near-starvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted.

But by 435, well educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up his see at Armagh, and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made several missionary journeys.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ. Patrick remains the most popular of the Irish saints. The principal cathedral of New York is dedicated to him, as, of course, is the Anglican cathedral of Dublin.

In a Nutshell: Matthew Vaughn is hardly a director who plays by the rules... his 2004 debut Layer Cake was the dark and cool ganaster thriller that introduced us to Daniel Craig while his 2010 superhero adaptation of the Mark Miller graphic novel that introduced the world to Hit Girl who everything you'd imagine you couldn't get away with in a modern blockbuster, even his X-Men prequel First Class had a dark and sharp edge that give the franchise a fresh kick of life. So now, he's making his own spy movie and it's everything you'd expect from the man who brought us Hit Girl. Very very witty and very very bonkers, yet with plenty of dark edges, a lot of insane violence that won't be for everyone and a very un-PC attitude to everything... it's essentially doing for James Bond and the like what he did for superheroes. Safe to say from someone who's a massive fan, it's an utter joy from start to start. Colin Firth is as fantastic as he always is, straight faced and straight laced while being the brand new action hero icon, you simply wouldn't mess with him... and he is supported brilliantly by terrific dependables like Michael Caine as the spy head and Mark Strong as the gadget man, and not least a fantastically off the wall Sam Jackson as the insane villain. Best of all though is newcomer Egerton as Eggsy, the new recruit who has to step up and train to save the world, his story is fantastically told in the most traditional sense possible while never really being traditional at all... and he is really is a face to watch; he's going to be massive! A host of familiar faces will have you wondering what you saw them in, and there's a handful of fantastic tunes being given a new spin in ways you didn't expect.... basically if you love the spy movie, if you love having fun and you can handle it and go along for the ride, you are going to adore every minute! Just be sure to brace yourself.... Rating: 10/10

Fletcher being the instant classic character played here by dead-cert Oscar winner (by the time you read this, he'll have deservedly and obviously won his award) J.K Simmons, always having been a true legend in



everything he's in and finally really really shining here, both charming and utterly terrifying, a brutal teacher and a bully of ways, but at the same time you can see in a way why he is how he is. On the other hand you have Miles Teller, sadly not getting enough love for his in a different way bravura turn as Andrew, who so desperately wants to be a world class drummer that he goes to extreme lengths and is helped by the way Fletcher pushes him, his is another fantastic performance that shouldn't be undervalued because in some ways he's not the innocent victim he could be, his arrogance getting the better of him at times. The two hander is tense and terrifying, and helps push the mood of the piece to an electric finale.... Like I said, there is hardly likely to be a more electrifying and intense and terrifyingly exciting piece of cinema this year, it will leave you breathless... in a good way! **Rating: 10/10**



St ANGELA

It is not that long ago that most girls never had the chance to be educated. But one determined woman started the process, and her name was Angela Merici. She was born in Italy on 24 March 1474. Both her parents died when she was only 10, and then when Angela was 13 her elder sister died too, which led her to dedicate her life to God. When she was only 22 she started a school for young girls in her home town and this was so successful that she was invited to start schools in other places. Her faith led her to make pilgrimages to the Holy Land and to Rome

It was when she was in Rome in 1524 that she suddenly lost her sight. Pope Clement VII asked her to stay in Rome to take charge of an order of nursing nuns but she refused and went home to Brescia. When she was almost 60 she started the Order of St Ursula, which is still involved in teaching today. Even though she was blind, St Angela Merici had a vision of what was possible with God's help.




