














Letter from Sian

As I write, I'm trying to get organised. I know, I can already hear you laughing but wait, it gets even better... I'm going on an eight-day silent retreat.

Just about everyone has said "You'll never manage that!" but I'm going to try. In fact, I can't quite describe how much I'm looking forward to it. A few years ago, a friend of mine described going on retreat as a "holiday with God" and that's how I like to see it. So, I shall take my Bible and listen to God, as we explore a new place together. You never know, it might lead to some creativity. Hopefully, it will be a refreshing time and I'll come back so chilled out, you won't recognise me.

Also, as I write, I'm aware that the New Testament readings from James have been really challenging over the last few weeks and in front of me is the first part of chapter 3, where James writes about controlling the tongue. James is so direct in his short epistle about how we should put our faith into action and this section on what comes out of our mouths is no exception:

We can make a large horse go wherever we want by means of a small bit in its mouth. And a small rudder makes a huge ship turn wherever the pilot chooses to go, even though the winds are strong. In the same way, the tongue is a small thing that makes grand speeches.

But a tiny spark can set a great forest on fire. (James 3:3-5, NLT) Those are the words that will be ringing in my ears as I go off into silence. What a challenge!

I used to encourage my children to count to ten to avoid overreacting to something; of course, I knew that because I had had to learn it myself. One of the other things I have had to go on learning is to try and say what someone needs to hear, rather than what I feel like saying. Yes, I'm still working on it...

But now, we're approaching a more reflective time of year, when we begin to enter a season of thanksgiving, memorials and remembrance leading up to Advent. One of the most well-known verses to lead into a time of reflection is Psalm 46:10, which was written in a context of trouble and war: "Be still and know that I am God! I will be honoured by every nation. I will be honoured throughout the world." (NLT). In The Message, this is translated:

"Step out of the traffic! Take a long, loving look at me, your High God, above politics, above everything."

It is good for us to take a few days out here and there, but it is good practice, too, to take some time out every day, to be disciplined in reading Scripture, praying and enjoying God's presence. For some of us, it works best to have a quiet time first thing in the morning, some people sneak it in with a coffee break, some do it last thing at night; there are some, even, who retire to the bathroom for some peace and quiet! Whatever works for you. A conductor friend of mine had his prayer time early in the morning, as he said there was no point in tuning the orchestra after it had played!

In so many of the Mark's Gospel readings recently, Jesus has been looking for time out when someone has come to find him, like the Syro-Phoenician lady in chapter 7:24-30, and he always gave people the time they needed. Neither did these interruptions stop Jesus finding time with his Father. I shall leave you with these words: "Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me—watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won't lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you. Keep company with me and you'll learn to live freely and lightly."

(Matthew 11:28-30, The Message)

In a Nutshell: It's true that by this point in life, you will just watch a Marvel Cinematic Universe movie and just simply nod and go 'Yep it's absolutely great and flawless and all the rest'. While this latest Ant Man sequel is maybe not a totally spotless perfect movie on the scale of a Panther or Civl War, it's still another fairly flawless joy from first frame to last all the same, and carries on this fine tradition. In the best of sequel spirits, it is essentially all the things you loved about the characters and dynamics of the first... but once more and with plenty of new added twists and dynamics as well as of course, all new plots and characters to save and defeat. All your favourites are back with Rudd as dependable as ever and with some particularly great moments involving inhabiting certain other characters that show his range really well and work better than they should, while Douglas is as great as he ever is and Lilly once again just nails it with loads more to do this time too for obvious reasons, whilst Pena and the other sidekicks are terrific value once more stealing every scene with aplomb though Greer and Cannavale have very little to do. Of the new faces, Fishburne and Pfieffer are really solid if underused, though Goggins is great fun and Kamen is a terrific addition with a great story to tell, which makes her a much more interesting and two dimensional baddie and more than meets the eye. The effects are fabulously inventive and terrifically fun with so many fun variations of being both huge and tiny throughout, and so many inventive and massively cool set pieces built around these ideas... this makes this the funniest and the coolest of the MCU movies so far, or at least very close due to Ragnarok. Full of fun characters, cool crazy plots, and a film that never takes itself too seriously and just wants to have a big dose of summer sci-fi comedy fun... this is the perfect antidote after the rough ride of heavyweight drama that was Infinity War, and with it's high doses of quippy comedy and scene-stealing side characters, then this is just the right amount of mad fun for everyone.

God's World Around Us

Creationtide

The heatwave this summer was a powerful reminder that our planet is not disposable! The evidence that carbon dioxide is heating the planet is seen in melting polar ice caps, rising sea levels and extreme weather. In the church September and early October is designated Creationtide, a time to reflect on God as Creator and Sustainer of all life. God loves the *world* ('cosmos') so much (John 3:16), referring to the entire universe. Do we share such love for God's world, in our care for it?

Despite the environmental crisis, God has not given up on His world. We live in a broken world where our present experience is marked by suffering: 'For the creation was subjected to frustration' (Romans 8:20). With us, the creation groans in pain: 'We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time.' (22). However, these are not groans of despair, as God promises the hope of a new heaven and earth for all creation: 'the creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God.' (v 21). At the end of time, God will not simply start again, but renew the created order according to His glorious eternal purpose.

What does this say to us? We cannot simply write off this world, but work with God for that day of transformation. We demonstrate the importance

of this world to God by our lifestyle, by living simply and generously and not harming the environment by the wrong use of resources. What practical steps can we employ?

Our commitment must be 'to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.' (*Five Marks* of *Mission*).
